## Council Makes Decision on Outsourcing Human Services

The Derry Town Council reached the final stages of approving the budget for the fiscal year of 2019 during their latest meeting on May 15, but one major factor drew controversy amongst both residents and councilors alike.

As was announced during the council's last meeting on May 1, a decision was reached to abandon its own human services department. They chose to outsource the services to a contractor, Greater Derry Community Health Services Incorporated (GDCHSI). The bottom line was \$282,745. Town Administrator David Caron assured both residents and the council that the quality of the

services would not diminish with this choice. Due to both residents and council members voicing their concerns over what they feel would be negative consequences caused by this contract, the council flagged the contract and held a final vote on the matter on May 15 before voting on the overall FY19 budget.

Plenty of residents came to the meeting to speak out against the shift of the department. First was Ernest St. Pierre, who felt that there was a major issue with changing services that affected Derry's most vulnerable residents. He did not feel that GDCHSI was experienced enough to assist Derry.

Resident John Pelletier also disapproved of the idea, feeling that many individu-

als would be harmed by the change. "It's a disaster waiting to happen," Pelletier noted.

Judy Williams, a lifelong Derry resident and the Treasurer of the Derry Community Fund, also felt that the change would be a major mistake. She noted that she has worked closely with the human services department over the years and feels that it is in great shape at the moment, and that her clients would be adversely affected by the change. She was also concerned about the charity work that the department does and its holiday assistance efforts.

Several councilors also agreed with the residents who took issue with this change. Councilor Phyllis

## Town Council Makes Final Decision on Derry Budget

A final decision on Derry's budget for the 2019 fiscal year came to a vote during the Town Council's latest meeting on May 15, but not before several items which were flagged for various reasons needed to be discussed and voted on. The major item of the night was the decision to outsource Derry human services to a contractor company for a bottom line of \$282,745. This was something that many residents and several councilors voiced their concerns over at the meeting. Despite much opposition, the item passed 4-3.

In economic development, the town called for a reduction of the professional service line by \$25,000, increasing their marketing line by the same amount. This would put Derry's contract with Buxton Corporation on hold, leading to a bottom line change of \$154,783. The decision to do this came about from the town staff feeling that Buxton, (which was tasked with recruiting major chain businesses to Derry) has underperformed as of late. The item was approved unanimously.

In emergency services, town staff hoped to add more positions to the Derry Fire Department, getting closer to their desired goal

of having 16 firefighters on hand at all times. This would put 16 on three shifts and 15 on the department's fourth shift. The emergency services budget would increase to \$1,629,366, and the council unanimously approved the item.

Next was the planning department hoping to establish a new master plan for Derry at the cost of \$100,000. The council unanimously approved this item. For capital improvements, a resolution from last year allowed the council to accept a grant of \$36,699 for Derry's morning advisory radio system. The grant amount was taken out of the

## Derry Activates Solar Energy System at Transfer Station

After months and months of research, planning, convincing of town staff, and construction. The Derry Transfer Station finally saw the activation of its new solar energy system on May 15, ushering in another step towards eco-

friendly energy for the town.

This official installation and activation got to showcase the 86.4 kilowatt photovoltaic (PV) tracking system that is expected to produce over 156 megawatt-hours of electrical power per year. This represents about 4 percent of Derry's total annual elec-

tricity usage. It will bring Derry's use of electricity from renewable sources up to 49 percent. It is coupled with the sourcing of renewable energy from its regional electrical buying consortium.

The system consists of 240 ground mounted, 360 watt panels that are ensured

# Derry Village School Introduces STEAM Career Night

Children may have plenty of other things on their minds during their elementary school years, but it is still never too early to introduce them to the endless career prospects that they may start taking an interest in at this young age, especially when it comes to STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics) related careers.

To start giving these students a taste of the practical applications of these subjects, Derry Village School recently hosted its first STEAM Career Night on May 16.

The evening was split into two sections; the first half of the night was a traditional career fair, themed around a wide variety of STEAM-related occupations.

Students there that night, got to speak with EMTs, Electrical Engineers, Nurses, Radiology Technicians, Chiropractors, workers in Manufacturing and Retailers. IT Associates, Race Car Drivers, and Police Officers. Each one had their own presentation to explain how their jobs are related to STEAM. The

night gave students plenty of opportunities to see STEAM in action.

