ZBA Debates Future of Electronic Signs in Derry Commercial Zones

Deliberations and questions about a request for a variance for an electronic message center got a bit sensitive during the Derry Zoning Board Adjustment meeting on Dec. 20, 2018. Applicant David Benedict had already moved his business from Londonderry to establish commerce in the greater Derry area as Derry Plumbing and Heating, and he decided a messaging center sign would be a good thing for his business and for Derry residents.

Benedict attended the Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting with his attorney, Steve Clark. He was looking for a variance for his business at 41 Birch Street

to install the message center signage to augment his current business sign. In addition to creating awareness for his business, his intention for installing the electronic sign is to create public service awareness about safety and maintenance issues related to building systems.

For example, sign messaging might change seasonally with different notes daily to alert and remind people to check their boiler system or have their AC checked out and maintained, so those systems are optimized for seasonal conditions. In the fall, there might be a message that reminds people to check their carbon monoxide and smoke detector systems for safety's sake.

The business owner pointed out that the location for the sign was to be rented from the condo association property next to his business, so the condo association board had ok'd his purpose for the sign.

Benedict's business is in a zoned commercial area near Parkland hospital and there are already electronic type signs in the area. The ZBA considered that the sign would be set up to meet Derry commercial guidelines, though the discussion got delicate as ZBA Board Secretary, Stephen Coppollo expressed concerns as to what might happen if the business moves again and sells property rights for the sign to another commercial business.

Derry School Budget and Redistricting Proposals

What plan will Derry's School District adopt for the next school budget in conjunction with district restructuring, a possible school closing, and for a rearrangement of school computer science labs in 2019?

The current proposals offered are the result of a broad study process about district facilities that began nearly four years ago. The study involved residents, teachers, board members and other stakeholders forming strong committees to evaluate every spot utilized in the schools and

administrative areas.

Tuesday, Jan. 15, 2019 6:30 p.m. at West Running Brook Middle School is set for a key Public Hearing on Proposed 2019-2020 Budget.

Committee recommendations from the committee studies include a model to join grades 5 to 8 in one school setting, redistricting the schools, or an eventual school closing due to enrollment declines in various age groups.

A public survey included a community perspective for the study. Important decisions by the district are about to come early in 2019. Recommendations from planning sessions are now on the home stretch for district deci-

sions. So, now is the time for the community to voice their concern or to support appropriate actions going forward.

A Deliberative Session to present and begin organization of recommended actions will be conducted at West Running Brook Middle School Saturday, Feb. 9, 2019 10 a.m. Voting on the School District budget and initiatives will occur on Tuesday, March 12, 2019.

Public Participation Wanted for Derry's Master Plan Process

Council Accepts Historic Fountain from Town Founder's Descendants

The Derry Town council accepted a legacy gift that has come full circle in time to link to the upcoming 2019 Nutfield celebration. On April 11, 2019 Derry will formally launch the Nutfield Tricentennial, as

that date commemorates the anniversary of founding father, Pastor Reverend James MacGregor's first notated public sermon with his new community. This was the connecting event for the founding of the Nutfield and for this specific area which was eventually incorporated into the Town

of Derry.

There are quite a few MacGregor family descendants who still live in the Derry Area today and the family — with support from the Derry Village Rotary formally gifted the Town of Derry with an historic fountain contribution. The

Derry Community Access Media Enhances Vision for Greater Derry

As the Cable Division Coordinator for Derry Community Access Media, Owen Provencher is a busy person these days and he has some new video and multimedia tools in his belt.

"We want to empower the Greater Derry Community with a big people reach. So, we will continue to enhance support for the Town of Derry Government programming that connects the community to government meetings and events. And with our initiatives for 2019, we will help the Greater Derry public produce media, communications, and interactions in beneficial ways that reach out and engage the community," reports Provencher.

Derry Community TV and Public Access are now evolving into Derry Community Access Media or DerryCAM. The new name and logo will officially kick off early in 2019 with additional initiatives to kick in over the coming year.

The updated name also calls out the expansion for DerryCAM beyond its public access TV roots with the addition of a radio station - once it acquires the license for 95.1 FM from a Londonderry organization that is projected to occur in 2019.

DerryCAM is being set up to support emerging online media including podcasts, virtual reality and augmented reality (AR) and other types of media technology initiatives for public communications.

