Derry Voters Come Out in Drove for Mid-Term Election

Despite the rains, and chilling temperatures, more than 11,000 voters came out to the polls at West Running Brook Middle School and Gilbert H. Hood during the mid-term elections in Derry on Tuesday, Nov. 6 to cast their vote.

Republicans held their seats, for the most part, despite Democrats winning elsewhere around the state.

There were 18 candidates running for 10 District six State Representative seats with the incumbents taking nine of them.

Democrat Mary Eisner was able to beat out Republican Frank Sapareto for the last seat.

Two Derry residents, former Town Councilor Kevin Coyle and a current Town Councilor Joshua Bourdon, had a close outcome in Derry for County Commissioner. Bourdon wound up with more votes locally, but Coyle prevailed overall.

Derry Master Plan Meeting Scheduled for Nov. 28

The Derry Master Plan Update Meeting will take place on Nov. 28 at 6 pm at the Pinkerton Academy Freshman Auditorium. The Plan has not been updated since 2010, and it is expected to take approximately twelve months to prepare the new document. The master plan is seen as a method for the town to identify existing resources and work toward goals identified by the citizens as being important for town growth. The 2010 version is a 455-page document discussing the vision for the town at that time. At different points, business owners and

citizens will be invited to public forums to participate in the process for the new update.

Derry Planning has combined efforts with Community Circle, a Massachusetts company that has assisted many towns with their planning goals and Master Plans. Planning has also associated with Martha Lyon Landscape Architecture, LLC, Barrett Planning Group, LLC, and BETA Group to assist with the large undertaking. Community Circle is a Massachusetts company that has assisted many towns with their planning goals and Master Plans. Community Circle develops plans for municipalities that result in

a clear and concise road map for the future. Community Circle focuses on the idea that a meaningful participation process is the foundation of good planning.

The upcoming meeting will be the kickoff for the process and the intent, according to Planning Director George Sioras, "is to reach out to all members of the community, young people, seniors, business owners, and civic groups to see what they would like to see happen in Derry." Daphne Politis and her team from Community Circle will be assisting at the meeting. The initial feedback will be used to complete

Pinkerton Academy Team Takes Top Spot at Math Meet

Pinkerton came out victorious in Division I at the Londonderry Tri-State League math meet at Londonderry High School (LHS) on Nov. 7, beating out Portsmouth. Math teams at the meet compete in a battle of exceptional math students, so the future is really bright for Pinkerton Academy's talented high school math students.

Timberlane Regional High School placed third, and Londonderry took fourth, Exeter High School was the fifth place team, and Dover came in sixth.

In Division II, Windham beat out the second place Amesbury, Mass. team with Winnacunnet High School grabbing third

and Oyster River took fourth place.

The Tri-State Math League consists of 10 schools that compete in two divisions (based on the size of the school) in 6 meets a year. Each student at the meet competes individually in 3 of 5 math categories and also in a team round. The combined individual + team scores determine the competition winner. The recent meet used math problems derived from 5 math categories: Arithmetic (Evaluations), Exponents and Radicals, Linear Functions, Polygons and Rational Expressions & Equations. You don't have to be a math genius to know this contest requires much mental skill and puts a focus on truly talented mathematicians.

Mathematics geniuses who compete in the league can also be selected for NH State teams where the competition is fierce as scholarship money is rewarded.

Teams are typically comprised of the top student math wizards - as recognized from school math classes. Pinkerton has a Varsity math team that sends ten students to each meet with no more than 5 seniors and no more than 8 juniors and seniors as part of that team. There is also a Junior Varsity team open to Freshmen, Sophomores, Juniors or Seniors interested in becoming members of the Varsity math team. Teams have regular math practices to sharpen their skills.