Plenty of the representatives also seemed quite pleased with the attempt to get students interested in STEAM, including structural engineer Steve Boyington. Working in his field for a quarter of a century, Boyington had his table showcasing videos that expanded upon his occupation, while also showing off various bridges that were constructed with popsicle sticks and K'Nex. He thought it was fantastic to show students the practical applications of these fields. "It's really great to feed their interests", Boyington noted.

The second half of the night took on a more hands-on, exciting approach to STEAM by having students, alongside their parents; participate in various activities that had them attempt to accomplish a series of goals. Students could choose to create a small parachute to successfully help a gummy bear land safely on the ground, build a breath-propelled rocket made out of straws, use different materials to produce a sturdy structure that could hold up a dictionary, retrieve a life preserver

from underneath a miniature capsized boat, and also learn the basics about Scratch, a beginner's computer programming language.

According to Amy Landry, a fourth grade teacher at Derry Village School and one of the primary organizers of the event, a number of factors went into going through with STEAM night.

Next Generation Science Standards have required that schools begin to have students tackle more performance tasks and place a focus on inquiry in their lessons. Having already seen a similar event done in Hampstead schools, Landry felt that Derry Village would be a great location for it as well. Secondly, Landry hopes to connect

her school's efforts with Pinkerton Academy's Career & Technical Education (CTE) programs. This would give younger students teens and adults to

look up to in fields that hold their interests. Inclement weather did force them to move the event's original date of February to May, which cost them roughly

half of their representatives. The students still seemed to have a blast. "No matter what, it's a success because it's our first [event]," Landry stated.

to last at least 25 years. 50,000 kilowatts per hours (kWh) for the Transfer Station and another 105,200 kWh for Derry's Wastewater Treatment Plant represents the other renewable sources.

"This solar project utilizes a state-of-the-art dual-axis solar tracking system from Granite State Solar that provides up to 45% more usable energy than fixed solar panels. It's estimated that this system will

provide three times lower energy costs than conventional power over the expected 25-year life of the system", noted Mike Fowler, Director of Public Works for Derry. While the project has been successfully approved and initiated, the process of putting it together was not easy. Derry's Net Zero Task Force, which was tasked with exploring and achieving cost effective solutions for reduced energy and water use in Derry. They began to put together their plans for introducing solar energy to Derry's major

structures. The Task Force asked the Town Council on December 19 for the funds needed to begin their work. An initial rejection of the plan by the council forced Fowler to invite a representative from Granite State Solar, the group providing these services, to speak with the council on the matter. After that representative, Erik Shifflett, elaborated on the specifications of the materials used for the project and established that the system could save Derry anywhere from \$300,000 to over \$470,000 over 25 years, the council eventually decided to support the

project.

The energy saving and cost cutting benefits of the project are clear. Derry TV recorded 100 % of the project's progress, from its inception in the planning phase to its construction and operation. they hope to incorporate this footage in classes of Derry's numerous schools to educate students about STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) subjects and other vocational programs, showcasing the capabilities of solar energy to Derry's younger residents.



# The Upper Room and Pinkerton Host Youth Day of Giving Back

Community service is always a great idea to instill within the youth, not only for the sake of attracting colleges to them, but, more importantly, to remind them of the importance of giving back to one's community and trying to make it a better place. The Upper Room Family Resource Center (URFRC) recently partnered with Pinkerton Academy (PA) to host their annual Youth Day of Giving Back. Starting at 8 a.m. in the

Hackler Gymnasium, 55 students participated in the event. Staff from both PA and the URFRC greeting them to introduce a varied assortment of community service projects that they could participate in throughout the rest of the school day.

Students could work to assemble tents at Camp Carpenter up in Manchester, craft collages and create artwork for the teen table at the Derry Public Library and

plant flowers outside of The Upper Room's headquarters. They also helped with raking and landscaping for Community Caregivers, which assists elderly and disabled veterans with performing everyday tasks, including errands and transportation. Students could also choose to play with younger children at the Southern New Hampshire Montessori Academy in Londonderry, an independent co-educational school

that allows children to study and work at their own pace. Roger Konstant, Pinkerton's Associate Dean of Students, was one of the major coordinators of the event and noted just how much students at Pinkerton enjoyed it. "The kids appreciate the opportunity to give back, and to see how much different agencies in our towns are doing for people", Konstant stated.

Indeed, many of the students enjoy the opportunity so much, that they have participated multiple times in the past, including Pinkerton senior Ashley Weatherbee, who has participated every year since her freshman year. "I look forward to it all year; it's one of my favorite days of the year. You build up an appreciation of what people are doing, it's kind of rewarding", Weatherbee noted.

