It was noted by High School Principal, Rick Barnes, that it's a policy required by law.

Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, explained that they talk about equipping their public safety departments with the best training and the best equipment, and that this would be part of it.

"That is an ongoing process," Malaguti said.

Londonderry Fire Chief, Bo Butler, explained that it's an automated CPR device, saying that they can put the device on a patient and it does CPR automatically and uninterrupted.

He explained, as an example, if they bring a patient to an ambulance the CPR would likely be up to \$60,000 in the interrupted while they ARPA funds to purchase are transporting the funds.

Dangerous Summer Heat

We're in our first extreme heat wave of the summer, with expected temperatures to be in the 90s over the next few days, and then add the humidity well that makes it feel like 100+ degrees. Air conditioners are working overtime coupled with the pain of electric cost, ouch, and those without AC look for shade and cooling stations.

Take proper precautions to protect yourself, your family, the elderly, and pets from the hot weather. These extreme heat conditions could lead to heat exhaustion, or worse, heat stroke. Here are some tips that may help from the American Red Cross:

- Never leave children or pets in your vehicle.
- Stay hydrated and drink plenty of fluids. Avoid drinks with caffeine or alcohol.
- Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, light-colored clothing.
 - Slow down, stay indoors.
- · Avoid strenuous exercise during the hottest part of the day.
- · Take frequent breaks if working outdoors.
- Check on family, friends, and neighbors who do not have air conditioning, or those who are more likely to be affected by the heat.

According to the American Red Cross, excessive heat can lead to:

• Heat Exhaustion; signs are cool, moist, pale, or flushed skin, heavy sweating, headache, nausea,

dizziness, weakness, and exhaustion, move to a cooler place, remove or loosen tight clothing, and apply cool, wet cloths or towels to their skin.

• Heat Stroke; signs are hot red skin that may be dry or moist; changes in consciousness, vomiting, and high body temperature.

Drink small amounts of cool water and drink slowly. If signs get worse, call 9-1-1.

Let's not forget about our pets, signs of heat stroke in your pet according to www.akcchf.org:

- Heavy panting and unable to calm down, even when lying down.
 - Brick red gum color
 - Fast pulse rate
 - Unable to get up

If you think your pet may have heat stroke, try to cool the animal down with water. Stop cooling the animal when the temperature seems better, then bring your pet to a veterinarian.

In a few months, we'll be talking about how much we miss the summer and how short it was as we get ready for fall and winter.

Summer is the season of fun outdoors and there should be plenty of opportunities for that once these dangerous temperatures sub-

Until then, take the proper precautions to avoid the summer danger zone of extreme heat conditions.

To the editor, A significant issue for seniors wanting to remain in their home and retain as much control over our lives as possible is the dealing with the cost of housing. If we can no longer afford to remain in our home, finding an affordable alternative in town is challenging. Here are two options

that may help if this is a

problem for you.

The first is remodelto create a separate selfcontained apartment. The technical name is an ADU (accessory dwelling unit). It is an efficiency, or 1-bedroom apartment located on the same property as a single-family, owner-occupied house. It is a selfcontained, independent housing unit complete with a kitchen, bathroom, living space, and successful for a long permanent utility con-

electric). It can be attached or detached to the primary home. If you are considering this option, remember remodeling costs will require an initial investment. But the investment should increase your home's value while generating additional rental income. AARP has information that can be mailed to you or downloaded at their website at www. Home Sharing is a different approach where two or more people share a home for mutual benefit. A homeowner offers a private bedroom and shared common space in exchange for rent, help around the house or combination of the two. ed revenue that was proposed for the Town Council to accept was for \$9,000 from the Government Finance Officers Association (NHG-FOA) inaugural "Fellowship Program Scholarship."

Campo explained that they were offered up to \$9,000 to bring a college intern on for the summer in the finance department.

"So we got it for free and I said yes, as long as you guys said yes," Campo told the Town Council.

While there was little discussion about the different unanticipated revenue, one question raised by Town Councilor, Shawn Faber, was whether or not accepting the unanticipated revenue would have any impact on the Default Budget.

Campo explained that the only one that could potentially have an impact is the unanticipated revenue from the Stanton Foundation, but said that they already have the police dog accounted for and essentially the extra funding, would be to just help pay for it.

It was unanimously approved by the Town Council to accept the revenue.

Also during the meeting, the Town Council also unanimously approved dissolving the Londonderry Pickleball taskforce.

The taskforce was created last April by the Town Council to help research and come up with recommendations to the Town Manager and to the Town Council about how to proceed moving forward.

During the election in March, voters rejected approving funding for pickleball courts in town, with 2,688 voters saying no to approve the warrant article, and 1,564 voters in town voting yes in support of the warrant article.

According to the resolution approved by the Town Council, the task force could potentially be started up again in the future if needed.

"The Board encourages increased educational options for hospitalized or homebound students, dropouts, suspended or expelled students, young athletes, or other atypical students for whom regular classrooms are not practical or effective," the proposed policy states. "It is hoped that such offerings will serve as a motivator for students with different learning styles."

It also states as part that "Students earning credit via alternative methods will participate in all assessments required by the statewide education improvement and assessment program."

As part of the policy,

Board "directs the Superintendent to establish regulations and procedures for implementing this policy," including the following:

- Definitions of allowable alternative learning opportunities
- Reasonable limits on the number of approved alternative courses that can be administered each school year, both school-wide and per student
- The number of alternative credits each student may use toward graduation requirements

Application and approval process

- · Criteria for determining which requests satisfy a particular subject area requirement
 - Identification of

person(s) responsible for approval, supervision, and monitoring progress

- Requirements that alternative opportunities meet the same rigorous academic outcomes as traditional classroom delivery
- Assurance of student safety including physical and technological

Assurance of equal access for all students

• Assurance that approved alternative learning opportunities are consistent with all policies of this board.

The procedure will be made available to the public.

The proposed policy goes on to state that "It Board that alternative methods for the awarding of credit may include:

- Competency testing in lieu of enrollment under the provisions of Board policy ILBAA
- Interdisciplinary credit
- Satisfactory completion of course requirements at: an approvedschool under the provisions of Board policy IK; an approved home education program(seeBoard policies IKan NH Dept. of Education Rule Ed 315).
- Demonstration of mastery of required coursework and material, pursuant to Board policy IK.

- College Credit, including credit earned through Dual and/or Concurrent Enrollment under Board policy IHCD

"If a student demonstrates knowledge and abilities on a placement pre-test developed by the school district for a particular course, the student shall not receive credit for the course, but shall be allowed to take a more advanced level of the subject or an elective," the proposed policy states.

In terms of funding, the proposed policy states "unless otherwise recommended by the Superintendent and approved by the Board, under ordinary circumstances students or their parents/guardians are responsible for all related expenses including tuition and textbooks."

"The District may pay the fee for expelled students who are permitted to take courses in alternative settings. If paid by the District and the course is not completed, the student must reimburse the district for the expenses," the proposed policy states.

The School Board unanimously approved sending the policy to a second reading.
