Capital Projects Committee Created for School District

During the Tuesday, June 3 Londonderry School Board meeting, the School Board received an update regarding the potential capital campaign in order to improve facilities within

the school district. "This is just a follow-up to the last meeting," Business Administrator Amity Small said during the meeting. Small said since their May meeting, they have discussed what a committee for the initiative would look like. "Since the May 20,

2025 Board meeting when the Athletic Director and I presented a plan to pursue donations to help fund capital projects, we met to discuss forming a committee, whose charge would be to formulate a specific action plan to begin this process this **continued on page 10**

Annual Junkyard Licenses Approved by Town Council

Two different junkyard license renewals were on the agenda for the most recent Londonderry Town Council meeting.

Over the past several years, the annual renewals were sometimes very contemptuous, but this year's license went fairly easily.

Both junkyards are currently being sold.

First on the agenda was Murray's Auto, on Hall Road. "On unannounced visits a few times to Murray's Junkyard the fences were down and the cars were

stacked too high," Assistant Building Inspector Brad Anderson said, when asked to address concerns, they were addressed within 24-48 hours Anderson explained.

"An inspection of Murray's Auto junkyard was conducted on dates to determine compliance with their license conditions in preparation for renewal," a memo to the Town Council stated. "No adverse conditions were observed during the inspection that would prohibit renewal of this license."

It was explained that

the applicant "continues to work with DES to maintain compliance with the recommended Best Management Practices (BMP). During my visit, it appeared that Mr. Dudek is following proper BMP." Mr. Anderson recommended approval of Murray's Auto junkyard.

"Based on the recent inspection and other visits to the property during the year, it appears that the applicant is operating within the requirements of their license, and renewal of the license is recommended," he wrote in a

Library Trustees to Review and Revise Director Job Description

The Leach Library Board of Trustees opened its June 4 meeting with questions from residents, who wanted more clarity on issues regarding library activities and employees.

“One of the things that came up at the last meeting was librarians being ‘at-will’ employees,” Kate Burbidge. “I want to point out that this is incorrect. Librarians and library staff are actually appointed positions by the Board of Trustees, they’re not at-will, and they’re protected under RSA 17.”

She asked the Trustees to clarify the

difference between appointed and at-will positions, adding that appointed employees can only be removed for “malfeasance, misfeasance, inefficiency in office, or incapacity or unfitness to perform the said duties.” She wanted greater clarity in library job descriptions, especially with higher-level positions.

“I looked at job descriptions from the NH Library Trustees Association site,” said Burbidge. Library Director Erin Matlin was already addressing the issue of job descriptions, passing out a new draft for the other Trustees to review.

“I did create a job

description based on things I do, and that should be in my job description. I did consult 11 other libraries with their job descriptions, as well as what I do on a daily basis,” said Matlin. “I’d like to pass this out for the Board to review for next time.”

Trustee Chair Liz Thomas wanted more time to pin down a more accurate job description for the Library Director. “If we could see what Erin does, we may need to know if we should add some text,” said Thomas, who also wanted to wrap up the Director’s yearly performance review at the same time. “Let’s have

all of the Director things done at once.”

Board Treasurer Jan McLaughlin agreed, recommending the Trustee take them up together.

“One shouldn’t be done without the other,” she said.

With a busy summer schedule, the Leach Library Board of Trustees voted to postpone discussions related to the Library Director to a special meeting on Wednesday, July 23. Other members of the public asked for changes to library policy, including the complete abolition of fines.

“I would like the Trustees to consider going fine free with the remainder of the collec-

tion. Currently, we are fine free on reading materials, and we went totally fine free for the summer in 2022 to really positive feedback from the community in that,” said Megan Donovan who was speaking as a resident of Londonderry. “When we did resume fines, it was for DVDs, Library of Things, and music.” She argued that removing all remaining fines was “the most impactful thing” that the Trustees could do for lower-income families.

