School Board Moves Forward with Kindergarten Warrant Article

The School Board recently discussed how to present the budget for a proposal to bring full-day kindergarten to town, ultimately deciding to move forward with a standalone

warrant article.

“Based on the motion from the Sept. 2, 2025, School Board Meeting and the comments made at the Sept. 23 School Board meeting on preferences around budgeting for Full Day Kindergarten, our Business

Administrator reached out to legal counsel to determine what options the School Board has for this budget season,” Superintendent Dan Black wrote in a memo.

Black explained that the Board has “two **continued on page 2**

School Board & Town Council Discuss District Office Project

The Londonderry Town Council and School Board held a joint meeting last week to explore a potential warrant article that would relocate the School District Office to Town Hall.

Officials explained that the District Office previously occupied space adjacent to Town Hall but moved due to overcrowding and structural concerns. At that time, the district entered into a 10-year lease beginning in FY19, which now costs \$220,000 annually in FY26.

“The idea was to use

the 10 years to come up with a better long-term solution,” said School Board Chair Bob Slater. “Here we are seven and a half years later,” he added, noting the district remains in the same predicament.

Since then, several proposals have appeared on the ballot-including plans to utilize space at Moose Hill-but all failed. The current proposal would appear on the March 2026 ballot as a warrant article using \$2.5 million from the Town's Fund Balance, to be repaid by the School District interest-free over 10 years. The School

Board would also need to approve using \$1.4 million from its Unassigned Fund Balance toward project costs.

Town Manager Shaun Mulholland said the Town has significant cash reserves available, which is unusual, and emphasized the efficiency of housing both entities in one building.

“These opportunities don't come up every day,” Mulholland said, calling the project a priority for the Town.

Town Finance Director Justin Campo explained that the Town would enter into a lease agree- **continued on page 3**

Master Plan Survey Shows Desire to Balance Growth, Preserve Character

The Master Plan Steering Committee met on Oct. 16 to review progress on four upcoming chapters of the Master Plan and consider insights from the latest community survey.

“Tonight is our regroup, it's our strategizing, it's staking out our plan of action for the next few months,” said Suzanne Nienaber of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC). “There will probably be at least one meeting with the Planning Board as well.”

Cam Prolman, another SNHPC representa-

tive, presented “big picture findings” from the second Master Plan survey.

“We had 658 responses from residents and business owners. The topics in this survey covered natural resources, transportation, and economics,” he explained. “What we heard was that there's a strong desire to protect Londonderry's water resources, forests, and farmland. Respondents said that preservation was seen as essential to maintaining the town's rural character. There was support for voluntary conservation tools such as easements or incentives over regulato-

ry mandates.”

A recurring concern was the pace of development in Londonderry, with many respondents emphasizing the need to balance economic growth with maintaining town character.

“Here's a couple of questions: How should Londonderry balance growth and conservation? What types of tools **continued on page 2**

 basic options” for budgeting full-day kindergarten.

“At this point in time to start our budget process, the administration needs to start with one method of entry,” Black said. “The School Board can choose to switch the method they want later in the budget season if they should desire - we will just need to be clear on what we are doing after the Public Hearing on Jan. 15, 2026, heading into the Deliberative Session then Town Vote.”

Option one would incorporate full-day kindergarten into the operating budget and compare it to the default budget.

“In this option we would build in the new costs (new curriculum & furniture) for full-day

kindergarten into the operating budget, as well as any potential savings (potential lower staff needs) and increases in revenue (now accepting full adequacy from the state for kindergarten). These three potential changes to having full-day kindergarten in the operating budget would then be compared to the default budget which would have half-day kindergarten built into it,” Black explained.

He said the budget book would highlight “the specific changes that were related to Full Day Kindergarten for the School Board and public to see.”

“We would be able to isolate the difference from full day to half-day kindergarten,” Black wrote, noting that other changes to middle and

high school budgets would also appear in the same operating budget.