Augmented Reality is a

content production technology that superimposes a computer-generated image on a user's view of the real world, thus providing a composite view. Wayfair, a large home furnishing company has an app today that essentially lets you see what their furniture or furnishings look like in your house while you move the virtual furniture around. Pokemon Go is currently the big-name game in AR. This type of technology as well as Virtual Reality will be supported as DerryCAM continues to add new media technology tools and support systems.

While Derry CAM will be accessible for Derry Residents and Businesses, it is important to know this is truly a public initiative that will work out best to leverage public volunteer skills

and expertise within the community for certain projects. People who are media savvy and want to participate may want to plan to get involved.

So, what does all this media technology mean for Derry? The simple answer is that DerryCAM has a new mission to take media production and communications directly to the community in ways that were not possible or were previously cost prohibited only a few years ago.

With the Nutfield 300 Celebration in 2019, Provencher says his team of media aficionados have some really exciting ideas for projects that will likely provide a legacy of celebration memories. For example, the renovation of the old Nutfield meeting place and

church in East Derry is being documented to create a full multimedia experience that can connect Nutfield Tricentennial events to the community with incredible live and interactive media documentation.

With so many events happening now in Greater Derry, production vision using the internet means that DerryCAM is cutting the cord. Productions can now be captured and broadcast live or for recorded post production anywhere there is decent WIFI and that means almost anywhere in Derry now. No need for satellite dishes or cable connections anymore with only a few

limitations. Over the next several years as 5G wireless technology is deployed, speed, quality limitations, as well as dead spots will virtually be eliminated.

Lots of equipment updates have occurred over the past few months and updates to the Town's production facilities will continue in 2019. The Town Council and Town Administrator have given the initiative a thumbs up as a strategic priority.

This initiative is not a burden to community tax payers as zero tax dollars are being used. The project is fully funded via the franchise fees paid by cable customers in their cable bills.

It was pointed out that since the sign on condo property, there was oversight about who could acquire and use the sign. The board discussed that the sign would likely need to conform to the association's restrictions, so there was a good check to insure the sign would be handed off properly.

Secretary Coppollo was adamant about requiring the owner to take on a sunset

limitation if the variance was granted. His concern was that the next owner might use the sign improperly or for a business that he felt might not be suitable to use an electronic messaging center. His fear was that a business like a vap store or medical marijuana dispensary, Keno, Lotto, tobacco sales or similar might leverage the sign's attractive messaging technology.

Coppollo felt that sunset limitations might be placed on any possible variance

granted as it would be important to protect the Town by policing community morals. Coppollo mentioned he did not want quotes from Bob Marley scrolling by (on the electronic message sign).

The discussion was steered between Coppollo and Randall Kelly, ZBA Board member who was concerned about too much restriction being mandated by government. Discussion evolved about if there is a need, as signage technology

evolves, for the Town government to restrict what types of businesses can use them and in this specific case - does a sunset variance restrict a business owner from selling property to certain types of businesses? And won't the condo association check future usage of this sign.

When the discussion ended and a vote was taken, the variance was granted to Derry Plumbing Heating with a 4 to 1 vote without a sunset variance limitation.

Students and Industry Meet, Greet and Grow at Pinkerton

The high cost of college or university these days can be a burden for many NH students. Perhaps there is a better way to enter the workforce today with a worthy job, at a good salary, without baggage from college loans.

At the recent Meet, Greet and Grow Event at Pinkerton Academy that was held on Dec. 18 for students and industry recruiters, a light shined on a better way with a whole set of career opportunities. And these opportunities may be a better career choice after high school for many new workers vs. immediately starting college full time.

The event concept included student - industry interactions set up to enhance social skill engagement in a slightly casual environment. Industry recruiters were on hand with an ability to hire on the spot and these employers brought employment applications and company literature.

The solution for many new workers to consider may be trade apprenticeships or vocations within certain businesses aligned to the worker's vision and skills. As in the past, there are programs and careers for students to earn decent money without a college

degree.

However, what's different today is the real need for more skilled workers along with more career opportunities now available for new workers vs. the past decade. For example, some local NH industry businesses need capable workers right away, so they are quite competitive with positioning their job opportunities. Some of these companies pay new workers good wages even while they are being trained. And several industry trade businesses offer paid sponsorships for their workers to continue on to college goals while working for their company.

