Utilities Committee Analyzes Proposed Electric Rate Hike

At its latest meeting, the Londonderry Utilities Committee discussed the rationale behind Eversource's proposed rate hike. According to the electric company's report, at least part of the rate hike was tied to infrastructure maintenance.

Statewide, they have 124 substations, they have over 12,000 overhead lines they have to maintain and keep up, and there are underground lines of 2,000. And you know the little transformers you see on the poles, they have to maintain over 170,000 of those,"

explained member Paul Ramsey. "I looked through their testimony, and a lot of their normal costs, like daily payroll and all of that, were, in 2024, very comparable to about four years ago. Those kinds of costs have kept fairly constant, to my surprise, but one of the big areas

Planning Board Debates Town Role in Wilson Road Upgrade

The Planning Board met on May 14 to review a number of matter matters but the majority of the meeting focused on a formal application for a subdivision at 23 Wilson Road, submitted by Douglas and Maria Jones and represented by Charlie Evans of the Evans Family Limited Partnership. The project proposes the construction of eight residential lots and includes major upgrades to Wilson Road, a one-way street long considered substandard.

Evans presented a plan that includes full-

depth reclamation and repaving of the 1,700-foot road segment, widening the travel surface to 20 feet, and regrading a sharp curve to improve safety. Two new culverts and additional catch basins were added to address drainage concerns raised in earlier meetings. An expanded easement was also proposed to allow for future road realignment if needed.

Evans asked the town to assume financial responsibility for the final top layer of pavement after the development is complete. "It became apparent that overlaying is a pretty poor band-aid...We're

giving the town probably about a \$400,000 gift in the work we're proposing," Evans told the board. "So we don't think it's unreasonable to ask the town to be a minority partner and pitch in for the finish coat and if they want to do the other side of the road they can do that at there leasier."

While board members generally agreed the road would be significantly improved by the developer's work, some raised concerns about the long-term implications of accepting an unfinished road.

Board member Jason Knights pointed out,

Petition Removal from Leach Library Challenged by Residents

The Leach Library Board of Trustees met on May 7 with public questions regarding the removal of a petition from the library.

The petition aimed to rally support for continued federal funding of the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), the primary source of federal aid to libraries across the country. Concerns about IMLS funding arose after a March executive order by President Trump directed the agency's elimination, prompting a

suspension of grants and the placement of staff on administrative leave. In New Hampshire, IMLS funding supports a number of services through the State Library, including interlibrary loan systems, access to statewide databases, digital media platforms, and support for small and rural libraries.

"In April's meeting there were a few different discussions around the petition put upstairs in the library on a desk as well as a letter to the editor that was put forward by library staff,"

said resident Paul Skudlarek, who noted that both the petition and the letter led to accusations of partisanship from the library staff. "It was voted yes to place the petition, it was put on the desk, and I think maybe the next day or the day after, it was

Senior Resources Committee Looks to Improve Public Outreach

The Londonderry Senior Resources Committee met on May 6 to discuss upcoming events and how to enhance public outreach, particularly in connection with Old Home Day.

“We need to talk about setting up a tent for that and getting volunteers,” said Committee member Elizabeth Robertson. “We can’t go in the parade because we can’t get a trolley - it’s already rented out by somebody else for a wedding. I’m not going to make the seniors walk.”

Despite several limitations, one member suggested securing a golf cart, allowing the committee to participate in the parade in a smaller capacity. Old Home Day was seen as a key opportunity to raise awareness for the committee’s activities.

“Every year, we get better and better as more people become aware of us. It’s all about awareness,” said Police Department Liaison Patrick Cheetham. Community outreach and awareness are still our number one challenge. People weren’t aware we existed, and they didn’t know these resources were avail-

able. Everyone knows about the Senior Center - I think - it’s been around a long time, and we’ve done a great job in that area.”

Cheetham also proposed expanding outreach beyond Old Home Day, including promoting the Senior Expo and attending summer events.

