

She referred to a growth map in Londonderry, noting the town saw population growth beyond what was envisioned in the 2013 plan.

"There are many changes with growth in the Manchester Airport area, there are changes in housing costs and availability, housing costs, population shifts, the list can go on and on," said Von Aulock, focusing on the massive level of development around the airport and the price of buying a new home.

There were fewer households with children and more households with residents 65 or older and those living with disabilities. She asked Committee members to brainstorm what had changed for them personally over the past decade. There were a few different reactions to this

"Water is coming down to where I live,'

said Committee member and Town Councilor Shawn Faber, referring to the ongoing expansion of the Londonderry municipal water system. "From the commut-

ability to get around town and the time it takes has probably doubled," said Vice-Chair Jake Butler.

Other issues mentioned were a lack of younger residents in many neighborhoods said. "The last Master and the increased likeli-Plan was created in hood of working from

"Probably the biggest change is the loss of 'folksiness' the town used to have," added Planning Board Chair Art Rugg, who spoke from the audience. "People are doing more things now."

As a 41-year Londonderry resident, Rugg also lamented the loss of much of the farmland in town and the loss, especially over the past ten years.

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Editorial **Prepare to Vote**

Election Day is March 14th. In the days between now and then. we hope you'll listen to candidates speak, read their words and ask them about the issues that concern you.

The March election has no state or national candidates, and that's traditionally bad news for voter turnout. However, we remind you that your vote has far more impact on local government races than it ever will on the state or federal level.

Equally important are the warrant articles on both the town and school ballots whether it's the school budget or a request for a something like funding for other things. Town and school requests should be handled the way you handle your checkbook; can you afford it? Is it a necessity or a luxury? Is it something you can put off, or is that a false economy that will cost much more later on?

If you don't understand what you're being asked to approve, seek the answer. The right to vote is important, but it carries with it the responsibility of understanding the issues. It shouldn't sway your vote that the budget committee or your neighbor favors or dislikes a warrant article or candidate.

There are also needs versus wants on many ballots. Choose wisely.

Warrant articles were reviewed and have been written about for several weeks in this paper. Here are a few pointers: On a bond, pay attention to the financial obligation imposed for each year of the bond. The money will come out of your pocket for the life of the bond.

How about a union contract? If it covers just one year, its costs are likely to be clear. But most contracts are for two to four years. Make sure you understand the costs attached to each additional year. You won't be asked to vote on it in future years, but the money will be added to the overall budget and will be part of your tax bill.

Money isn't everything. Are workers paying more of their insurance these days? Get the full picture. Because the choice is yours, each article has pros and cons, and it pays to listen to both sides.

Many people like to pride themselves on their patriotism. There's not a much better way to express your patriotism than by heading to the polls and making informed choices.

So for your own good and the good of the community, please vote March 14th.

We Must Support Ukraine

To the editor, On Dec. 5, 1994 Ukraine signed an agreement wherein it would dispose of its nuclear weapons, which were

challenges of running a nuclear arsenal, for a guarantee by the U.S., UK and Russia to provide Ukraine's security. Ukraine relinquished its nuclear weapons to Russia. Subsequently, Russia attacked Ukraine in 2014 and occupied Crimea.

In 2022 Russia attacked again and now occupies eastern provinces of Ukraine.

The U.S., should continue providing military equipment and supplies to Ukraine to belatedly comply with the security agreement we signed in 1994.

Maybe we should provide loans to Ukraine instead of grants of funds and equipment, or have Ukraine repay us with their abundant supply of rare earth minerals which we need. We are negotiating with Ukraine on this matter.

Unfortunately, Secretary of Defense Hegseth unwittingly significantly set back peace negotiations when he said Ukraine cannot go back to its pre 2014 borders, which relinquishes the Crimea and land in eastern Ukraine to Russia. He also said it is unrealistic for Ukraine to join NATO, and Europe must take on a greater role in its security. This is a capitulation to Russia before negotiations even start, and it could increase Russian threats to Europe.

Speltz also wanted to know how the builders would define the limit of disturbance to keep construction away from the 50-foot buffer zone around the nearby wetlands.

"Let me clarify, the wetland that's to our south would have the 50-foot buffer, but we're outside of it. In that case, we'll place Conservation Overlay District markings at our limits of

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close proximity," said Golan.

He noted there were a few smaller wetlands in the area, but none of them were big enough to legally require a buffer zone.