“If they have no money for coffee, they have no money to pay for a five-dollar fine if they are late with a movie,” said Donovan. “That would also help

families who are busy, everybody is busy right now.”

She suggested putting an “amnesty jar” in the library as a replacement and encouraging patrons to donate in lieu of paying a fine. Donations would be transferred into the Leach Library book account.

The Trustees did not immediately commit to a new policy but thanked Donovan for the suggestion. “We’re certainly going to take that and work on it,” said Thomas.

The next meeting of the Leach Library Board of Trustees is scheduled for Wednesday, July 9, at 7 p.m. in the Leach Library meeting room.

memo.

The second license application was for S&S Metals, on Rockingham Road.

“No adverse conditions were observed

during the inspection that would prohibit renewal of this license,” he wrote in a memo. “The applicant continues to work with DES to maintain compliance with the recommended

Best Management Practices (BMP). Due to the nature of the junkyard operation as determined by DES, Mr. Solimini also operates as a metal recycling facility for the non-automotive metals received at this site.”

Like with Murray’s it was recommended to

approve the license for S&S Metals.

“Based on the recent inspection and other visits to the property during the year, it appears that the applicant is operating within the requirements of their license, and renewal of the license is recommended,” he wrote.

Both applications were approved by the Town Council with Town Councilor Deb Paul recusing herself.

Another agenda item was in regards to a request to withdraw \$15,908 from the Reclamation Trust Fund for

recycling carts. Director of Engineering & Environmental Services John Trottier explained during the meeting that it would be to purchase 210 recycling carts.

The request to withdraw the funds was unanimously approved by the Town Council.

Also during the meeting, the Town Council accepted the resignations of two members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

One of the ZBA members who resigned was Irene Macarelli, and the other was recently appointed member

David Burnham.

It was also agreed on by the Town Council to conduct meetings twice a month during the summer months like they normally do all year round.

Typically during the summer, the Town Council goes to a once-a-month schedule.

It was noted that if issues arise or if there aren’t any agenda items then they can cancel the meeting.

The next Town Council meeting is slated to take place on June 16 beginning at 7 p.m.

Board Recommends Removal of Performance Overlay District

At the recent Planning Board meeting, the Board discussed a proposed amendment to remove the Route 28 Performance Overlay District.

"The proposed amendment is to remove the Route 28 Performance Overlay District in its entirety," Assistant Town Manager Kellie Caron said.

Caron explained previously that it was brought to the Board about two years ago, to look at both that and the Route 102 overlay district.

"The outcome of that was we just want to look at 28 only," Caron

said.

She stated that it was originally adopted in 2002, the idea at the time to keep it in line with the 1997 Master Plan.

Caron explained previously that it had objectives to "regulate development and ensure that the infrastructure in that corridor could be supported," explaining that it was during the expansion of I-93, that it was also an effort to limit big box stores at the time.

She explained that as part of it, properties in the overlay have additional requirements for setbacks and landscape buffers.

"Removing the over-

lay in its entirety, the primary thing it does is remove those additional dimensional conditions or requirements," Caron said.

At a previous meeting, Caron explained to the Planning Board that the performance overlay district was not meant to be permanent and that the intention was for it to be removed one day.

Caron noted that by removing it, there would be more opportunities for redevelopment, something people think there is a need for that area, noting that there is a limited amount of vacant lots in that area.

Caron explained

that by removing the overlay, there would be the opportunity for more redevelopment in the area.

She stated during the meeting, that the Planning Board was being asked to make a recommendation to the Town Council on the proposed amendment.

There the Town Council would be the body that would make the final decision on the amendment following a first reading and then a public hearing.

Caron noted there are currently 41 lots in the overlay district.

She also explained that if they were to remove the performance overlay district, all the

properties would still be subject to its underlying zoning.

"The commercial zoning that exists there today is going to remain," Caron said.

During public comment, Robin Stewart, who lives on Mammoth Road and has been vocal about the issue at prior meetings, said she is concerned about potential new growth without the overlay district there may be increased traffic.