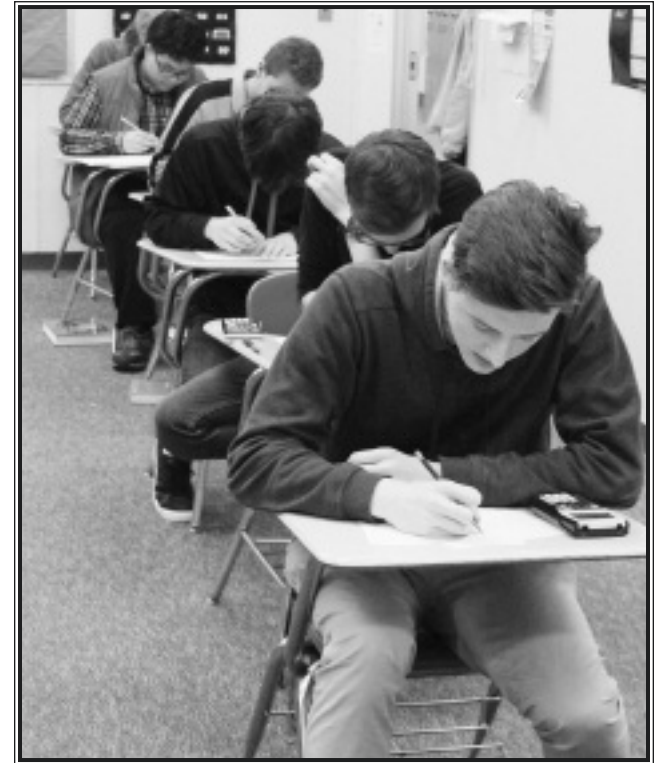
Pinkerton has a wonderful Math Team program

coached by Doris Garvey, who is also a Math teacher at Pinkerton. Doris reports that Pinkerton has been Number 1 in the league in 2012 - 2016, and 2018 and came in second to Portsmouth in 2017. Doris says the team hopes to have the Pinkerton name on the first place plaque again for 2019!

Best of all, individuals involved in the math team program have an opportunity to be selected to compete at national levels through NH State meets held at various locations across the country during the year. Selected students first compete at regional levels as a part of the NH State Math Team. A NH State event has been held at the HarvardMIT Math Tournament this month and future meets will be held - with Harvard/MIT support - at the Londonderry High School this winter, at Yale University in the spring,

and then at Penn State early summer for the nationals.

The NH State math meets are a place where math geniuses can earn scholarship money for these Ivy League schools or for other schools, so while the competition is strong, students who persevere and work hard to develop their skills are rewarded handsomely.

Season for Giving and Giving Thanks

The season is rapidly ramping up to its frantic pace for overindulging on Thanksgiving and buying too much for Christmas. But one of the nice things about living here is the generosity that comes out in full force as well at the holidays. Whether it's a free, church-sponsored Thanksgiving dinner hosted and prepared for anyone and everyone who, regardless of their financial status, seem ready to dig into their pockets to help those less fortunate. As an aside, recent national news stories report that wealthier people donate less of their income proportionately to charity than people whose incomes are lower.

Our pages are filled with announcements of coat, hat and scarf collection drives; boot collections; food pantry requests; and wished for gifts for the needy. It starts young, with school children collecting pennies and clothing to help others, older students hosting more extensive collection drives, and adults contributing time, money or gifts to help "adopted" families not in a position to buy gifts for the holidays otherwise.

Local drives make it feasible for most people to help out. Children grow out of their clothes, and clothing drives, particularly for winter

items, are a great place to recycle those items and know that they are going to someone in need. Living in a state without a sales tax, we often don't carry around the pennies we get back from purchases, and a penny drive to aid the less fortunate is a great use for those coins.

Then there are food and gift needs for local families, usually collected under the auspices of food pantries and churches and "giving trees." Buying a few extra cans of soup or packages of macaroni and cheese may make the difference to a local family experiencing hard times, but have little impact on the giver's household budget.

We live in an affluent area, and we don't often see visible indications of need. But organizations like Family Promise, which provides shelter for local homeless families, or the busy food pantries in each of our towns, are strong indicators that while we are surrounded by the trappings of comfort, they don't include everyone. So when you plan your gift giving this year, think of your neighbors as well. And if you have some spare time on your hands, consider helping out at free meals, soup kitchens, or fundraisers for the holidays. It's a rewarding way to express the spirit of the coming season.

The Derry Go Green team wants to help you see the secret life of these hidden gems, while having a fun time walking through

scenic conservation lands in 2019.

As they have done in the past, the Go Green team is planning to create a Snowshoe Conservation Tour this Winter. The team also intends to support conservation walk events around Derry in the Spring, Summer and Fall. They hope you will participate, and want to support you with an opportunity to see nature from a unique per-

spective.