Many young people may do better in their career to learn a specific trade as they can work with local NH businesses right after high school rather than immediately taking on a big debt for college. The good news is that respectable pay can be earned as an apprentice while developing skills for long term livelihoods. And college or university education may still be subsidized by the company they work for.

Doug Cullen, Pinkerton Academy's Manager for Career Services developed this Meet, Greet and Grow event for students of various academic levels to connect with local industry

recruiters. As Cullen pointed out, the event was actually a student-industry focused "social" that informally brings industry partners and students together within a more casual environment over refreshments.

At this opportunity forum, Pinkerton students were introduced to many different local industry companies. Even the City of Concord, NH was at the event looking for students to fill certain city jobs for the coming year including for summer jobs such as being a lifeguard for the city's pools.

In attendance were HR professionals, and recruiters from many different industries looking to hire students now or next summer for their businesses. Some of the companies represented included Jewell Instruments, Cobham Integrated Electronic Solutions, SemiGen Microelectronics Academy, Eastern Vent Systems, Knott's Landcare, and Eastern Propane and Oil.

In addition, a representative, Joan Glines from Learn NH Apprenticeship, a NH Community College initiative was there to discuss apprenticeship programs with the students.

Students had name badges and were well prepared for the meeting with career stories, and

resumes. They also created business cards with their contact information and job description direction. For example, Steven Boutin has a goal to become an Aerospace Engineer and another student, Mason Giannelli is looking forward to a career as a Mechanical Engineer. Both of these students engaged with several businesses that may be a suitable fit for their career direction.

Giannelli reported, "While attending the forum, I got to meet many great companies. This event allowed me to have the opportunity to meet companies I could have a chance pursuing after graduation. All the companies gave me a great overview of what they have to offer. The idea of meeting many different companies at such a young age is a great experience to have, not only because you get a chance to be employed but also the chance to simply talk to people about real world jobs."

There were some great connections made; both students and industry representatives found relationships were developed that could be beneficial for all concerned.

As Cullen said, "This event was set up for networking and as a small step to meet industry con-

tacts to form a bigger connection for a future career. And the industries here, will benefit finding enthusiastic students eager to begin their careers."

Is it 'sauce' or 'gravy'?

That is the question among connoisseurs of Italian cuisine, when it comes to what to call your favorite pasta topping.

It's the great gravy debate: Gravy vs. Sauce.

We posted on Facebook, "Nothing says Sunday like a big pot of simmering gravy on the stove." Several relatives promptly reminded me after they had seen the post that it was "Sauce, not gravy." Sauce was red and served over pasta, and gravy was brown served over meat.

Sauce is generally defined as a thick liquid served with food, usually savory dishes, to add moistness and flavor, whereas gravy is defined as the fat and juices exuding from meat during cooking, but generally serves the same purpose as sauce.

So where does the dispute come from? Depends on where you're from.

Gravy, in the Southern United States cuisine, is the name for dressing made from the drippings of roasted meat or fowl. The drippings are cooked on the stovetop at high heat with onions and/or other vegetables, and then thickened with a thin mixture of water and either wheat flour or cornstarch.

This isn't the case to Italians. We say it depends on what you put in the pot.

Traditionally, according to Italians, "gravy" has meat in it, and sauce has no meat, and usually contains vegetables and herbs, if anything at all.

But if you take the Italian language as a guide, a sauce with meat in it should be called a "ragu," not "gravy".

Italian-Americans typically connote 'gravy' to mean a sauce with meat in it, but according to 18th century Italian cook Alberto Alvisi, who first used the term, that's a ragu. So "sauce" is technically a more accurate term coming from the Italian word "salsa", which means "topping".

So where did the term "gravy" come from, and why have so many people jump on the gravy train?

We believe the confusion probably started when newly arrived Italian Americans, anxious to assimilate to American culture, started calling their ragu the same thing other Americans called their meat-based sauces - "gravy."

The term stuck, and people have been using it ever since, though some will tell you they also call gravy "Sunday sauce" because it is what their grandmothers served at big family gatherings after Sunday Mass.

To those sauce-sayers out there, I say, "You can keep your sauce, to us it will always be gravy."

As the debate rages, some prefer not to stir the pot.

"People say 'Oh, it's sauce;' 'No, it's gravy' - call it whatever you want." (who said this? I would cite sources if you got certain segments from blogs, etc) Either way, most will agree that pasta with some tomato and/or meat covering tastes better than plain.