“I go down to The Baldwin once a month to establish a relationship with their events director. They are building, building, building. They’ve got a vacant building they’re starting to fill now. The number one fastest-growing demographic in our community is our seniors,”

he said. “I know the Concert on the Common - plenty of seniors attend those.”

He suggested making a banner and setting up a table for the Concert at the Commons and other local events.

“I’d be happy to - if we can just come up with a flyer - to go out with a stack of them. I’ll even print them and just say to a property manager, ‘Hey, can you give these to your residents?’” said Committee member Valerie Brauer, who emphasized the need to reach out to senior housing facilities like The Baldwin. “I love people, and I love getting out

there. I wouldn’t mind finally having places to go so I could drop off flyers to residents.”

She added that distributing flyers by hand would be more cost-effective than mailing them.

The committee also agreed to continue collaborating with the Senior Center and Leach Library. Library Director Erin Matlin expressed her willingness to help where possible.

Following two meetings without a quorum, the committee discussed ways to improve attendance. They ultimately agreed to keep their earlier meeting

time, despite concern from Committee member John Wilson that afternoon meetings might conflict with work hours.

“We will be the only committee in town that doesn’t meet after working hours,” Wilson noted.

Others disagreed, with Town Council Liaison Dan Bouchard pointing out that evening meetings can be more difficult, especially in winter. “It’s harder for people to get out here,” he said.

The next meeting of the Senior Resources Committee is scheduled for Tuesday, June 3, at 2 p.m. in the Sunnycrest Conference Room.

He questioned the removal of the petition without a formal Board vote, as the Trustee Chair, Liz Thomas, made her decision after an over-the-phone roll call. She agreed that action was inappropriate.

“I will be more cautious about not doing that in the future,” said Thomas, who abstained from the original petition vote. “When I looked at the petition, I felt that the wording of it was seditious, that we were going against the government kind of thing.”

She also conceded that the Trustees should not have called for a

vote on the issue when they did.

“We should not have called for a vote if we weren’t ready,” said Thomas. “In the future, I can guarantee that before we vote on anything, we’ll have full knowledge and will feel comfortable voting on it.”

Several residents called the Chair requesting its removal, and two

Trustees abstained from the original vote to approve placing the petition in the library.

“I ask anybody to look at this petition and the letter to the editor, there’s nothing political about it,” argued Skudlarek. “All it did was explain what was happening and what effect it might have on the library locally.”

He asked the Trustees to “be more vigilant” on how they should respond to similar situations and stated that opponents to the petition also acted inappropriately.

Speaking as a resident, State Representative Kristine Perez, who initially pushed for the petition’s removal, denied harassing anyone following concerns from

other residents.

“I didn’t harass anybody, I went to see if it was removed, I went and asked at the front desk if there is a petition,” she said, calling accusations of harassment “inflammatory.”

Other residents called for greater transparency from the Board of Trustees, an issue that has come up before.

“I think it’s very important to keep our roles and responsibilities clear,” said resident Anne Fenn. “If a vote is taken, a vote is taken. If you want another vote because somebody wasn’t there, you call another meeting and you call another vote.”

Resident John Farrell agreed, calling the Trustees’ over-the-phone vote

“an illegal meeting.”

“When you have a meeting, you have to post that meeting, the public has to know about it, place it on your agenda at some point,” he said. “I know you’re learning, but you just can’t do things like that.”

According to Assistant Director Donna Plante, while the petition should not have been removed, the date to submit the petition had already passed.

“Even if we collect the signatures, we don’t have a place to send them the way it was organized,” she said.

As the issue was considered moot, it was unlikely the original petition would be returned to the library, despite the initial vote.

School Board Approves Capital Reserves Withdrawals

The Londonderry School Board was presented with several requests to withdraw funds from various capital reserve accounts during its most recent meeting.

“Attached are requests to withdraw funds from the Buildings & Grounds [\$415,700.37], the District Information Technology Network Infrastructure Equipment [\$151,850.96], and the Equipment Capital Reserve [\$123,857.24] funds,”

a memo to the School Board stated.