The Upper Room staff, Executive Director Brenda Guggisberg was greatly

capital improvements budget, decreasing it to \$2,284,194 with council approval. The item was approved unanimously. The Derry Fire Department's proposed storage facility came next with \$100,000 being asked for to create a facility that would house vital, yet occasionally used equipment away from the elements. This project would be funded by the expendable maintenance trust, as well as possibly the department's capital reserve fund. This would increase the expendable maintenance trust's budget to \$220,000, which the council approved

unanimously.

Next was an item that asked to remove \$50,000 from the other municipal obligations budget. This was already obtained through an extension of terms for the East Broadway cellular tower. This item would decrease that budget to \$3,734,059, which the council approved unanimously. Derry's Town Clerk also had to point out an error in his budget of \$1,011, which made his budget higher than need be. The adjustment brought his budget down to \$154,897, which the council approved unanimously.

Finally, the council recently created a trust of \$25,000 that would be put towards the repair or

removal of hazardous buildings in Derry. This is a line item that was usually incurred by the Department of Public Works. As such, the item would take that amount and decrease it from the highway division budget, bringing it down to \$3,726,651. The item was approved unanimously. All flagged items were approved by the council. The FY19 budget stood at \$47,116,431. This is an increase from the original budget of \$47,037,449. This caused a decrease of the proposed tax rate, which went down from \$8.55 to \$8.51 which is still an increase from the current tax rate of \$8.44. The council unanimously approved the budget for 2019.

# Editorial

## A Day of Remembering

In the town commons of New Hampshire, the statue of a Civil War soldier is a sight we often take for granted. But a vestige of that war remains part of our lives today, as we mark the occasion of Memorial Day this coming Monday.

Memorial Day was officially proclaimed and observed in 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, as a time when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery.

Evidence of an even earlier day of remembrance comes from records of the decoration of Confederate soldiers' graves by women's groups in the South before the end of the Civil War. By 1890, the day was recognized by all northern states, while the South honored its dead on a separate date.

Then came World War I, and the day changed to a time of remembrance throughout the country for all who gave their lives in military service to the United States. Many more wars have taken the lives of American servicemen and women since then,

including the current wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. But even with the present-day fighting, it's easy to look at Memorial Day as merely another chance for a three-day weekend, an extra day off from work and school, a time for barbecues and mowing the lawn and planting the flower garden.

We suggest a different focus. Those Civil War statues, and the old cemeteries where tiny American flags stand vigil by graves, are visual reminders that thousands of lives have been given in the name of their nation's service and more are at risk today. Memorial Day is a good time to think about what those familiar objects stand for. Ceremonies in our towns on Monday will center on the cemeteries and the statues, on the flags and the wreaths.

This Memorial Day, we encourage you to take time from your busy lives and your extra day of leisure to remember, and to thank those who have made the ultimate sacrifice, as well as those who stand ready to do so today. And let us hope that sacrifice will someday no longer be necessary.

dollars OUT of our New Hampshire public schools.

I would be interested in knowing why Derry State Representatives Chirichello, Fesh, Katsakiores, Miltz, O'Connor, and Saparetto, voted against support of the N.H. public schools. (Rep. Dowling had a legitimate reason for not attending on Thursday to vote. She did respond to my e-mail, and I thank her for her response.)

Katsakiores was dead-set against outsourcing human services, as she felt that it would be a disservice to residents who rely on them. Katsakiores noted that plenty of Derry's clergy have also complained about the change and how it would complicate their own service programs. "They have a beautiful facility up there, and they have a lot of great things, but I don't think they need our people up there", Katsakiores noted. Councilor Joshua Bourdon also opposed the shift, noting that although he feels confident that Council Chair James Morgan knows what he is doing, he is not convinced that residents will not fall through the cracks. Furthermore, although Caron has assured residents that there will be oversight to keep these new services in good shape, Bourdon still worries that struggling resi-

dents will not be noticed by Caron's efforts. "I'm left not feeling convinced that the level of services we be at least maintained or improved through outsourcing," Bourdon stated.