But that's an entirely different debate for another day.

begun the process of updating Derry's Master Plan.

Derry Town Council Administrator, David Caron wants to stress that community participation is invited and coveted. Participation from Derry residents promises to be rewarding as residents can influence the future of their community.

The Derry Master Plan was last updated in 2010 and is done every 10 years according to Derry Planning Director George Sioras. The end result of the plan update will be a dynamic, living document to provide the basis for decision making for the next decade.

The results of the 2010 Derry Master Plan brought phase 1 revitalization to the downtown Derry as a result of community and business participation, so the public should know that community input has purpose.

The Master Plan needs your participation now and will include community profiles, surveys and collective meetings joining many stakeholders in the process.

The Lexington, Massachusetts-based Community Circle group lead by, Daphne Politis will help Derry with the master plan update process. Politis points out that input from the community is key to

identifying planning priorities.

Exit 4A Plan Moving Forward as Public Comment Periods Close

The Exit 4A project has been in the making since 1985 and is now posed to begin construction in 2019. The physical exit location was moved from original planning south of Exit 4 to come off from I93 about a mile north of the current Exit 4 and head east through Londonderry to connect near Folsom Road in Derry around the intersection of Madden Road and North High Street.

Road area reconstruction will continue through Derry via Tsienneto Road and extend to the Beaver Lake area. The length of the project corridor is expected to be a little over three miles.

The Dec. 5th public hearing set up 30 days for final inclusion of comments or questions within the official project record. So final comments and review of the Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement (SDEIS) has been scheduled for closure on Jan. 4th, 2019.

With the SDEIS closing period, a combined Final Environmental Impact Statement and Record of Decision (FEIS/ROD) is anticipated in the March 2019 time frame, with a final Design and Permitting process to occur after that date, so the project can be launched in 2019.

In December 2015, Derry Town Council voted to enter into a three-party agreement with Londonderry and NHDOT to move forward with the project. Both towns committed to spending \$5 million in total for Exit 4A.

About 200 Derry and Londonderry residents will be impacted during the project construction. Some residents will have properties acquired by the State of New Hampshire under Department of Transportation (DOT) guidelines, so it is vital for those impacted to reach out to the DOT to prepare for the project's impact.

The project is included in the state's approved 10-year plan with a price tag of approximately \$56 million.

Additional Community Actions and Events Targeted for 2019

Upcoming events to watch for early in 2019 include The Derry Solar Electricity Project, Local Town/School Elections and Town of Derry Government meetings. It is always good to keep an eye on the interesting events and actions that Pinkerton Academy conducts.

Consider that 2019 begins a historical celebration for Derry, as the Nutfield Tricentennial kicks off a year of festive events and memories that should be interesting for all of the Greater Derry community.

Pinkerton Students Commended by Governor for Suicide Prevention Awareness

Suicide is the second leading cause of death for ages 10-34 in New Hampshire. A recent CDC report revealed suicide rates were up 48.3 percent in New Hampshire from 1999 to 2016 - the 3rd highest rate increase in the US. NH has amongst the highest per capita suicide rates overall in the nation.

On Wednesday, Dec. 19, 15 Pinkerton Academy students and members of the school counseling department were recognized by New Hampshire Gov. Chris Sununu for their work in suicide prevention and their contributions to student safety and mental health awareness. Gov. Sununu has put considerable focus to direct awareness toward Suicide Prevention with prevention events and directives.

The Pinkerton students and faculty members had

traveled to the Statehouse to meet with the governor and then speak about their efforts to the NH Executive Council.

During the spring of 2018, 15 Pinkerton Academy students had been trained in suicide prevention and mental health awareness by Ann Duckless of the National Alliance on Mental Illness. These students then presented what they learned this fall to 411 of their peers in health classes at Pinkerton.

The students taught their peers about the risk factors and warning signs for suicide. A peer-to-peer student teaching-learning approach can reduce the communications stigma about mental illness.

And this approach has proven to be an effective prevention mechanism though these efforts are part of larger works by the school's prevention specialist, Julie Donovan. Dono-

van hopes to train more students each year and educate all Pinkerton students on the warning signs of suicide.

The trained students emphasized that mental illness is nothing to be ashamed of and that help is available, encouraging students to talk with someone.