The purpose of the Buildings and Grounds Capital Reserve Fund, officials explained, is “to cover the costs of large renovations and construction for buildings and district grounds.”

The withdrawal request covers the cost of roof repairs at North School, the Matthew Thornton HW system, fire alarm work at both South and Middle Schools, as well as field improvements and playground work at South School.

“The appropriation for FY25 was for \$220,000, and along with a carryover balance of \$398,007.87, we have expended \$415,700.37, leaving a balance of \$202,307.50 in this fund,” the memo stated.

Another request was made for the District Information Technology Infrastructure Fund.

“This fund was established to cover the costs of the District’s network infrastructure and any equipment attached to the network,” the memo stated. “These

funds were approved for continuing costs for network improvements.”

The appropriation for FY25 was \$125,000.

“And along with a carryover balance of \$106,207.71, we have expended \$151,850.96, leaving a balance of \$79,356.75,” the memo stated.

In addition, there was a withdrawal request from the Equipment Capital Reserve Fund totaling \$123,857.24.

“This request includes classroom furniture, musical and athletic

equipment, and some buildings and grounds equipment,” the memo said. “The appropriation for FY25 was approved for \$120,000, and along with a carryover balance of \$44,104.20, we have expended \$123,857.24, leaving a balance of \$40,246.96.”

The School Board unanimously approved all withdrawal requests during the meeting.

In addition, the Board accepted several retirements and resignations.

Retirements included Laurie Britting, Support

Staff at Londonderry Middle School; James Burns, Custodian at Londonderry Middle School; and Donna Stahl, Benefits Coordinator for the District Office.

Resignations included Sornaya DeLong, Support Staff at Londonderry High School; Mandy Height, Teacher at South School; and Marisa Pope, Teacher at Londonderry High School.

The next School Board meeting is set for June 3, at 7 p.m.

they’ve spent a lot of money on is restoring power outages.”

Eversource’s testimony for 2023 revealed that the company spent \$179 million to restore power across the state.

“A lot of workers with state trucks are put up in hotels; they’re on standby 24/7,” said Committee member John Ferreira. “It’s why I’m so in favor of underground work.”

While there was a push to move more electrical infrastructure underground, it was considered prohibitively expensive in the short-to-medium term. All rate increases must be approved by the NH Public Utilities Commission (PUC).

“I know a lot of the

players on that commission, they are very well qualified to look at this data, to analyze it, and to see if it’s reasonable or not,” said Ramsey. “Power outages were a big deal, but the other was the capital infrastructure.”

Last year, Eversource put around \$200 million toward updating and expanding its system. Other factors included technology upgrades and

vegetation management.

“Over the course of the last five years, there’s been an enormous amount of work done on the lines of Londonderry converting wood to steel,” said Committee member Mike Speltz, who was referring to the utility pole replacement projects. “It’s proof here that they are spending money.”

It was unclear how

state or federal grant money played a role in the wood-to-steel conversion projects. Alternate Ray Breslin argued that Eversource had “a lot of federal money” to help fund upgrades. Breslin inquired more about how reliant Eversource was on ratepayers for infrastructure work.

“The cost of every-

thing is going up, let’s face it, and the utility company, Eversource, is certainly providing a vital service, and we certainly appreciate that, and they’re also a company that is entitled to make a profit, but sometimes we need to know the justification for a rate hike,” said Breslin. “The fixed monthly customer charge they’re proposing

to increase by 43%. That means it doesn’t make a difference on how much electricity you use, that’s irrelevant, this is a different cost.”

Separate supply-side rate changes are expected later in the year. Committee members agreed to remain active in the rate-change process with the PUC.


bravery of our military and make Memorial Day a day of remembrance.

Middle School Sees Fewer Opt-Outs for State Testing

Londonderry Assistant Superintendent Jason Parent briefed the School Board on participation rates for the recent round of state testing at the Middle School.

He said they were “very proud of the Middle School’s effort to increase participation rates.”

Parent noted that last year, 111 students opted out of taking the state assessment. This year, that number dropped significantly, with only 11 students opting out.