“Operating budgets need a simple majority approval,” he added.

Option two would create a standalone warrant article for full-day kindergarten, similar to a collective bargaining agreement, requiring a simple majority vote.

“We did check with legal counsel on our ability to create three budgets that was mentioned at the Sept. 23, 2025, School Board meeting,” Black wrote. “That discussion led to the recommendation of using a warrant article that would be like a collective bargaining agreement where we could detail costs, savings, and revenue changes to seek a simple majority vote.”

The warrant article would outline “the net of any increased costs versus any potential sav-

ings.”

“We would be able to state any increased revenue in the language, but we will not be able to build it into the operating or default budget. (If the warrant article passed, we would be able to accept that additional revenue afterwards),” Black explained.

He emphasized that the Board could start with either option now and change its approach before the Jan. 15, 2026, Public Hearing.

“We just need to have a clear consensus from the School Board to start the budgeting process, so we are able to meet our expected budget timelines,” Black wrote.

Black also noted the importance of starting kindergarten registration soon.

“We will be clear that either option would require a simple majority vote in March 2026,” he said during the meeting. “We do not know yet how the families of 4-

year-olds will plan for that uncertainty knowing that many private kindergarten options require a down payment to hold a spot for 2026-27. If we see any large changes in enrollment that are different than our models now, we will make a recommendation to update our budgeting approach by the Jan. 15, 2026, Public Hearing with either option.”

Board members voted to proceed with a stand-alone warrant article.

or partnerships could best protect water and land resources?” asked Prolman, encouraging Committee members to reflect on these issues as they work through the remaining chapters.

Traffic congestion and road safety also ranked high among public concerns.

“The roads are seen as unsafe for non-drivers - that was question 14 - and 74% of respondents felt roads were unsafe for non-drivers. There was interest in expanding access to parks and trails through safer walking and biking routes,” said Prolman. “There’s also limited awareness and use of local transit options that are available in Londonderry.”

Survey results showed strong interest in improving mobility for seniors, young residents, and those without pri-

private vehicles. Respondents also favored small businesses over large chains, while business owners expressed a desire for a more streamlined permitting process.

“The survey to me, personally, just nailed everything we’ve been talking about that people are concerned about,” said Committee member Bob Robicsek, noting that these topics have surfaced repeatedly in Steering Committee discussions.

“These people know what they’re talking about,” added Committee member Marge Badois. “They know it has accelerated greatly in the recent past. Everybody sees it, feels it, knows it.”

Resident Ray Breslin called the process “highly important,” especially given Londonderry’s recent and projected population growth.

“We’re playing catch-

up, a lot of things that were not done in the past, now we’re dealing with,” said Breslin. “All of you folks have the ability to bring this forward. Perhaps you don’t have the ability to make the final decisions, but you have the ability to influence those that do.”

Looking ahead to an early 2026 completion date, Nienaber proposed changes to the Steering Committee’s structure and operations.

“We’re going to ask this group to bring full participation to own this product, to take full participation of the process,” she said. “We’ll have a much-called - let’s call it an ‘executive committee’ for lack of a better word - where we will get together 10 days before each meeting to prep, talk about the materials needed, and really make sure that we are all on the same page.”

She urged members to pre-read materials to “maximize efficiency” and minimize what she called “wordsmithing problems,” or disagreements over phrasing.

Town's First Budget Hearing Begins Saturday, Nov. 1

The Londonderry Town Council and Budget Committee will begin reviewing proposed department budgets on Saturday, Nov. 1.

Town Manager Shaun Mulholland outlined the upcoming schedule during the most recent Town Council meeting, noting that several meetings will focus heavily on departmental budget presentations.

The Nov. 1 kickoff session will feature the overall proposed budget along with presentations from the Police, Fire, and Public Works departments.

On Nov. 3, the Council and Budget Committee are expected to hear from the Town Manager's office, Town Clerk/Tax Collector, Finance, Human Resources, Information Technology, and Planning/Building departments.

