

**Fee Schedule For Right to Know Requests Approved**

The Londonderry Town Council approved a fee schedule for 91A right to know requests during its Sept. 16 meeting.

It was explained that the changes came in the wake of a new RSA, which allows communities, if they choose, to create a fee schedule for 91A requests.

### School Board Get Briefed on First Day of School Enrollment

Board meeting, the School Board received an update regarding enrollment from Superintendent, Dan Black, now that the school year has begun.

"You have a chart of how enrollment played out the first day," Black said, explaining that they pull the data from the first day of school. "It's constantly moving and then Oct. 1 that's our official enrollment we run with the state and

This year's kindergarten class came in at 207 students for the first day of school, with 103 students being enrolled for the morning kindergarten class, and 104 being enrolled for the afternoon kindergarten class. Last year's kindergarten enrollment was 208 students.

At South School, opening day enrollment came in at 412 students. which is 32 students less than the 444 students the school had last year.

Black said the enrollment for Londonderry Middle School and Londonderry High School last year in August. are "largely stable."

For Londonderry Middle School, the opening day enrollment was 927 students, which is 24 students less than the 951 students they had last year.

At Londonderry High School, the opening day enrollment was 1,277, which is 36 students less than they had last year when they had 1,313 students.

In total, the District's enrollment number is 3,969 students, which is 75 students less than the 4,044 students they had