Commissioners always wanted developers to consider alternative parking arrangements like a vanpool or a shuttle bus between apartment buildings and industrial buildings. There was some concern over what they saw as a large area dedicated to parking with the goal of reducing the overall impervious footprint of the PUD.

Golan promised to pass the request to reduce parking to the Technology Hill ownership team.

The Conservation Commission is scheduled to meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of every month, at 7:30 p.m. in the Moose Hill Council Chambers.

from inside the locker, who was also working out at the gym, and he was unaware the incident had even taken place, but ran into her location.

During questioning after the incident, Plaza said workers told police the shooter was an employee from the gym that had gotten into an argument with another employee one day earlier.

She said even before the shooting, while she was working out, she noticed an argument outside the entrance of the center.

The shot was fired in the employee room of the facility, but no one was hit by the shot.

According to Plaza the incident happened at 4:57 p.m. and it wasn't long before local police were at the scene.

During the encounter, gunshots were fired between Ly-Bishop and three Londonderry Police officers. Ly-Bishop was struck by gunfire, and despite medical intervention, was pronounced deceased on scene.

Chief Medical Examiner Dr. Jennie V. Duval conducted an autopsy on Ly-Bishop wher it was determined that Mr. Ly-Bishop's cause of death was gunshots wounds of the chest, and that the manner of his death was homicide. As used by the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, homicide is defined as the killing of one person by another.


OBITUARY Joanne M. (Talaschuk) Fournier

spend unassigned fund school district was notified by our phone vendor that our phone system was no longer going to be supported as of March of

2026. We then met with a couple of phone vendors to inform us of the state of phone technologies and to help us determine our course of action," IT **Director Brandon Weinert** wrote in a memo to the School Board.

Weinert explained that in October, the District released a request for proposals to replace the " existing phone system for all locations."

"This includes phone hardware, cabling, network switching hardware, licensing. and We received bids from 5 companies," Weinert wrote. "We reviewed those bids to determine what best fit our needs and then invited 2 vendors to meet with us. The vendors came in separately to further discuss their solutions and to tour all our locations. They then revised their bids based on a more accurate assessment of our environment and needs. We also followed

up by having discussions with school districts that were given as references."

During the public hearing, it was explained that the bid from Telephone & Network Technologies was \$331.936.65. which was more than the other bid from Granite which was \$242,519.76.

"The 2 solutions are not equal in comparison," Weinert said.

One of the differences for Vendor Telephone & Network Technologies is that it is a five-year licensing agreement versus one year for Granite. The higher bidder would also include new cabling for all locations except the District Office, while Granite would be new cabling for all locations except for Moose Hill School and the District Office.

It was also noted that for Telephone & Network Technologies they would have failover PBX at each of the seven locations.

"If any of the phones cannot reach the clouded system for any reason, the onsite IP phones will connect to the onsite failover PBX, so any location can still use the extension to extension dialing for internal communications and each location can also access the PA/intercom system from any phone if announcements need to be made," the memo stated.


It was noted by Weinert that if they want to be able to have it done and in place by the start of the school year they need to have it started by next week.

School Board Chair Bob Slater said he appreciated them looking into the bids further. "I appreciate you doing due diligence," Slater said.

The School Board ultimately selected Telephone & Network Technologies to be awarded the contract.

proof of one or more of qualifications, those potential voters could sign a legal affidavit swearing and affirming the information. That exception no longer exists. If you do not bring the proof with you, you will be unable to register to vote at that time.

Additionally, there was an opportunity at the polls to get your picture taken and sign an affidavit if you forgot your ID. That exception is also gone and failure to bring an acceptable photo ID will result in you being turned away at the polls." The law is HB 1569 – Laws of 2024, Chapter 378 -Relative to Eliminating Voter Identification Exceptions.

Until now, without to complete affidavits as an alternative means of proving their qualifications as a voter. If an applicant does not provide acceptable documentary proof of identity, age, United States citizenship, and/or domicile, they are not eligible to be registered to vote. You can vote in local, state, and Federal elections in New Hampshire if you are: A United States citizen; At least 18 years old on election day; A New Hampshire resident (Your primary residence, domicile, is in NH).

If you have recently moved to NH, you can register as soon as you establish your primary residence here. Here are some examples of documents that applicants for voter registration The law no longer can bring to the town the listed

checklist when they wish to Register to vote.