The Snowshoe Conservation Tour being planned is targeted to match snowfall situations, so stay tuned for the dates of the tour. If you or someone, including kids, ever wanted to learn how to snowshoe, this will be a great opportunity to do so - while having a fun time seeing a Derry Area conservation site. There is a lot more life in the winter than may be

New Hampshire has a program initiative to develop and support Land Stewardship. Anyone interested in becoming a

Land Steward for some of Derry's beautiful conservation easement lands can contact Go Green via their web site for further information.

Go Green is also known for recycling awareness efforts and the bi-annual Derry "Town Wide Clean Up Weeks." You may have recently used blue bags organized by Go Green folks to help clean up local Derry road areas. The October 2018 clean up week in Derry was another successful environmental initiative that also raised "green" awareness. Go Green typically also plans a Derry clean up week during the Spring and coordinates this initiative with Earth Day.

Go Green's Mission is to educate the Derry com-

munity on the beauty and value of our natural resources; Encourage the exploration of the outdoors; and Engage all in living greener through recycling, reducing waste and using technologies that reduce reliance on finite resources. The Go Green team works directly with the Derry Town Conservation Committee to align their program and efforts.

Astros Football Squad Heads to Finals after Win in Salem

For the 12th time in the last 15 seasons, and the second consecutive time, the Pinkerton Academy football team will play for the Division I state championship.

The Astros did it again on the road, demolishing Salem High School with a decisive 31-7 win last Saturday in the semifinals and securing the ticket to the last game of the season, where they will face a very strong and undefeated Bedford team.

The DI final will be played at the University of New Hampshire football field this Saturday, starting at 6 p.m.

The Astros were only the number four seed entering the playoffs, but after knocking out the top seed, rivals Londonderry High School in a dramatic fashion in the first round, they saved themselves and their fans the pressure this time, leaving the Blue Devils no chance.

Pinkerton got off to an amazing start and after stopping the hosts for a quick three-and-out, they needed only one minute and 48 seconds to get their first points of the game, when Gannon Fast found some space and took the ball 40 yards to the

end zone to make it six to nothing Astros.

Salem almost answered in the next drive, after quarterback Kyle Poulin found with a beautiful side-to-side pass his WR, Michael Ference, who was stopped short of the end zone, but gained 60 yards on the play.

Unfortunately for Salem, a face mask was called against them on that very same play and the ball moved back from PA's 11 yard line to the 26. Pinkerton's defense was able to regroup from their only bad play of the day and stop the hosts on 4th down to get the ball back.

On the first play of their next drive, the Astros moved the ball with another 40 yard run by Fast, but eventually they had to punt it. Defense kept being on top of things, allowing the Blue Devils only one first down the entire first half and Pinkerton got a great chance to go to the locker rooms with a larger lead, but a 6:13 minutes, 13 play drive that took the visitors all the way from their 44 yard line to Salem's 1 ended with a brave goal line stand by Salem and after 24 minutes of football, the score remind 6-0. By halftime, Fast already had 13 carries for 117 yards.

The third quarter was when it all clicked for Pinkerton. Salem was hoping to change the game, but Nick Lombard had other plans and on the fourth play of the half, he took the ball for 49 yards and a touchdown. The extra point was missed, thanks to the muddy field (Pinkerton didn't convert any of its five extra points during the game), but now it was 12-0 and it was only the beginning.

Another stop on 4th down gave the Astros the

ball on their own 37 yard line. They ran the ball 13 times, and after 6:16 minutes, found the end zone once again, this time thanks to a 10 yard run by Gennaro Marra. The Astros almost extended their lead quickly, when their kickoff hit one of the Salem players ("it was not an onside kick", said coach Brian O'Reilly after the game, smiling, "we had no intention for that to happen. But we say 'thank you very much'"), but this time Salem's defense was able to get the stop and the third quarter ended with a promis-

ing 18-0 lead for the visitors.

The Blue Devils began their last chance on their 20 yard line after a good Pinkerton punt. A false start and a taunting penalty pushed them back to the five yard line and another false start made it 3rd and 28. After an incompletion by Poulin, Salem tried a punt but Pinkerton's special team was all over it, Allen Gault with the block and Fast with the cover and touchdown. By now, with 11:14 to go and the scoreboard showing Pinkerton 24, Salem 0, it was more or less game over and the home fans were slowly leaving the freezing stands.