Of the nearly 45,000 lives lost to suicide across the United States in 2016, 54 percent did not have a known mental health condition, according to the Centers for

Disease Control (CDC).

As referenced in the CDC report, suicide rate parallelism to the opioid crisis in NH is striking. And while the rates have risen among all demographics, the highest rates of suicide are found with middle-aged white men.

The Greater Derry Area was hit particularly hard in 2018 with several tough suicide cases that made regional and national news.

While New Hampshire

has an "excellent" state suicide prevention plan, "it's not really funded to be operational, ... as the state with its current budgets puts very little funding into prevention efforts, according to Ken Norton, Executive Director of National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI-NH) who is also serves on the NH Suicide Prevention Council.

It can be frightening and intimidating when a loved one shows signs of suicidal thoughts. However, not taking thoughts of suicide seriously can have a devastating outcome. If you think your friend or family member will hurt herself or someone else, call 911 immediately. There are a few ways to approach this situation.

- Remove means such as guns, knives or stockpiled pills

- Calmly ask simple and direct questions, such as "Can I help you call your psychiatrist?"

- Talk openly and hon-

estly about suicide. Don't be afraid to ask questions like "Do you have a plan for how you would kill yourself?"

- If there are multiple people, have one person speak at a time

- Ask what you can do to help

- Don't argue, threaten or raise your voice

- Don't debate whether suicide is right or wrong

- If your loved one asks for something, provide it, as long as the request is safe and reasonable

- If you are nervous, try not to fidget or pace

- If your loved one is having hallucinations or delusions, be gentle and sympathetic, but do not get in an argument about whether the delusions or hallucinations are real

Fire Destroys Auto Salvage Business on Rockingham Road

On Friday, Dec. 28, the Derry Fire Communications Center received an alarm identifying an emergency located at 109 Rockingham Road in Derry.

The center received a 911 call minutes later from an employee of Watt's Auto Salvage reporting a fire in the building.

Upon arrival at fire companies found a two-story wood framed auto service

type structure fully involved in flames. Fire companies were advised by employees of Watt's Auto Salvage that everyone made it out of the building before arrival of emergency services.

Command was established, defensive operation was ordered, and a first alarm was struck. Companies operated masterstreams and handlines from outside the structure to con-

trol and eventually extinguish the fire.

Additional Derry and mutual aid companies assisted with command and control, safety, water supply, overhaul, RIT and EMS.

Mutual aid was received by Londonderry, Windham and Auburn, and station coverage was provided by Nashua, Salem, Chester, and Hampstead.

The structure and vehi-

cles in and directly around the structure are a total loss. There were several vehicles in close proximity that sustained fire and smoke damage also.

There were no injuries suffer by workers of the business or first responders.

The portion of Rockingham Road where the business was located was closed for most of the day.

monument will find its way to MacGregor Park for unveiling on that historic Nutfield anniversary date.

This fountain has a very unusual history on its own that ties it to the recent past and to the founders of Derry. The 1-ton cast iron fountain and bowl-trough was conceived and dedicated in 1903 as part of watering station for downtown Derry. It was located off Broadway, near the Derry train station. The town had purchased the fountain – now appraised at \$1800 – for \$112. The watering station contained a drinking fountain for humans and a water trough for horses with even a drinking area for dogs and cats.

Mark Brassard, Founder of the Derry Veterans Monu-

ments Committee and Charlie Crompton, Rotary Club member made a presentation that detailed the extraordinary history of the fountain. The fountain station was damaged on Thanksgiving night, 1954 by a truck and hauled away to the town dump. As fate would have it, Mr. and Mrs. Richard E. MacGregor, descendants of the founding father — found out about the fountain and it was hauled out of the dump and taken to the MacGregor's homestead to bring it back to life.

The MacGregor family understood that the watering station was a unique piece of Derry history, so they cared for the fountain for over 60 years with the idea of one day restoring it, to give it back to the Town. Each year, they maintained

and painted it, and Mrs. MacGregor filled the basin with assorted seasonal flowers. Lots of photos were taken with the fountain as a back drop and it became a part of the MacGregor legacy.

The Derry Village Rotary was recently commissioned by the family to take on the full fountain restoration project called Operation MacGregor. The restoration project has involved support from quite a few Rotary members to insure the refurbishment is done with complete care.

