New Working Group Formed to Plan Future DPW Facility

Londonderry's Town Council has taken a step toward modernizing its public works infrastructure by forming a dedicated working group. The committee will evaluate options for

a new Department of Public Works (DPW) facility that meets current operational needs and accommodates future growth.

At its most recent meeting, the Londonderry Town Council addressed the creation of a

DPW facility working group.

"After presentations of the current DPW site and garage to both the Town Council and CIP, a final layout and conceptual design for a new facility was developed,"

Concerns Raised Over District Security System Failures

Concerns over school safety were front and center at the most recent Londonderry School Board meeting, on Tuesday night, Sept. 2, following a false alarm triggered by the district's Alertus emergency notification system.

Parent John Grennon spoke during the Public Comment section of the meeting, voicing his frustration over the lack of response during an incident that occurred on Aug. 27 at Londonderry High School.

Grennon was frustrated with the lack of

response to what could have been an active shooter situation at the high school on the same day that a mass shooting occurred in Minnesota at the Annunciation Catholic Church where two children were killed and 21 were injured.

Grennon said "We had a very traumatic event, where the system went off accidentally and law enforcement and fire were not notified."

"At the end of the day, nobody was dispatched, and we had kids sheltering, thinking someone might be shooting up a school," Grennon said.

He added that he spoke to both fire and police and no call was received from the school.

He suggested that some on the board or at the district should immediately go into the Alertus system and correct the problem.

He added, "As far as best practices are concerned, it's a poor product and other school districts don't have it and those that do have it. It goes straight to 911."

He repeatedly asked members of the board if they were aware of the problem, but wasn't given a response.

Property Assessments and Tax Impact Clarified at Town Council

As residents across Londonderry received updated property assessments in the mail, concerns quickly surfaced about the potential of tax increases at the end of the year.

Before the Town Council opened its public comment portion of the meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 2, Town Manager Shaun Mulholland took the opportunity to explain how assessments and property tax rates work - and why a higher valuation doesn't necessarily mean a higher tax bill.

"Over the weekend, a lot of you received your assessments and saw increases," said Town Councilor Dan Bouchard. "I've gotten calls from residents who are worried about their taxes going up."

Bouchard asked Mulholland to clarify the process for the public.

"I'd like to ask our Town Manager to explain - if your house went up \$100,000 in assessed value, does that mean your taxes will go up?" he said.

Mulholland responded that there isn't a direct relationship between assessed value

and taxes.

"When you have a revaluation, it resets the baseline of the property," he explained.

He noted that different types of properties appreciate at different rates, depending on market demand. For example, one style of home might increase by 10

School Board Faces Graduation Rate Adjustment After Federal Audit

A recent federal audit has prompted a significant adjustment to Londonderry's high school graduation statistics, sparking discussion at the latest School Board meeting. While the district's graduation rate has been revised downward, officials emphasized that the change does not diminish the value of alternative education programs for students.

At its most recent meeting, the Londonderry School Board was briefed on a significant change to the district's four-year graduation rate.

"A few weeks ago, we were notified that, as a result of a federal De-

partment of Education audit of New Hampshire, the Adult Education Diploma will no longer be counted in Londonderry's - or any other district's - official high school graduation statistics," Superintendent Dan Black wrote in a memo.

Black explained that the district's "2024 four-year graduation rate will be adjusted from 95.37% to 88.34%."

"This does not mean we will no longer offer Adult Education as a viable path for our students moving forward," Black added. "This change only affects how our statistics are reported externally."

Further clarification came from a letter by Dr. Nate Greene of the New

Hampshire Department of Education's Bureau of Assessment and Accountability.

"During the summer and fall of 2024, the New Hampshire Department of Education (NHED) was monitored by the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Elementary and Secondary Education. This week, we received the preliminary draft of that monitoring visit," Greene wrote.