Additional Council meetings on Nov. 10 and Nov. 17 will include presentations from other departments. Mulholland said that smaller departments, which previously did not make separate presentations, will do so this year.

"So it's a fast process that we go through here," Mulholland said, adding that next year's budget process will likely be spread out over a longer period.

Mulholland emphasized that meetings will focus only on the budgets scheduled for discussion that night so the public knows what to expect. While the workshops are not formal public hearings, he said they still provide opportunities for public input.

"We're here to answer questions," Mulholland said, noting that in his previous town, residents provided significant feedback.

To encourage engagement, the Town has created a dedicated budget page on its website with information about the process and a form for submitting questions or comments. Residents can also email feedback directly to the Town Council.

"A lot of people can't attend meetings necessarily, but they can go on their cell phone and ask questions," Mulholland said, calling it

another way for the public to participate.

Town Councilor Dan Bouchard praised the effort to involve residents.

"I just want to say thank you for letting people have input on the budget," he said.

The next Town Council meeting is scheduled for Nov. 1 at 9 a.m.

Town Council Considers Transportation Capital Reserve Fund

The Town Council recently reviewed a proposal to create a Transportation Capital Reserve Fund aimed at addressing growing traffic concerns.

"The Town of Londonderry is growing in population along with all of the municipalities in southern New Hampshire," Town Manager

Shaun Mulholland wrote in a memo. "This growth within the Town and the region impacts the volume of traffic on the Town's roadway infrastructure. The Town needs to plan for this growth and address the impacts on its roadway infrastructure. Failure to do so results in traffic congestion and traffic safety issues. Navigation systems such as Google

Maps direct motorists to utilize routes that are the most efficient to get motorists from point A to point B. This results in more pass-through traffic on Town roads that may not have existed 20 years ago."

Mulholland proposed creating a nonlapsing Transportation Capital Reserve Fund.

"This would be a nonlapsing fund to which appropriations would be made by approval of the voters at Town Meeting for the purposes of making transportation infrastructure improvements," he explained. "The objective would be to reduce traffic congestion and improve traffic safety."

One major purpose

of the fund would be to finance traffic and engineering studies to improve intersections and roadway sections, including drainage, guardrails, intersection reconfiguration, signage, traffic signals, and pedestrian/bicycle infrastructure.

Currently, Mulholland noted, the Town lacks traffic studies or data for most intersections.

"We need to get into a position to be able to get grants, by having data to support it," he said. "We need to get traffic counts - real-time traffic counts," explaining that the Town wants to acquire traffic counters and radar devices.

The second objective would be to fund con-

struction projects such as roadway improvements, guardrails, signs, traffic signals, pedestrian/bicycle infrastructure, right-of-way acquisition, and traffic monitoring devices.

"Said funds could be used to construct these improvements solely with funds provided by the Town or with matching funds from other governmental entities or private entities," Mulholland wrote. He said the initial proposal would allocate \$250,000 to the fund.

Data collected from these devices would be reviewed by the Traffic

Safety Committee and the Traffic Management working group, an internal team of staff. Mulholland added that traffic data would also help determine where enforcement efforts should be focused.

"Without data, it's pretty hard to move forward and make decisions - for you to make decisions, for the public to make decisions," he said.

The Town Council voted to move forward with developing a warrant article for the proposed Transportation Capital Reserve Fund.

ment with the School District for \$250,000 annually over 10 years, after which the lease would drop to \$1 per year. Campo noted that bonding the project would result in substantial interest costs, making the proposed arrangement more cost-effective.

School District Business Administrator Amity Small confirmed that the district's share of the funding has already been earmarked and will

be available if voters approve the article in March.

Officials said a joint committee of Town and School District representatives has been meeting to discuss design and space needs. In September, the working group scaled the original plan down from 6,270 square feet to 5,318 square feet.