"If we remove the overlay and just let people... build bigger things, we're just adding more traffic," she said.

Another resident,

Dave Robbins, said he thinks that having the performance overlay district allows them to have more control over what people can build on their properties.

"My opinion is there's nothing in here that's bad. I think these are good goals for us, and I think we should keep the overlay in place," he said.

Despite the concerns brought up, the Planning Board unanimously approved recommending this be moved to the Town Council to remove the performance overlay district in its entirety.

The next Planning Board meeting is set for July 2, at 7 p.m.

School Board Approves Bid for Seven New Copiers

The School Board reviewed bids for a new copier lease during its meeting.

Business Administrator Amity Small explained that seven copiers in the district's fleet need new leases.

"We posted the RFP for copiers on March 27, 2025, and it was open for bidding until April 23, 2025," Small wrote in a memo to the School Board. "During that win-

dow, we received only 1 bid from Northern Business Machines."

Small explained that after receiving only one initial bid, the district contacted additional vendors in an effort to solicit more proposals.

"We then reached out to four other copier vendors and extended the deadline for 1 more week," Small wrote in a memo. "Three of the vendors declined to submit a bid, and one submitted a bid for part of

the RFP, not including per copy cost nor service for the fleet."

After reviewing the bids, the administration decided to recommend Northern Business Machines.

"After reviewing that bid for comparison, we are once again recommending that we enter into a lease with Northern Business Machines for seven copiers and maintenance/service agreement for all copiers districtwide,"

Small wrote. "The NBM bid saves us about \$9,000 from current costs. All bids are for a 60-month lease and include a non-appropriation clause."

Small explained that the district has been leasing copy machines from Northern Business Machines for nearly two decades.

"Londonderry has been leasing the copy machine/printers from Northern Business Machines since 2007,"

Small said.

She added that the company has consistently provided reliable service.

"During this time, Northern Business has serviced the District well and has always been quick to respond to our needs for servicing or replacing copy machines/printers," Small

wrote. "They are an authorized Canon dealer who can get replacement parts directly from the manufacturer, and they

include 24,000,000 B/W pages and 1,700,000 color pages for up to 60 months of the lease, which other vendors do not include. Additionally, we are adding Papercut to the Fleet, which will help us reduce excess copies and ensure confidentiality of printed materials."

The School Board unanimously approved the request to award the bid to Northern Business Machines during the meeting.

About Impact Fees

To the editor,
I have heard that the taxpayers are going to pony up \$65,000 to help out a developer by paving a portion of Wilson Road, why eludes me.

Think it is time to really give serious consideration to Impact Fees. Everyone complains about traffic, but little is done. Total impact fees for the 3 years was \$1,765,000. Probably doesn't sound like a lot of money but these were 1990's dollars and for some comparison the total Town Budget was about 15 million.

So let's stop complaining about traffic and try doing something about it.

LHS Junior Receives Excellence in Student Journalism Award

In celebration of excellence and innovation in student journalism, the prestigious Brodsky Prize has announced its 2025 winners, spotlighting the state's most promising high school journalists.

Kelsey Sweet, a junior at Londonderry High School, received the first-place award earning the \$5,000 prize. The judges noted her clear, well-sourced writing showed initiative and journalistic curiosity that stood out in a com-

petitive field, which showcased the future of New Hampshire's journalistic talent.

The Brodsky Prize was established in 2018 by father and son, Howard and Jeffrey Brodsky. Jeffrey served as co-editor of his high school newspaper, The Little Green, at Manchester Central High School during the 1990s. His vision for the Prize was to foster "boldness and innovation" among a new generation of student journalists.

"I am truly blessed to be a small part of the mission that Mr. Brodsky and Jeffrey created," Sweet said. "I will be a senior next year at Londonderry, and my plan is to major in journalism in college. Although I never got a chance to meet Jeffrey, I will con-

tinue to read his works and let them inspire me on my own journalism path."