However, not every councilor opposed the shift. Councilor Neil Wetherbee admitted to having reservations about the change, but still supports outsourcing the department. His support comes from observing how GDCHSI has operated in Londonderry for the past 12 years, and that throughout the years, they have not sought out changing this model. None the less, he will also be watching Derry's human service model closely when implemented. As for Morgan, he admitted to having a brother who suffered from Spinal Meningitis at just two years old. This disease left him with a mental handicap that

led his parents to make him a ward of the state in Massachusetts. His brother was sexually assaulted in hospitals. He eventually became homeless in his adult years. Morgan feels that his own experience; with an individual needing human services, gave him a good amount of insight into making a decision. He also noted how the contractor's number of staff could increase with this contract, and that action will be taken if their services become unsatisfactory. "I didn't just look at a book and number to make my particular stance on this tonight," Morgan said.

Although there was a clear divide between the two sides, the council chose to support the outsourcing of the human services department with a vote of 4-3, with Councilors Brian Chirichello, Wetherbee, Morgan, and Charles Foote voting yes, while Councilors Katsakiores, Bourdon, and Richard Tripp voted no.

# Teachers and Students Honored by Derry Education Association

On Thursday, May 17 at West Running Brook Middle School, the Derry Education Association (DEA) awarded four individuals for their hard work and dedication to what they do. The second scholarship award went to Pinkerton Academy senior Aiden Mulready, who will be attending Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana to work toward a degree in aviation. He hopes to become an airline pilot and eventually earn a master's degree in the field of finance.

The Friend of Education Award was given next to Ernie Richards. He is a Destination Imagination

coach at Derry Village School, and has helped his students not only to place in state competitions and learn computer programming, but also to work as a team. Richards was described as someone who never gives up on his students, and this dedication is what makes him such a good "friend" to the school district and the world of education.

Ernest P. Barka Elementary School's PACE teacher, Jane Fox, was then awarded the DEA's Teacher of the Year Award. To her surprise, three of her students stood at the podium to speak about how she has impacted their lives, and they described her as always being understanding, kind, and joyful in the classroom. # Town Council Addresses Downtown Zoning Changes

As the town of Derry moves into the future, officials see the importance of addressing new buildings and alterations to the surroundings and to make sure zoning regulations are up to

par with the needs of residents.

Planning Director George Sioras recently went before the Town Council during their latest meeting to discuss the reorganization of zoning regulations in seven lots near the downtown area.

Town staff are looking to alter seven lots from being a part of the Medium High Density Residential II Zone to the Central Business Zone.

Amongst these lots are 18 Maple Street, 34 Maple Street, 35 Maple Street, 37 Maple Street, 13 Elm Street, 15 Elm Street, and 19 Elm Street.

Located south of Horns Pond, these lots contain the likes of Linc's Auto Body, town houses, and the location of an old shoe factory that had burned down somewhat recently.

Due to their proximity to Broadway and the downtown area, these lots earned the attention of town staff and the Planning Board. There is certainly potential for expanding Derry's commercial and industrial zones and promoting economic growth. However, one of the biggest issues with these lots being in their Residential Zones is that they are not allowed to have residential housing on their second floors.

"That has prohibited some development along Broadway", Sioras noted.

By moving these lots into the Central Business Zone, the lots would be able to contain single family units, duplexes, town houses, multi-family apartments, and condominiums.

However, the process would have to be a slow one, as the Planning Board would have to gradually work on permitted uses for the parcels. Simultaneously developing certain residential uses for the newly labeled areas around Broadway. The board will need to be specific about the details with the use of overlay zones or sub-sections.

Furthermore, Benson's Hardware recently bought the 35 Maple Street lot and hopes to use it to expand their business footprint. By changing the zoning rules of the lot, the businesses would not have to seek out variances for any project. Town staff would also like to see what they can do with 19 Elm Street, which was the location of the old shoe factory previously mentioned.

The council saw no issue with the proposition and unanimously approved the change.

# Zoning Board Addresses Shed Project

A Derry couple recently came into some complications concerning zoning ordinances and a shed they hoped to put on their property, as was discussed during the Zoning Board's latest meeting on May 17.

Paul and Dawn Lescovitz of 16 Collette's Grove

Road were hoping to put a 14' by 20' shed onto their land. They also wanted to place this shed less than 35' from the front lot line and less than 15' from the side lot lines of their property.

This required the couple to go before the board to seek a variance for the build.

In their defense of the request, they noted how the area originally was a series of developed camp lots. As a result, very few houses in the area meet the requirements which are now enforced. The Lescovitz feel this puts them at a disadvantage. The couple felt that the shed would not adversely affect the safety or character of the neighborhood. It would enhance the appearance of their home and lot. Finally, they assured board members that the shed would be surrounded by fencing upon its completion.

While taking questions from the board, alternate member Donald Burgess asked the applicants why they could not simply move the shed closer to the front of their property.