Salem lost the ball again on downs and Fast ran for 15 yards for his third touchdown of the game, to make it 30-0 with 8:23 on the clock. Salem was eventually able to score some points, with three excellent play, an 11 yard run by Riley Mulvey, followed by a 15 yard run by Brandon Wall and a 24 yard touchdown that Donovan Abraham caught, but it was way too little and way too late and the game was over.

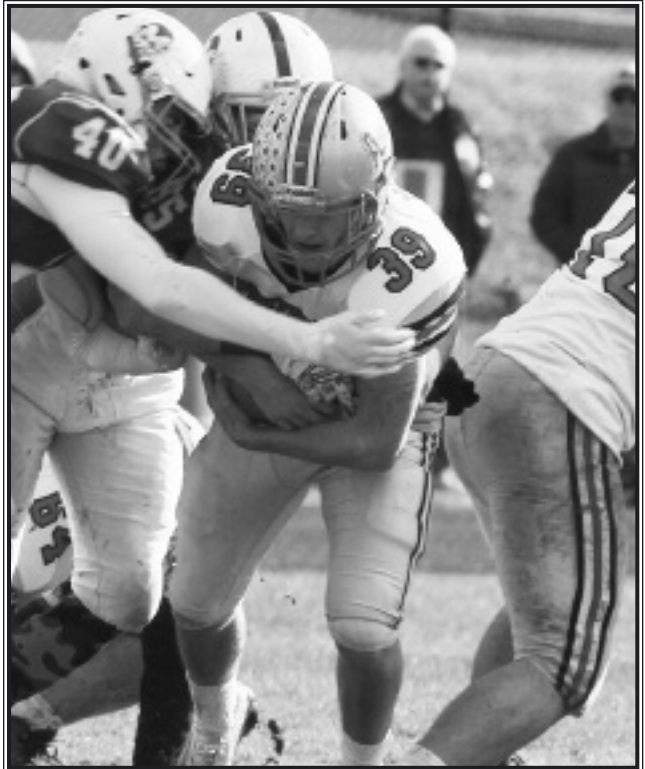

PA Girls' Ice Hockey team Ready for Inaugural Season

There is a new varsity team at Pinkerton Academy preparing for the winter season, and it is aiming straight to the top. For the first time ever, the Astros will have a girls' ice hockey team, that will join the school's varsity and JV boys' ice hockey teams.

While ice hockey for high school boys enjoys a long history in the state of New Hampshire, running all the way back to 1947, the girls first championship was won by Hanover High School in 2008. Hanover lost their title in the next year, but won every other championship ever since,

bringing their total to ten out of 11 possible titles. Now, Pinkerton Academy dreams of changing that dominance.

The new team will be coached by Scott Dunn, who has been working for the last several years at Manchester Regional Youth Hockey Association (MRYHA) as a coach and is also part of the MRYHA's board of directors as a Director of Strategic Planning.

This will be Dunn's first time as a high school ice hockey coach, but the level four (out of five) USA Hockey coach has experience working with female athletes: "I am currently coaching a boys team with two girls in it, one of them is my own daughter", Dunn

said recently, "And I've coached a few girls teams in tournaments in recent years."

Dunn says that Pinkerton Academy's Athletic Director, Brian O'Reilly, was the one who pushed for a girls' ice hockey team to be established, and found the money needed to make it happen: "There are a lot of girls in our area who play competitive ice hockey, outside the school. O'Reilly saw that, and thanks to him, we have a team now", said Dunn, "I can't say how come there wasn't a Pinkerton team until today".

Dunn is counting on the girls' previous experience. He will hold three tryouts: on Monday, Nov. 26, at the Tri-Town Ice Arena in Hooksett (at 4:10 p.m.), on Thursday, Nov. 29, at the Cyclones Arena Hockey in Hudson at 4:20 p.m. and on the next day, Friday, Nov. 30, back in Tri-Town at 4:30 p.m. He expects about 25-30 players to show up for the tryouts, most of them already familiar with the game. Eventually, Dunn will have to select 18 skaters plus two goalies for his new team, and he hopes to have

five more practice squad players as well.

Once the tryouts will conclude and the players selected, the PA team will only have about two weeks and five practices to get ready for its first ever game, a home meeting against Bishop Brady High School.

The first puck will drop at the Tri-Town Arena on Dec. 12 at 3 p.m.

The Lady Astros will play a total of five home games: three at the Tri-Town Arena (Dec. 21, 8 p.m., against Concord and Jan. 23, 3 p.m., against St.