"We were informed that the NH adult education diploma does not meet the required standards to be included in the four- and five-year graduation rate calculations. The audit determined that the NH adult education diploma is (1) less rigorous than a regular high school

diploma and (2) not awarded to a majority of students in the state. This finding requires that NHED adjust the calculation for four- and five-year graduation rates to remove adult education diplomas."

Greene acknowledged that the change would likely lower graduation rates for many schools but emphasized that the department will continue exploring ways to reflect student success more comprehensively. "We will continue

to examine additional state data measures through our accountability taskforce, capturing the many ways students complete high school, including adult education diplomas, HiSET, GED programs, and certificates of completion," he said. "Additionally, we will continue to engage with the U.S. Department of Education on this topic."

He added, "NHED has calculated the graduation rates for the 2024 - 2025 school year under

this new requirement. The embargoed graduation cohort data is available on the Assessment and Accountability dashboard in i4SEE 2.0 for district and school leaders to review."

Despite the adjustment, School Board Chair Bob Slater praised the district's Adult Education program.

"That program is outstanding," he said.

The next Londonderry School Board meeting is scheduled for Sept. 23 at 7 p.m.

Councilor Suggests Evaluating Town's Legal Counsel, Manager to Explore Options

At the most recent Londonderry Town Council meeting, Councilor Deb Paul requested that the town consider evaluating its current legal representation - a move she described as a standard business practice to ensure the best value and fit for municipal needs.

According to a memo

presented to the Council, the Town Charter states: "The Council shall engage as needed such attorneys as are deemed in the best interest of the town to provide legal advice to the Council, Manager, town departments, and other agencies, and represent the Town in any legal proceeding, criminal prosecutions, and traffic violations."

The memo noted that

Londonderry is currently represented by the law firm Sheehan Phinney as general legal counsel. Other firms are used for specialized purposes, including attorneys within the Police Department who handle criminal prosecutions and violations of state and town codes.

Paul said it's wise to periodically evaluate vendors and explore alternatives.

"It's good to evaluate and look at what's out there," she said, suggesting the town could consider a smaller firm, similar to the one used by the school district.

Vice Chair Shawn Faber agreed with the idea of reviewing options but recommended a preliminary step: having the Town Manager research available firms

and report back before initiating a formal request for qualifications.

"If there are viable alternatives, then we can move forward with the full process," Faber said.

Councilor Ted Combes expressed support for the current firm, citing its broad expertise and strong performance.

Paul emphasized that exploring options does-

n't mean a change is guaranteed.

"I don't know what the result will be," she said.

The Council agreed to have the Town Manager investigate potential alternatives and present findings at a future meeting.

The next Town Council meeting is scheduled for Sept. 15 at 7 p.m.

He also wondered whether or not the system ever worked.

He said, "That system has been up for a long time. Has it not been going across the street for two years? That's just so troubling."

Grennon's comments prompted a joint press release from Police Chief Kim Bernard and Superintendent Dan Black, offering a detailed account of the incident and the district's response.

"The purpose of the message is to follow up in more detail on the August 27 Alertus false alarm," the release stated. It explained that the Emergency Operations Committee-comprised of school administrators, police, and fire officials-debriefs all incidents to improve future safety measures.

The release emphasized the importance of redundant communica-

tion systems. Within seconds of a water leak triggering an Alertus button, staff identified the alarm as false. Two phone calls were made to police dispatch, and School Resource Officers received confirmation via shared radios and the Alertus app. Both departments quickly understood and communicated that the alarm was not a threat.

One School Resource Officer remained on site to assist in returning the school to normal operations.

The release also noted that the Alertus beacon at the police department failed to activate during the incident, though all other beacons at the high school functioned properly. Subsequent testing confirmed the beacon now works, and both IT departments are investigating the malfunction.

The School Board issued its own statement, affirming its commitment to transparen-

cy and safety.

"The Board took this concern very seriously and immediately sought additional information," the statement read. "While public transparency is important, the issue was initially kept private to protect the integrity of crisis protocols."

