Traffic Safety Debate Methods to Improve Difficult Intersections

Londonderry's Traffic Safety Committee met on Oct. 7 to discuss a recent call from State Senator, Sharon Carson, regarding a push to reduce the speed limit on Route 102 from 55 to 45 miles per hour.

In her call to the Committee, Senator Car-

son claimed she was waiting to get word back from the Department of Transportation Commission Cass on when and how signs on the highway will be changed over in the near future.

Christine and Robert Fitzgerald also hoped for action on the speed of southbound traffic on Parmenter Road, High

Range Road, and Rebecca Drive.

"I looked at it, and I did meet with the Fitzgerald's, explaining to them that the close proximity with their driveway to the intersection as well as the width of where Rebecca comes onto High Range Road, there would be nothing **continued on page 2**

School Board Rejects Full Day Kindergarten 2025-26 Proposal

In a 3-2 vote, the School Board voted to move forward with full-day kindergarten beginning in 2026-27 as long as the bond vote passes for the portable classrooms and district project.

During the Oct. 8 meeting, Superintendent, Dan Black, explained that based on the lower enrollment numbers projected for next year, they would be able to implement full-day kindergarten at North School and South School, while having Matthew Thornton students attend Moose Hill as early as next year.

"From what we can

see now, we think it's going to work," Black said.

At the same time, it is expected the School Board would send forward a warrant article for a bond project, which would add space to the elementary schools and allow the District to have full day kindergarten by utilizing Moose Hill for the District Office. Currently its expected the bond would be approximately \$8.5 million.

"I just think we should be focusing on the warrant article for the bond," School Board Chair, Bob Slater said during the meeting.

He explained that while he is in support of full-day kindergarten in Londonderry, he is con-

cerned with having any kind of budget presented to voters in March, which would include full-day kindergarten, saying he thinks they should get a positive vote on the bond first.

"I think we will get the 60% if we focus on the bond," Slater said.

Black, however, argued, they didn't need to make any decisions during the meeting, and instead were looking to be able to talk to the parents, to see if they have any questions and to get their feedback.

"I think it's really important to talk to the families of four-year olds," Black said.

He also explained **continued on page 3**

250 Cottage Style Rentals Proposed on Pillsbury Road

A conceptual plan for about 250 rental homes to be built in the Woodmont PUD was discussed at the Oct. 9 meeting of the Londonderry Planning Board meeting.

A number of waivers, amendments, and compliance alternatives were heard from Procopio Companies on a proposal set to be located at 36 Pillsbury Road. The site is currently one of Mack's Apples Orchards.

Attorney, Laura Gandia, from Manchester's Devine Millimet was at

the meeting with the project. The presentation focused on moving the next phase of the Woodmont Commons Planned Use Development forward, with some changes compared to an earlier proposal favoring village or cottage-style buildings.

"The PUD was developed to create regulations and establish a process that allows flexibility and phasing in the actual development plan. The PUD Master Plan developed a unique relationship between the PUD and the town's land use regulations." said

Gandia. "The PUD took the zoning ordinance, it added waivers some provisions of the zoning ordinance, and then it also provided modifications to certain provisions of the zoning ordinance."

Such developments typically allow similar flexibility when it comes

School District Enrollment Drops Below 4,000 Students

During the Tuesday night, Oct. 8, Londonderry School Board meeting, members were given an update regarding the decrease in overall school enrollment.

Superintendent, Dan Black, told the School Board that they have less students this year than they did last year.

“The net difference from this time last year is we have 68 less kids,” Black said.

In total, the District has 3,954 students, compared to last year when the District had 4,022 students.

Black explained that the amount was driven mostly because of a

smaller kindergarten size, combined with a larger class of high school graduates.

It was noted that the enrollment would be what is used for budgeting purposes and what is reported to the State for funding.

Also discussed at the Monday night meeting was the proposal for snow plowing contract for the upcoming year.

“The Londonderry School District contracts out some of the snow removal each winter season,” Business Administrator, Amity Small, wrote in a memo to the School Board. “This money is budgeted through a Buildings and Grounds budget line item in the General

Fund.”

She explained they put out the requests for proposals and posted them for two weeks.

“Unfortunately, we got only one bid proposed to us,” Small said.

Small added that they extended the RFP for another week, however, she said, “Still no more submissions came in.”

It was noted by Small that the one bid they received was for \$50,000 from Northern New England Excavation, LLC.

Small explained they have used the company in the past, and said, “We’re happy with it, we feel it’s fair.”

“We are recommending this contract be awarded to Northern New England Excava-

tion, LLC as they have had this contract for the past several years, and they are reliable, work well with our B&G department, and ensure their areas are cleared and safe for the opening of schools during inclement weather,” Small wrote in a memo to the School Board. “Additionally, time is of the essence as we need to have a contract in place

before winter weather patterns begin.”