Josefina Eliessetch, a junior from Kearsarge Regional High School, received second place with a \$1,000 award, and Eleanor Rioux, a senior from Manchester Central High School, came in third place and received a \$500 award.

Since its inception, the Prize has awarded more than \$70,000 to outstanding high school journalists. Jeffrey's own background in student journalism, political science, and oral history, with degrees from Washington University and Columbia University, fueled a storied career as a historian and documentary producer. Prior to his death in 2023, and despite a long and chal-

lenging illness, Jeffrey's commitment to The Brodsky Prize remained unwavering.

Serving as judges were: Howard Brodsky, co-founder of CCA Global Partners; Misbah Tahir, biotechnology finance executive and former Little Green co-editor with Jeffrey; Leah Todd Lin, New Hampshire Public Radio's vice president for audience strategy; Joseph McQuaid, former Union Leader and NH Sunday News president and publisher, and Susan Geier, executive director of the Nackey S. Loeb School of Communications.

Salt Runoff Concerns Cited for Wentworth Warehouse Plan

The Conservation Commission met on May 27 to hear a presentation from Jason Lopez of Keach-Nordstrom Associates on his submission for a 42,000-square-foot warehouse on Wentworth Avenue.

“It’s for the storage of textile products manufactured by a company here in Londonderry,” explained Lopez. “This lot was created as part of the ecological industrial park back in 2000, and there was a site plan for a 61,200 square foot warehouse approved back in 2001.”

That plan stalled in 2007. Despite an attempt to revise the original design, it was eventually discovered

that the stormwater ponds did not comply with updated regulations, most notably the requirement for a larger wetland buffer zone.

“Much of the work that was in compliance with zoning at the time in 2001,” he said. “The property itself is 13.7 acres and includes about 2.6 acres of wetlands. The proposal does not include any impact to wetlands, but does impact the buffer.”

The 2025 Wentworth warehouse proposal included a complete redesign, with a smaller building to better comply with state and local regulations.

Looking through the design, members of the Conservation Commission had a few questions.

“Where is the old pond compared to where you have the new one? Is it exactly centered?” asked alternate Mike Speltz, who wanted to minimize any overlap with the wetland buffer. “Do you have the ability to move the building a little bit to the east?”

According to Lopez, one of the new detention ponds would effectively be an expansion of the old pond. The plan included a second pond to handle more runoff.

“If we go further to the east with the building, we’ve got parking that will start encroaching on another wetland,” he said. “There’s another area that sits up much higher than the rest of the site that the applicant is looking to reserve for

a smaller building later on.”

Any later addition to the property would require separate approval by the town.

“What happens to the salt? Does it just dissolve and disappear?” asked Chair Marge Badois, who noticed the closed drainage system and the likely need for snow removal equipment in the winter. “I this believe feeds into Watts Brook and the wetlands surrounding this.”

Lopez conceded that salt would be an issue since dissolved salt does not disappear. He did not have a straightforward plan to manage salt runoff but indicated that the final draft would need to include salt reduction training. Grading would direct runoff from

paved areas into collection ponds. Recently, town officials have required input from Green SnowPro-certified contractors on major projects to limit salt contamination. He called a full-scale runoff treatment system “cost prohibitive.”

“The thing is, you inherited a non-compliant situation, and now you’re making it worse,” said Speltz, who appeared skeptical about the salt issue. “It seems like it’s an economic advantage to have the entrance encroach on the buffer to the south when there’s plenty of room to move it north.”

Challenging the assertion that the new warehouse design

would seriously impact the surrounding watershed, Lopez stated that the “proposed layout is the most compact layout for this style of project by reducing the total area of impact and limiting the area of impervious surfaces.” He reiterated that moving anything would limit future development, and could impact a nearby utility easement.

“The current proposal is not an economic advantage, to proper for site development,” he claimed.

The Londonderry Conservation Commission is scheduled to meet again on Tuesday, June 24 at 7:30 p.m. in the Moose Hill Council Chambers.

School Board Briefed on a Number of Summer Projects

At the most recent School Board meeting an agenda item regarding an overview of the different planned district-wide projects for the Summer 2025.