Board members Tim Porter and Bob Slater attended meetings with police and fire officials to review the incident and observe live testing, which was successful.

"In this instance, all actions and communications were carried out promptly," the Board stated. "While we identified a glitch with one piece of equipment, all other safety procedures worked as designed."

The Board concluded that students and staff were never in danger, thanks to the multiple layers of communication and safety protocols in place, including the district's ALICE system.

Council to Interview 12 Applicants for Library Trustee Alternates

The Londonderry Town Council will hold interviews over its next two meetings to fill three alternate positions on the Leach Library Board of Trustees.

At its most recent meeting, councilors learned that 12 residents had applied for the one-year terms. Administrative Support Coordinator Kirsten Hildonen outlined three options for how the Council could proceed: hold interviews across two regularly scheduled meetings, conduct them all in a single special meeting

before Oct. 6, or narrow the pool and interview a smaller group.

"If people put their application in, then they should have the chance to come in and explain their interest to the Town Council," said Councilor Dan Bouchard, voicing support for giving each applicant an opportunity to be heard.

Councilor Deb Paul suggested a single special meeting might be more efficient and avoid scheduling conflicts across multiple nights.

In the end, the Council chose the first option—splitting interviews between its Sept. 15 and Oct. 6 meetings.

On Oct. 6, the meeting will begin at 6 p.m. instead of the usual 7 p.m. start time to accommodate the process.

According to the Council agenda, the first four applicants scheduled to be interviewed on Sept. 15 are Sally Nelson, Cris Navarro, Linda E. Lampkin, and Azra Palo.

Final decisions on the three alternate trustee appointments are expected after the Oct. 6 session.

The next Londonderry Town Council meeting is set for Sept. 15 at 7 p.m.

Never Forget: The Legacy of September 11

"We're not about what happened on 9/11. We're about what happened on 9/12." Jeff Parness, founder of New York Says Thank You, captured the essence of American resilience in just thirteen words.

This year marks the 24th anniversary of a day that changed our nation forever. Sept. 11, 2001, is etched into our collective memory - not just for the horror we witnessed, but for the unity that followed. Most Americans remember exactly where they were when the news broke. The images of the Twin Towers collapsing, the chaos, the courage - they remain vivid, unshakable.

We lost thousands of innocent lives - on planes, in offices, on the streets. First responders ran toward danger, not away from it. Families were shattered. The American spirit was tested. And yet, as Rudy Giuliani said, "The attacks of Sept. 11th were intended to break our spirit. Instead, we have emerged stronger and more unified."

We must reflect not only on what we lost, but on what we found: courage, compassion, and a renewed sense of community. These qualities are still within us. They are not confined to history - they are waiting to be revived.

So this Sept. 11, pause. Reflect. Recommit. Not just to memory, but to meaning. To kindness. To courage. To each other.

Because the legacy of 9/11 isn't just about what happened. It's about who we became - and who we still have the power to be.

Help We Are Drowning

For many years we have been told by certain "Town Council Members" that there is little the Town can do about the exploding growth we are experiencing. The discussion of growth management has been addressed in the past but seems to end shortly after the elections are over and some have made it into office. Councilor Deb Paul has proposed a number of goals and growth management is one of them. Thank you, Councilor Paul.

Well, Windham has taken a more aggressive approach and is DOING something about it!

Windham created a Growth Management Subcommittee to address their unprecedented pace of development. They put together a Three-step plan.

1: Temporary Moratorium (12 Month) that does not affect the average homeowner. Homeowners can still improve their property, and it contains a safeguard for

those who bought a lot with the intention of building a primary residence. The temporary moratorium under RSA 674:23

2. Short Term Growth Management (12-48 months reviewed annually) with the intent to provide limited, measured growth while service capacity is monitored and improved.

3. Permanent Phased Development Rules with long-term changes to ensure development happens in step with schools, roads, safety, and water.