Small noted they weren’t sure why they didn’t get any more bids for the snowplowing contract. The School Board unanimously approved the proposal.

The School Board also approved a number of resignations during the consent agenda portion of the meeting.

It included Debra Dia-

mond, a dining services employee at Londonderry Middle School, June Hickey, a support staff employee at Matthew Thornton, Pamela Hodson, a support staff employee at Moose Hill, Lyn Niskala, a dining services employee at Matthew Thornton, and Eleanor Peel, a support staff employee at Londonderry High School.

“You’ve got to look at the big picture: what is this going to cost? What is this going to do? Is this the right answer?” said Bernard. “We can’t control who comes here, we can’t control who goes through our community, but we can control the speed limit.”

While speed has been a focus, other factors related to accidents in town involved driver distraction and a failure to obey traffic signs, the last of which was a common complaint from many residents.

During public comments, Dave Barlow, who lives at the intersection of Perkins and Bartley Hill Roads spoke in favor of more signs in the area.

“There’s a tremendous amount of traffic that speeds through there now. There have been a tremendous amount of accidents at that intersection and I have asked before, I would like to see a stop sign at all three corners,” said Barlow, who noted

we could do immediately. However, I immediately recommended they do some sight distance improvements.” Said Director of Engineering and Environmental Services, John Trottier. “They saw and understood it.”

Speeding and accidents at problem intersections, including Mammoth Road, South Road, and Griffin Road have been a central focus for the Committee, although there were complaints from members over their lack of authority to make concrete changes in many cases. Not only does NHDOT have authority over state-funded roads, but Police Chief, Kim Bernard, noted that funding for factors, including new signs, further traffic studies, and enforcement would need to come from somewhere. He suggested slower speed limits as a factor the town might reasonably act on.

the emergency services often frequented Perkins to go uptown. “I’m just waiting to stand in my kitchen, to look out that window, and unfortunately see a police car, a fire truck, or an ambulance get t-boned by the blue-purple mustang who flies up that road at God only knows how many miles per hour.”

Currently, only the turn from Bartley Hill has a stop sign in what is a three-way intersection. There have been no known recent fatalities at the intersection over the past few decades, despite a number of accidents. Notably, Trottier disagreed, saying it did not believe using stop signs “as a traffic control device” would be effective. Bernard noted that drivers ignoring street signs had been an ongoing issue. Despite the disagreement, after extensive debate, the Traffic Committee eventually voted in favor of adding stop signs to the intersection.

to subdivisions. The hope was to expand the next stage of the Woodmont Development, with plans that might not always strictly conform to local

zoning laws. Gandia noted no plan would depart from Londonderry's overall "design principals," including the 36 Pillsbury Rd. proposal.

"We'll have approximately 250 rental single-family units assembled into eight clusters," she

said. "We're not doing one of the ideas from the PUD Master Plan, it's much more intense, we have a lot more greenspace, we have a lot more areas that are conserved, the house are clustered together as opposed to when we were here last

time with more of the cottage-court feel to it."

She favored the compliance alternate method for design approval, citing factors like walkability and a more "community feel," as the Planning Board might consider. The cottage-court design did not fit the performance standards Procopio wanted.

Town Manager, Mike Malaguti, generally agreed with the change proposed, saying there was no point in "trying to put a square peg in a round hole."

Board Secretary, Lynn Wiles, wanted to know the land conservation plan for the new design.

"There's quite a bit of open space, which I think is fantastic. How is that going to be pre-

served so that it won't be developed down the road?" asked Wiles. "As the discussion processes down the road, I'm going to be concern over how we protect that."

He was told much of the greenspace is already wetland Procopio cannot legally build on. Other areas were technically still under discussion, with the assurance that the developer did not want to increase housing density any further. A state goal of the project was to protect existing, abandoned apple trees on the land.

"There's a lot to unpack here," said Alternate, Tony DeFrancesco. "I think, for sure, we need some kind of letter or documentation from the developer saying

'yes, we're okay with this concept' or however it's worded, something from the developer."

He considered the new design "a huge change" from what the Planning Board had heard before and wondered if the Town Council should be consulted.

Despite several concerns over the new design, most Board members seemed to like the clustered apartment design, with member, Jason Knights, saying he appreciated the plan.

"One of the things we continually hear in town is more open space, everyone likes to drive by apple trees," he said. "All-in-all, I love this."

The Planning Board wanted to set more details as things develop.

that their idea to implement full-day kindergarten is based on passing a successful bond vote in March.

"No one over here said we're starting full-day kindergarten no matter what," Black said.