Next steps include informing the public and working toward a Guaranteed Maximum Price for the project during budget season.

A Season for Common Sense & Caution

This time of year, the color orange comes to mind, with all the pumpkins, mums, and the turning of leaves. Let's not forget—the other orange, “hunter's orange,” that becomes part of our attire in the outdoors at this time of year.

It's hunting season again, and that means the land behind your home or along your favorite trail may not be so tranquil anymore. It also means gunshots will echo through the trees, and that's your cue to be extra cautious in those pristine woods behind your home or along your favorite path.

For hunters, the rules are simple but critical: know your target. Never fire unless you're certain of what you're aiming at. Take what you learned in hunter education seriously—and if you haven't taken a course yet, make that a priority before heading out. Know your weapon, know your surroundings, and remember: the life you save could be your neighbor's.

Be respectful of property; it is important. If the land is posted with a “No Hunting” sign and you don't have permission, go somewhere else. And when you do have access, leave the land as you found it—or better. Every year, private and town-owned properties suffer from careless behavior: spent cartridges and beer cans left behind, unauthorized tree cutting, and ATV damage to trails. These actions ruin it for

everyone. Clean up after yourself and keep the tradition of hunting responsibly.

This is not the season to blend in when you take that enjoyable walk in the woods. Make yourself visible. Wear “hunter orange” when you're in areas where hunting is likely, and make sure your dog is sporting a bright vest too. Stick to marked trails, avoid dawn and dusk when hunting activity is highest, and keep pets leashed for their safety.

Hunters and hikers alike should check local and state regulations for hunting dates and designated zones. Knowing the rules helps prevent accidents and keeps everyone safe. Hunting is a long-standing tradition that supports conservation and wildlife management, but it only works when practiced responsibly.

Consider carrying a whistle or a fully charged phone when you head outdoors. These small precautions can make a big difference in an emergency.

Fall is one of the most beautiful times to be outdoors, but it's also a time to remember that homes around you are closer to one another than you might realize. On a crisp autumn morning, the sound of gunfire is a reminder you're not alone.

So take care, stay alert, and enjoy everything this season has to offer. After all, it's better to be safe than sorry.




Steering Committee Prepares for Fall Work Sessions on Land-Use Planning

The Master Plan Steering Committee met on Oct. 16 to outline plans for two upcoming fall work sessions focused on land-use issues critical to Londonderry's future.

"The work session approach is going to be very different than a meeting is normally structured. What we'd like to do is make this interactive - we'd love to bring additional SNHPC staff in to facilitate," explained Suzanne Nienaber of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC).

"The future land-use work session in particular, because it is such a foundational component of the Master Plan, is required. It is a way to visualize our values on a map."

Nienaber emphasized the importance of community participation and suggested using detailed maps to illustrate how land in Londonderry is organized.

Resident Ray Breslin underscored the need for a clear land-use strategy.

"Land-use is extremely important. What is that land going to be used for? What lands are

we going to protect?" he asked. "Conservation? Yes. Watersheds? Yes. We have to consider that, and a lot of it has been impacted already."

Cam Prolman of SNHPC agreed, stating they "absolutely" want Londonderry residents involved in the land-use session. Nienaber urged Committee members to prioritize outreach.

"I will say that having personal outreach - telling people 'I'd really love for you to be here, we're going to talk about this, it's really important to the Master Plan' - is going to make all of the difference in

bringing people into the room," she said.

The first work session is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 6, at 6 p.m. in the Moose Hill Council Chambers.

Nienaber also previewed a special chapter development session in December.

"I'd really like to encourage folks on the Committee to promote this strategically and bring community expertise to the table," she said. "If you know some business owners who want to talk about economic development, let's bring them. We want to make sure that there's

maybe a representative from the Derry - Londonderry Chamber - they'd be a great presence to have in the room. We can invite folks from the Conservation Commission and maybe beyond the Conservation Commission, who we'd want to invite to be the resident experts on natural resource considerations."