This proposal will go to their elected Planning Board (by the way, Londonderry overwhelmingly requested that we elect our Planning Board members on a Warrant Article in

March 2024. Yes 2646 No 1430 It's been 18 months and nothing!), then through workshops and an official public hearing before it is finalized and decided by the voters in March 2026.

The Growth Management Committee outlined every aspect of how these steps would be implemented, from who would be affected and what areas of development would be exempt and those conditionally exempt. Every detail is considered and explained.

My question is why are other Towns acting and we are not? What are we waiting for. Last session (2025) at the State House a Bill was introduced that would halt all Town's ability to implement a moratorium

Peter George Kunyz



Peter George Kunyz, 89, of Londonderry, passed away peacefully on Sept. 4, 2025, at Parkland Hospital after a brief illness with cancer. Born in Milburn, NJ, on March 9, 1936, Peter was the youngest of

twelve children.

Following the death of his father at a young age, he left school to help support his family, working alongside his brother Leo at a florist shop specializing in Christmas poinsettias.

On a blind date, Peter met the love of his life, Lois MacGregor. For Peter, it was love at first sight - he told her early on that he intended to marry her. After some thought, Lois said yes, and the two were married in 1956. They made their home in New Jersey, where Peter began his career with American Airlines. Preparations Continue for October Senior Expo in Londonderry

The September meeting of the Londonderry Senior Resources Committee focused on preparations for the 2025 Senior Expo, scheduled for October 4. “We’ve totaled how many vendors we have,” said Londonderry Police Department Liaison Patrick Cheatham. “We’ll send out a blast on Town Hall social media, as well as the Police Department’s. We try not to do more than one post from the department, but we’ve got to get the info out. Old Home Day is

behind us, along with all the other major projects, so over the next few weeks we can focus on the Senior Expo very intently.” Cheatham, along with Director of Senior Affairs Ilona Arndt and other committee members, stressed the importance of having enough volunteers and donations to ensure the event runs smoothly. “Did Ilona give you a map as to where the vendors are going to go?” asked Vice-Chair Valerie Brauer. According to Committee Chair Sherry Far-

rell, Arndt likely had a vendor map “ready to go.” “We’re up to around 54 vendors already, and our goal is to get up to 70, which I’m sure we’ll hit,” said Farrell. “We need to bring attendance to all of that.” She added that donated food and water would be served to vendors and attendees. Based on previous Expos, the committee also expected vendors to hold product demonstrations and raffles. Decorations, however, remained undecided. “If we can get some

flowers, we can use them to decorate our tables,” said Brauer, who also suggested experimenting with new ways to measure attendance. “It gets really busy.” She proposed having a volunteer stand at the entrance with a tally counter to estimate attendance. “It doesn’t have to be an exact number - we just need a gauge,” Brauer said. Parking for older, less mobile attendees was another key concern. “The parking lot should be wide open. One thing we could do is

save the entire first row for handicap parking and mark it as such,” said Cheatham. “They do have their own spaces, but because of our demographic, we’re probably going to need more than that. I’ll see if we can get two volunteers for the parking lot - two should be enough to direct people and help them walk in.” “We should also check with the football coach in case they’re having a workout or something like that so we can maybe ask them to park somewhere else,” suggested Town

Council Liaison Dan Bouchard. “You know on a Saturday, they’re probably going to be doing something.” Members agreed, deciding to mark the school’s front spaces with reserved parking signs. Farrell also offered to contact the high school and the Londonderry Fire Department to secure access to at least one wheelchair “just in case” it was needed. The Senior Expo will take place on Saturday, Oct. 4, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Londonderry High School gym.