Thomas Aquinas High School) and two more home games at the Ice Den Arena (Jan. 5, at 1 p.m., against Bishop Guertin High school and Feb. 9, 6:40 p.m., against Bedford High School). They will face a total of 15 teams in their division.

"I looked forward to the season", said the new coach, "I did some research and I believe will be very competitive. We are very excited about this. We have been waiting a long time to have a girls' ice hockey team in our school".

Senior Amelia Graves of Hampstead made All-State first team for the second straight year, and her teammate Leya Wang, a junior from Chester made third team All-State.

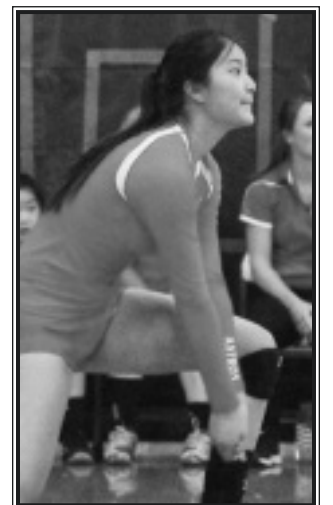

Pinkerton Alumni Inducted into the NHIAA Hall of Fame

Back in the early 90s, Patricia "Tricia" Dunn-Luoma was doing it all at Pinkerton Academy. Born in Derry, she attended the local high school, where she quickly became a standout field hockey and softball player for the Astros.

Now, after a successful career as an ice hockey player, including winning three Winter Olympic medals with the U.S. Ice Hockey Women's team, she received a great honor, becoming part of the 18th NHIAA (New Hampshire Interscholastic Athletic Association) Hall of Fame Class.

Dunn-Luoma, 44, will be inducted into the NHIAA Hall of Fame in a ceremony that will be held on Sunday, Nov. 18, at the Grappone Conference Center Courtyard Marriott in Concord. She was selected for the "Athlete" category, next to

football coach William "Billy" Ball from Exeter, official William Makarawicz, fellow ice hockey star Tara Mounsey and contributors Jamie Staton and Matthew Swrdberg.

Dunn-Luoma played in the fall and spring seasons for Pinkerton Academy teams, until her graduation in 1992. She was named captain of the field hockey team and scored the winning goal for the team in the 1991 Class L State Championship Game. Her coaches said she earned much respect and admiration from them, as well as from her teammates and competitors. She was highly coachable, and was selected President of her class (a role she later relinquished in order to focus on sports) and served on the Students Council.

Dunn-Luoma testified about herself that while field hockey and softball, the sports she played with great success while at Pinkerton

Academy, were both passions born later in her formative years, she vividly remembers herself skating at a very young age. Her mother recounted a story about the future ice hockey star: Dunn-Luoma brought home a "learn to skate" brochure

she received in her kindergarten and ever since, she was skating on the ice.

As all-girls ice hockey teams were not established back then, Dunn-Luoma used to compete on the all-boys teams and enrolled with the Manchester Flames

Organization. During her junior year at Pinkerton Academy, she joined an all-girls team in Chelmsford, MA. When she learned that for the first time ever, women ice hockey will be a part of the Winter Olympic Games in 1998, she became focused on the goal of representing the United States.

After graduating from Pinkerton Academy Dunn-Luoma went on to play ice hockey for the University of New Hampshire (UNH), where she played as forward, scoring 60 goals and assisting 57 for a total of 117 points in 108 college games. In her senior year, Dunn-Luoma was named to the all-tournament team after helping UNH winning the ECAC title, in a five overtime game against Providence College. She graduated from UNH in 1996 with a degree in psychology.

Upon graduation she tried out and made the US Olympic team for the 1998

Winter Olympic Games in Nagano, Japan.

As an Olympian, she was part of the US Women Ice Hockey team who won gold medal in the inaugural ice hockey tournament in the Winter Olympics. The US team won the finals against Canada, 3-1. Four years later, at the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City, Dunn-Luoma and the Americans took the silver medal, after losing the final to the Canadians.

In 2006, her Dunn-Luoma got her third and last Olympic medal, this time finishing with the bronze at the 2006 Winter Olympics in Turin, Italy. She also played in six World Championships, winning five silver medals (1997, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2004) and in four Three/Four Nations Cup tournaments. She also played for Minnesota Whitecaps in the Western Women's Hockey League between 1996 and 2006.