She also recommended inviting experts in transportation and cultural/historic resources. SNHPC will participate in the second work session as well.

"You need a bigger megaphone than the

people that are here," said Committee member Bob Robicsek, calling for expanded outreach efforts to boost attendance. Members discussed strategies such as contacting town officials, sending emails, and posting notices on social media.

"There's a lot of Londonderry pages - I'm willing to post on those if you want," added Committee member Martha Smith.

The second work session is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 20, at 6 p.m. in the Moose Hill Council Chambers.

Steering Committee Looks to Combine Work on Strategic and Master Plan

The October meeting of the Master Plan Steering Committee focused on accelerating progress on the next four chapters of Londonderry's updated Master Plan. With time constraints in mind, Suzanne Nienaber of the Southern NH Planning Commission (SNHPC) proposed streamlining the process by omitting certain topics from upcoming discussions.

"My understanding is that there's other work underway around a Strategic Plan that could cover some of this ground," said Nienaber. "With the Town Manager's office and our Town Manager Shaun Mulhol-

land, we're in the early stages of developing a Strategic Plan for the town. Community facilities are a major component of that plan and will be addressed there."

She also recommended removing the implementation matrix from the Master Plan, suggesting that the Planning Board take on that responsibility. The goal is to reduce the workload for the Steering Committee during what is expected to be a busy few months.

Committee member Martha Smith expressed concern on the change.

"I'm very concerned about the implementation part of it. The Planning Board is great, but I want it to be something

that we can see, that we can check off," she said. "I don't want it to sit on a shelf."

Nienaber responded that the Planning Board could approach implementation one chapter at a time, allowing for manageable progress. Steering Committee Chair Jeff Penta added that some of the proposed actions could be incorporated into the Strategic Plan where appropriate.

"The shorter-term goals of the Strategic Plan would still be driven by the longer-term goals of the Master Plan," Penta explained.

Committee member Marge Badois suggested reestablishing an implementation committee to

ensure continued oversight.

"In the past, we had an implementation committee," she said. "I personally would like to see that again, so these decisions aren't being made in a vacuum."

Nienaber emphasized that public input would remain a key part of the process, regardless of which board or committee oversees implementation.

Other members raised questions about how the Strategic Plan would align with the Master Plan.

"I thought the items in the Strategic Plan

were going to be executed in the next year, and the Master Plan was more five years out or so," said John Mahon. "Are the only community facility topics being looked at those that can be accomplished in the next year? Are they not looking beyond that at this point?"

Town Manager Shaun Mulholland clarified that the town's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) already addresses long-term community facility needs.

"That's a six-year plan," Mulholland said. "In addition to that, there will be an unfund-

ed projects list."

He affirmed that the Strategic and Master Plans are designed to work in tandem.

"The idea is that the Strategic Plan dovetails with the Master Plan - there are direct linkages," Mulholland explained. "We ask, what are we going to do next year to achieve the objectives in the Master Plan? If it's increasing conservation land by 3%, what are the tasks? What are the action items to get there? That's what we measure in the Strategic Plan. They work together to accomplish the task."

Lancers football fans didn't get the surprise upset they were hoping for in the final home game at Lon-

donderry High School on Friday night, Oct. 24, with their team falling 30-10 to the Bedford Bulldogs.

The final game of the year at Lancer Park was

team on the ground with 83-yards. Senior J-Veion Teeter had 20-yards rushing in three carries.

Junior tight-end Davis Magarian had three catches for 40-yards and Rao had one for 35-yards.

The team's final game of the year will take place at Windham High School, playing the 6-1 Jaguars.

The Lancers were coming off a loss earlier in the week, when they traveled to Nashua to face the undefeated Purple Panthers of Nashua South High School, losing 1-2.


Totten was the only Londonderry player to score, with the assist going to senior Leo Sochanek in the first half of the contest.