continued from page 1 explained Director of Public Works Dave Wholley in a memo. “This facility would house all equipment under one roof and pro-

vide ample storage and space for current and future staff. Staff and consultant group Weston & Sampson conducted a year-long study of operational and spatial

needs.” Town Manager Shaun Mulholland noted that because he wants a Town Councilor on the committee, the formation of the working group required Council approval. “I would like to form this committee so we

can conduct the appropriate research needed,” he said. Mulholland added that the goal is to have a proposed project ready for consideration within a year. Working Group Membership: • One Town Councilor (appointed by the Council Chair) • Director of Public Works (DPW) • DPW Facilities Manager • Four additional members Purpose and Duties: The working group will: a. Assess site viability, conceptual design options, and infrastructure needs. b. Estimate capital costs, funding sources, and phasing opportunities. c. Evaluate operational efficiencies, potential cost-sharing, and interdepartmental synergies. d. Engage relevant stakeholders, including Town personnel, community members, and external consultants. e. Prepare and pres-

ent a written report within twelve months, including cost-benefit analysis, risk assessment, and recommended next steps. One question raised was whether the new facility would be built at the current DPW site or a new location. Mulholland said that while the existing site is likely the most practical option since the town owns it and a facility is already in place, all options will be considered during the review process. “That would be the most likely site for that, yes,” he said. The Town Council approved the formation of the working group during the meeting. The next Town Council meeting is scheduled for Sept. 15 at 7 p.m.

Town Eyes Junkyard Purchase to Protect Water Supply

Could Londonderry soon own a junkyard? The Town Council has given the green light to explore whether purchasing Murray's Auto Recycling might protect the community's water supply while also opening land

for possible recreational use.

The Conservation Commission had a presentation at the last Town Council meeting at the request of Councilor Deb Paul. The Conservation Commission had some concerns about the environmental risks at 55 Hall Road. They went on

to say property would be good to obtain to keep our water safe from more contamination and for the environment. The property is currently listed for sale at \$1.4 million.

Before the discussion began, Council Vice Chair Shawn Faber asked whether Councilor

Deb Paul would recuse herself. Murray's Auto advertises in the Londonderry Times, which Paul owns. Paul said she would not benefit financially from the sale and declined to recuse herself, because she stated, "I have no financial benefit for this. It is actually a loss to her." No vote taken, Paul stayed on.

Conservation Commission member Mike Speltz explained that the request was not for an immediate purchase but for permission to do due diligence.

"All we're trying to do is mitigate risk," Speltz said. "There is a threat that the area poses to our water supply, and we're trying to make it impossible for it to ever be used other than as recreation or conservation land."

According to a memo to the Council, the six-acre site - part of which is wetlands - is under a Ground Water Management Permit from the NH Department of Environmental Services. Contaminants identified on site include petroleum compounds such as MTBE, benzene, and other volatile organic

chemicals.

Between 2007 and 2016, remediation removed about 2,000 tons of contaminated soil. Thirteen monitoring wells remain in place, with tests showing declining contamination levels. A point-of-entry system was also installed for a nearby home after the well water was deemed unsafe.

Speltz emphasized that the Commission's research is ongoing and would also involve pursuing possible grants and negotiating with the owner.

"We're not going to go into the junkyard business as a Town," Speltz said. "The question is what the property will look like after cleanup and, most importantly, what environ-

mental guarantees we'll have."

Councilor Dan Bouchard noted that the town has received junkyard complaints for years.

"I don't think it's a bad thing to look into this and see if we could eliminate another junkyard out of Town and protect the water quality we have in our community," he said.

The Council voted to authorize the Town Manager to work with the Conservation Commission on feasibility, funding options, and environmental liability. The Town Manager will also consult with the Recreation Commission, nearby property owners, NH DES, and town legal counsel before any decision is made.

Eversource Energy Announces Sale of Aquarion Water Company

Eversource Energy (NYSE: ES) has entered a definitive agreement to sell Aquarion Water Company to the newly formed Aquarion Water Authority (AWA), a quasi-public entity of the State of Connecticut. The \$2.4 billion transaction includes \$1.6 billion in cash and \$800 million in net debt, and is expected to close by late 2025, pending regulatory approvals.