School Board member, Tim Porter, said he thinks they should get the bond passed first, and then move forward with kindergarten for

the fall of 2026.

"I think we need to do it methodically so it's not rushed," he said.

Black argued they didn't need to make any decision at this point.

"The ask tonight is to let us go talk to the four year old parents," Black said.

School Board Vice Chair, Sara Loughlin, added she was also concerned with implementing full-day kindergarten before the bond passes, saying she thinks there

will be added costs to the budget with having full day kindergarten.

School Board members, Kevin Gray and Amanda Butcher, both noted they thought they could wait before making any decisions.

Slater, Loughlin, and Porter all voted in support of implementing full-day kindergarten in 2026-27, pending the successful bond vote, with Gray and Butcher voting against it.

Editorial

As Election Day Nears

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 5, and we have the opportunity to vote for state, county, and federal officials. Those elected officials will be asked to make vitally important decisions that in many cases affect our daily lives.

Out-of-state money is flooding our mailboxes with fliers touting candidates. Seas of signs litter our beautiful landscape. Television ads range from bad to worse, and lies, misrepresentations and out of-context comments lead the way.

As it gets closer to Election Day, the ugliness is expected to get worse; making negative comments about a candidate is just in bad taste. Stick to the facts! It's hard for the average voter to pick through what's just not true and what is way out of context. Many candidates deliberately choose to speak in generalities rather than with facts. Which candidate is going to be in favor of raising taxes? It is hard to get a straightforward answer.

If you ask for details on how less government and lower taxes will be accomplished, and at what cost to specific services, few are willing to suggest an answer or acknowledge that one person alone cannot effect change.

We remind you that every candidate is going to smile broadly, shake as many hands as possible, and promise wonderful things. Their family members will say how perfect they are. Should their packaging persuade us?

About 50 years ago the only way to communicate was by phone, letter

and word of mouth. Now we have the Internet, social media, and the keyboard warriors, who hide behind their devices, complaining and attacking. It's far too easy to write something up on impulse, and slamming someone or something, what does this accomplish? Nothing! At election time people seem to go overboard banging away on their keyboards calling people names and finding all kinds of issues, sending off comment after comment into the digital sphere of conversation. All I can say is read twice send once.

So even if you've already made up your mind, consider your choice and your source. How would voting the party line benefit you? What about a candidate's willingness or ability to work with people of all political persuasions? If we had that in Congress, we'd be far more likely to have a better functioning government.

Your vote counts, but it means so much more if you cast it after making a studied, educated decision, not one based on inflammatory rhetoric, or physical appearance, or a bright smile, or a party label. All those will become nothing more substantial than a fading memory after the election.

Holding public office is a vital part of our democracy. No one is entitled to it. Public officials should have to earn our trust and respect before they get our vote. Think about that as Election Day approaches and you decide on your choices. And please, don't miss this opportunity to vote on Nov. 5.

Big Loss for Little Green Against Lancers at Gill Stadium

The Londonderry High School football team had a fairly easy time of dispatching of the Little Green in Manchester over the weekend. The defense allowed just one touchdown, while the offense had five trips to the endzone for a 34-6 victory.

This was the Lancers fourth win of the season, putting them at 4-1 in the Division I standings and at the top of the Central Division. Londonderry's closest rival, Pinkerton Academy dropped to 3-2 with their 25-28 loss to the Bedford

Bulldogs on Friday night and fell to fourth.

The Lancers scored touchdowns in three of the four quarters, getting two in the first two and adding one in the third.

Londonderry tallied 396-yards of offense and limited Central to 209-yards.

Senior quarterback, Sam Ogden, tallied 134-passing-yards in 16 attempts, while fellow QB Alexander Villa put up 22-passing-yards on one attempt.

Londonderry scored in their first possession of the game, getting into the endzone with just three plays.

Villa had a 50-yard run with a quarterback keeper from the 47-yard-line with senior kicker, Blake Thompson, adding the extra-point.

The Lancers next trip to the CHS end zone was nearly as quick, traveling 44-yards in four plays to go ahead


by 14-points.


Senior captain, Zach Green, made his varsity debut this season and has steadily improved his scoring average with his hard work and dedication.



Court Rules in Favor of Mack's

On Oct. 11, 2024, the NH Supreme Court ruled in favor of Mack's Apples in Londonderry, dismissing a lawsuit filed by Caroline Adams. Adams was paralyzed in a sledging accident at the

farm in January 2022. The court's decision was based on "recreational immunity," a law that protects landowners who allow public access for free. The court's ruling upheld a lower court's

decision to dismiss the case. The court stated that the trial court correctly granted the defendant's motion to dismiss because access to the land for recreational purposes was free to the public.