The couple noted that this would put the shed directly over their underground propane tank. Secretary Stephen Coppolo agreed with Burgess, not only taking issue with the shed's odd placement, but also with the fact that it could block one's view of traffic on Sanborn Road. Mr. Lescovitz felt that a nearby yield sign would fix this problem, while Mrs. Lescovitz felt that the obstruction would force cars to slow down and be more careful.

Regardless, Coppolo saw no unnecessary hardship being incurred upon the applicants. "It seems to be a non-obvious place to want to put this," Coppolo noted. Board Chair Lynn Perkins showed some concerns over how compacted this build would make the lot, as well as its closeness to the propane tank and how close it was to the road. Because of these issues, the two sides were forced to make a compromise, with the board assigning a new location on the lot for the shed. The Board unanimously granted the variance as long as the shed was built 30 feet in from an 18 foot boundary on the property.

# Etz Hayim Synagogue Hopes to Increase Accessibility

The Etz Hayim Synagogue, upon entering, is a welcoming and inclusive space for people of all religions and backgrounds. Rabbi Peter Levy has a presence about him that is undeniably friendly and intelligent, and he is passionate about his role and his community. However, it is becoming increasingly difficult for him to ascend the stairs of the building's bema, as he uses a wheelchair due to multiple sclerosis. The bema is currently the only part of the building that is not accessible for all, and the synagogue is looking to change that by building a ramp.

Dina Chaitowitz, the synagogue's President of the Board of Directors, started a Go Fund Me donation page back in April to help get the project started, and the congregation's Building Committee has even offered to build the ramp. Over \$200 has been raised so far thanks to various donors, but more money is still needed in order for the synagogue to become accessible to all of its guests during events and religious services.

In the four years that Rabbi Levy has been at the

synagogue, the only addition to the bema that has been made to increase accessibility was two years ago, when a set of railings was installed. He explained that he wasn't the first to use them, and that congregation members who are not in wheelchairs are in need of the ramp as well.

"Grandparents are often unable to come up the bema during Bar and Bat Mitzvahs services," explained Rabbi Levy. "People are living longer now and are more functional in their communities, so we're trying to make the space available for everyone."

Members of this congregation hail not only from Derry, but surrounding communities such as Nashua, Salem, Hampstead, Chester, and more. In partnership with the Church Of Transfiguration next door, the synagogue works hard to serve the community at large, as Derry is a large interfaith community. Each month, their Elijah's Table program provides a free hot meal for everyone in attendance, regardless of their faith.

"I don't think people realize all that we do," said Rabbi Levy. "People may not realize we're here, but they would realize if we

weren't."

The New England Dance Academy recently performed "A Child's View of the Holocaust" at the synagogue, and Chaitowitz explained that if a performer had been in a wheelchair or had other mobility limitations, he or she would not have been able to make it onto the bema - they use this space as a stage when guests speak or perform.

"We have a lot of guest

lecturers as a part of our educational programs," she said, "and not having an accessible space limits our ability to invite certain speakers."

Rabbi Levy emphasized that building the ramp will simply make the space "more inclusive, open, and welcoming. Sacred spaces should be open and accessible to everyone."

Other than the Go Fund Me donation page, there have

been no official fundraisers for the building of the ramp. Congregants can realistically only donate so much, and the fundraisers that they do hold help to benefit the synagogue as a whole.

"I'd love for it to be built tomorrow!" said Rabbi Levy. "As soon as possible." In order to make

Alex Sturgess was good for seven saves in his net. Jack Sweeney played goal later and turned aside one Andover shot.


The PA offense zipped some 23 shots on Andover keeper Jeremy Morgenstein, who stopped nine of them for his 8-7 squad.

# Pinkerton Baseball Crew Goes a Great 3-1 During a Busy Week

runs on a losing day.

The next afternoon right there on its home diamond the PA contingent looked rather sleepy through the first part of the game, drawing the boiling ire of coach Campo. But in the end the hosts were good enough for a 5-1 victory despite only slapping four hits off of Memorial pitching.

Runge was strong on the hill for his Astros, holding the visiting Crusaders to just four hits and two walks while striking out six would-be hitters. Brady Day knocked two of the winning side's hits.

Then after a day of rest the academy hitmen made the short road trip to Manchester to take on the Trinity High Pioneers, who they walloped in a 13-0 shutout.


Pinkerton bashed its way out to a 9-0 lead in the first inning and had no reason to