Aquarion, headquartered in Bridgeport, Connecticut, serves nearly 250,000 customers across Connecticut, Massachusetts, and New Hampshire. Since acquiring Aquarion in 2017, Eversource has expanded its footprint through six acquisitions, adding 30,000 customers and growing its rate base by \$200 million. Notable

additions include New England Service Company, Torrington Water Company, and the Pinehills Water System in Plymouth, Massachusetts. Aquarion also entered the wastewater sector with purchases in New Hartford and Ansonia, Connecticut, diversifying its portfolio and expanding its service capabilities.

Eversource plans to use the proceeds to reduce parent company debt and reinvest in its core electric and natural gas operations. The company expects to record a \$300 million loss on the sale in Q4 2024, including \$140 million in estimated tax expense. Despite the loss, Eversource reaffirmed its long-term earnings growth target of 5-7% through 2028, citing strong fundamentals in its energy business.

The sale marks a strategic shift for Eversource, allowing it to concentrate on energy infrastructure while Aquarion transitions to public ownership under AWA and the South Central Connecticut Regional Water Authority. The move reflects a broader trend toward public control of essential water services, aiming to enhance long-term sustainability, transparency, and regional collaboration. AWA's formation signals a new chapter for Aquarion, aligning its operations with Connecticut's goals for resilient, community-focused water management.

percent, while another could rise by 20 percent.

"Because that type of property is more valuable in the marketplace," Mulholland said, "it changes the factor for each person."

He added that the town's tax rate will be finalized in the fall, likely in November due to delays caused by the revaluation process.

"There are a number of factors that go into it," Mulholland said, citing new properties, new

construction, and projected revenue as key influences.

"All of that affects whether someone's property taxes go up or not," he said.

Mulholland also noted that commercial properties have generally increased less than residential ones, a trend seen in other communities as well.

He said, "So more of that burdon is put on the residential property owners than it is on the commercial property

owners because of the value in the marketplace."

Until the process is complete, he emphasized, it's impossible to know exactly how individual tax bills will be affected.

He added that they will have to look at how many new properties came on line and what the town's revenues are before knowing if residents will see an increase moving forward.

The next Town Council meeting is scheduled for Sept. 15 at 7 p.m.

Lancers Bust Broncos with 33-7 Win in Season Opener

The Londonderry High School football team had no trouble handling the Alvirne Broncos in Hudson on Friday night, Sept. 5, scoring all of the team's points in the first half and easily winning the season opener 33-7.

Overall, the Lancers were able to amass 339-yards of offense with five

touchdowns while the opposing Broncos were held to just 138-yards of total offense and a single touchdown in the final quarter.

The Lancers second touchdown came just five plays later with an interception by Cruz followed by a 43-yard carry to pay dirt after the ball was tipped at the line.

Leading 12-0, Joshua Wheeler took the snap for the two-point conversion to give the Lancers a 14-0 at 4:21 in the first.

The Londonderry defense quickly forced a three-and-out, giving LHS the ball at their 32-yard line.

During that set of downs, Palma finished the first quarter with a 40-yard run to set up the Lancers third touchdown of the night.

Starting on the first play in the second period, Daron handed the ball off at the five-yard line to St. Gelais who ran it into the endzone for a 20-point LHS lead.

The Londonderry defense had another strong set of downs to force another three-and-out to set up another touchdown after just three plays.

Davis Magarian got the direct-snap and ran the ball in from the seven-yard line for the 26-0 lead at 8:41 in the second.

The fourth touchdown was followed by the third missed two-point conversion.

The final LHS touchdown of the night came with 3:36 left in the half when Daron connected with Devin VanAvery for

Applicants for registration who possess proof of identity, age, citizenship, and domicile must bring that proof when they come to register. Qualified applicants who do not possess or cannot produce proof of domicile may register if

they sign an affidavit attesting to their qualifications.