He also noted they are looking forward to reviewing and sharing the results in the near future.

“We’re looking for-

ward to seeing some positive results, which I will share in the summer,” Parent said.

To help reduce the opt-out rate, the district focused on communicating the importance of the assessments to families.

“I think we did a better job communicating the value of the assessment,” Parent said.

He added that families were no longer able to opt out online and instead had to visit the school office in person to discuss the process.

“We kind of took some steps to really educate our families,” Parent said.

Another agenda item during the meeting was the final reading of a pro-

posed policy regarding staff internet access.

“The School Board recognizes that technological resources can enhance teacher performance by offering effective tools to assist in providing a quality instructional program, facilitating communications with parents/guardians, teachers, and the community, supporting District and school operations, and improving access to and exchange of information. The Board expects all staff to learn to use the available technological resources that will assist them in the performance of their education,” the policy states. “As needed, staff shall receive training, les-

sons, and instruction in the appropriate use of these resources.”

The policy also outlines expectations for responsible use.

“Staff shall be responsible for the appropriate use of technology and shall use the District’s technological resources primarily for purposes related to their education. Staff are hereby notified that there is no expectation of privacy on district computers, computer files, email, internet usage logs, and other electronic data.”

The policy includes specific measures for internet filtering and monitoring.

“The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all District comput-

ers with Internet access have a technology protection measure that prevents access to visual depictions that are obscene or pornographic and that the operation of such measures is enforced,” it states. “The Superintendent or designee may disable the technology protection measure during use by an adult to enable access for bona fide research, educational, or other lawful purpose.”

Additionally, the policy states that, “The Superintendent shall establish administrative regulations and an Acceptable Use Agreement that outlines staff obligations and responsibilities related to the use of District technology. He/she

also may establish guidelines and limits on the use of technological resources. Inappropriate use may result in a cancellation of the staff member’s user privileges, disciplinary action, and/or legal action in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulations.”

“The Superintendent or designee shall provide copies of related policies, regulations, and guidelines to all staff. Staff shall be required to acknowledge in writing that they have read and understood the District’s Acceptable Use Agreement,” the policy states.

The School Board unanimously approved the policy during the meeting.

“When we grind it, whatever’s there, we’re going to put asphalt on top of it. Whereas, if you were doing a true road pro-

ject, you would dig that down. You would see what you have for a base layer to make sure it will support and not crack in in one, two, three, five years before the town and the taxpayers then put a top coat on top of

it. But it’s going to fail because you don’t have a good foundation.”

The board then discussed whether the revised plans required third-party engineering review. Planning staff advised that only the updated drainage design had not yet been reviewed, and several members emphasized the importance of an external review before

final approval. “It’s light years better than what we have... but it’s a big engineering project that, in my opinion, needs to get reviewed by the people we pay to review this,” said Jason Knight.

Ultimately, at the Planning Board meeting, the board voted to grant conditional approval, pending third-party review of the drainage plans and submission of

a finalized list of waivers.

The application is expected to return to the board following review and resubmission.

At the Monday night May 19 Town Council meeting, new council member Dan Bouchard raised concerns about the Planning Board’s recent conditional approval of the Wilson Road subdivision.

Bouchard asserted that the developer would only be repaving the road with a base layer, leaving the town responsible for the final top coat, which he said had been estimated during the Planning Board meeting at between \$60,000 and \$65,000.

Bouchard said, “The Planning Board has hooked the town for the top for \$65,000,” and urged the Town Council to address the matter. He acknowledged that no monetary cost was formally included in the approval and was unsure of the actual cost number, but stressed that “there is a cost to the taxpayers to put that top on.”

Assistant Town Manager clarified at the meeting that Wilson Road is a town road, which the town is responsible for maintaining and that there wasn’t a dollar amount set for the conditional approval of the Planning Board.

Town Manager Holds Meet-and-Greet in Preparation for June 2 Start

At the May meeting, the Londonderry Utilities Committee heard from Administrative Support Coordinator Kirsten Hildonen, who announced a public meetup with incoming Town Manager Shaun Mulholland. Mulholland is expected to begin working at Town Hall full-time starting June 2.