One of those projects is for the roof replacement at the North School lobby and office area for a total of \$63,550. This project includes repairing and replacing the roof with a rubber membrane, and this project will be funded by the Buildings and Grounds Capital Reserve

Fund.

Another project will be an HVAC replacement for the Londonderry Middle School Office for a total of \$66,500. The work will include installing a new AC system in the Middle School office area and will be funded with the Buildings and Grounds Capital Reserve Fund.

Another HVAC replacement project will be for the Londonderry High School weight room, for a total of \$54,000. The work will include installing a new AC system in the high

school gym weight room and will be funded by the Buildings and Grounds Capital Reserve Fund.

At South School, there will be a \$28,740 project to replace the bathroom floor, which will include replacing existing bathroom flooring with epoxy flooring and will be funded by the Buildings and Grounds Capital Reserve Fund.

At North School, there will be a \$17,650 project for the fire alarm system upgrades, which will include replacing pull stations, smoke

detectors, and strobes.

Security/safety upgrades for a total of \$100,193 will be taking place throughout the district, which will include emergency lighting upgrades, security system/keypad updates/data racks.

Also during the meeting, the School Board was presented with a proposal for a paving project.

"Some safety concerns surrounding paved areas in (the) main entrance of LHS and the back pathway leading to the LHS Press Box have

emerged, and buildings and grounds believe these areas should be addressed this June," Director of Buildings and Grounds Joe Parzych wrote in a memo to the School Board. "We posted an RFP for the paving work on May 20, 2025 and accepted proposals through May, 27, 2025."

The bids ranged between \$49,408 and \$100,030 as the highest bid.

It was noted that they were looking to award the bid to the lowest bidder.

"We are recommending Petra get the job, and they can also accommodate getting it done in FY25. We would use funds from the FY25 General Fund to cover the project," Parzych wrote in a memo to the School Board.

The School Board unanimously approved awarding the bid to the low bidder for the amount of \$49,408.

The next Londonderry School Board meeting is slated to take place on June 17 beginning at 7 p.m.




summer," Small said.

Small also stated they would likely have a couple of meetings during the summer.

"We envision two to three meetings this summer," Small said.

Small said as part of the meetings it would include making a list of roles, projects, timelines, materials, among other things.

She explained that they suggested the following committee members but they would be open to other suggestions:

- Superintendent
- Asst Superintendent
- Business Administrator
- B&G Director
- Athletic Director
- Music Director
- 1-2 Board Members

"We also believe we'd need about \$5,000 to fund annual marketing materials that could include infographics, forms, folders, videos, etc," Small said. "Additionally, we would look into pursuing a database for managing alumni information during the budget process. We believe this charge could ease the burden for taxpayers."

School Board Chair Bob Slater said that he

thinks the group should get together and also find two to three business people and or community members to help them.

"I think having some local business people who would like to see the investments in the schools may help us in that world than just educators," Slater said.

School Board member Amanda Butcher suggested they have it on a rotation so each board member can be involved in some way.

Slater said it made sense noting that they

could have one main board member serve on the Committee and then have it on a rotation for the second spot.

It was suggested that they have their first meeting for the Committee right before their next school board meeting, which was agreed on.

Also during the meeting, Superintendent Dan Black gave an update on cell phone usage at the high school, following its policy that was passed earlier this year.







The Londonderry High School Baseball team's bid for another DI Championship ended last week with a overwhelming win and a close loss, ending their post-season endeavors.

The number three seeded Lancers quickly disposed of the Concord Crimson Tide with a lopsided 11-0 win in the first round, but upset by the number 11 seeded Salem Blue Devils 2-3 in the quarterfinal over the weekend.

In the win over Concord, on Thursday June 5, the game was pretty much decided in the first two innings, with LHS scoring seven in the first and two in the second.

Londonderry had four singles, two walks and a batter hit in the first, leading to seven quick runs including three plays at the plate.