Some of the MacGregor family including Jill MacGregor Flanders, Bret MacGregor, Jack and Theo Flanders were on hand at the Town Council acceptance to support the family's gift of the historic fountain to the

town

The MacGregor family have been very generous to Derry — giving the town the area known as MacGregor Park, as well as helping provide the Derry Public library for the Town.

The watering station will continue life as a decorative planter and will be relocated to MacGregor Park. A grant market is to be setup to outline the fountain's ties to Nutfield's founding family and as a key signature piece of Derry's history.

As noted by the meeting presenters, "The fountain is a tangible link to both our near recent and distant past. But more importantly it is a reminder of who we are, how we got here and where we are going as a community."

In other business during

the meeting:

• Derry's Chief Financial Officer Susan Hickey announced that the former Tax Collector in Londonderry, Diane Mulholland, will now be the Derry Tax Collector.

Hickey also mentioned that Mulholland was a Finance Director earlier in her career for the town of Allenstown.

Her appointment was confirmed by the council with a 6-0 vote.

• Public Works Director Mike Fowler presented his findings on releasing a street from public servitude to Mary Morgan.

The "paper" street is from Eastman Drive to Sheldon Road and after discussing the issue with the town's attorney, Fowler felt the it would be in the best interest of the town to

release the street.

After a 4-2 vote the motion to release the street carried. Councilors Richard Tripp and Jim Morgan voted against the resolution.

• Fowler also presented a request to the council for a new generator at the Hampstead Road Fire Station. He told the Council that after discussing the issue with the fire chief it was deemed that the existing generator had reached its end-of-service and needed to be replaced. The cost of the new generator with installation would be \$50,000.

He explained that the funds needed for this would be transferred from the Emergency Maintenance Fund to the Expandable Maintenance Fund. The motion to grant the transfer and pay for the new generator passed 6-0.

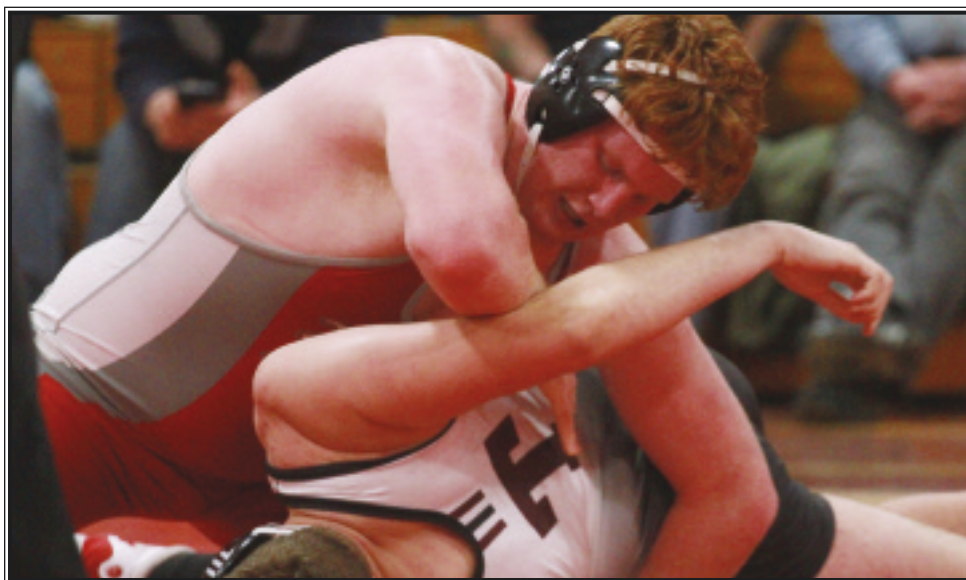
McLaughlin, wrestling at 182 lbs, was Pinkerton's most successful wrestler. He won three matches on

PA also won the 4x800, when Macy Graves, Jordan Vaillancourt, Meghan Cross and Meaghan Robidoux completed the run in 10:28.24 minutes.

In the field events, it was Emily Lesburt with the High Jump victory (4'11") and freshman Hailey Laskiewicz with the sixth place (4'6"). Freshman Jacy Smith finished fifth in the Long Jump (14'7"), Hannah Frazier sixth (14'05") and Laskiewicz seventh (13'8.5") and Adrianna Buccieri fifth in the Shot Put (29'1.75").