"Shaun is definitely hitting the ground running. We're really excited to have him, and I know he's really excited

to meet everybody here," said Hildonen. "We have a 'Meet the Town Manager' on May 27. There's a session in the morning from 9 - 11 a.m., and in the evening from 6:30 - 8:30 p.m."

She described the event as an "informal meet-and-greet" to be held in the Police Station Community Room.

"I encourage anybody who's around that date to swing by, meet with him, chat with him, and introduce yourself," said Hildonen. "I think he's going to bring a really

valuable and unique perspective to our conversations on infrastructure."

Mulholland's leadership is expected to influence how the Utilities Committee and the town proceed with several ongoing projects and proposals, including the addition of a water main under High Range Road.

"The High Range Road water main is still on target - it's chugging along," reported Hildonen. "The environmental review came back with a

finding of no significant impact. There's a long-eared bat habitat that overlaps. It's now into the public comment period with NH DES, the equipment has been ordered, everything is moving along well, construction has been ordered, and it'll start as soon as that public comment period ends."

While the project must meet federal requirements, it does not use federal grant funding.

Hildonen also announced the development of a new communication portal designed

to enhance coordination between various boards and committees.

"We're looking at trying to create an asynchronous communication portal using our Microsoft 365 tools for you all, so you can have to-do lists and a repository of documents," she explained. "We have a little bit of legwork to set that up, but as soon as it's set up, you guys will get to be the fun pilot for the portal as we try to incorporate more of these 365 tools we paid for and subscribe for. We want to use those to enrich our communications and make all of your lives easier."

The long-term goal is to digitize more documents and store them in a centralized location,

allowing officials to access needed files more efficiently.

"That will allow us to add value with the reams of data that we collect and the stacks and stacks of paper we generate," said Committee member Jeff McGraw, who argued that having all the files in a digital database would be more efficient than the current system.

Hildonen confirmed that any new processes would remain compliant with NH's right-to-know law, also known as 91-A.

"It's going to aid us in our transparency, and it's going to help you monitor your work in compliance with 91-A," she promised. "We're working this through in a very methodical way."

Concerts on the Common Begins June 4

Organizers of the annual Londonderry Concerts on the Common series attended the May 5 Town Council meeting to provide an update on this year's season.

"They're coming up shortly," Stephen Lee, who co-organizes the event with his wife, said during the meeting.

He said the first show will take place on June 4, from 7 to 8:30 p.m., with the Londonderry High School Jazz Ensembles and Orchestra kicking off the action, as they traditionally do.

"This is our 23rd season," Lee said, explaining that the series is supported by various community

organizations, the Town, and volunteers.

He emphasized that the goal is to offer residents the opportunity to enjoy a free concert, listen to live music, and have a picnic-style evening - something that may otherwise be financially out of reach for some community members.

Lee explained that the average ticket price for the types of groups that perform is approximately \$29.

"I think it adds a lot of value to the town of Londonderry," Lee said.

The second concert

of the season will feature Couch on June 11. Lee noted he has family flying in from St. Paul, MN, to attend the show.

On June 18, The Linda Ronstadt Experience will perform. East Coast Soul takes the stage on June 25. For the holiday weekend, Cool Cool will perform on July 2. On July 9, the Bruce Marshall Group will take the stage.

As in previous years, a children's concert will be held in partnership with the Leach Library. This year's kids concert is scheduled for July 12 from 2 to 3 p.m., featuring Steve Blunt and Friends.

"We're trying to get a time that's more appropriate for them," Lee

said.

The season continues with the Brian Maes Band on July 16, Chicago Total Access on July 23, and Delta Generators on July 30.

Martin and Kelly will perform on August 6, followed by the Studio Two Beatles Tribute Band on Aug. 13.

Lee noted that the organizers primarily share updates through their Facebook and Instagram pages.

In the case of inclement weather, performances may be moved inside to the Londonderry High School cafeteria.


