## Planning Board Hears Proposals That Will Change Look of Derry

Derry's Planning Board has been very active over the past several months as the Town and community businesses are making plans for the future that will change the face of the community in some areas of Town. And this planning also includes the year long Master Planning process for the community that members of the Planning Board will also support.

At their first March meeting, the Planning Board was in unanimous agreement to approve a graphics arts mural on a building in downtown Derry that is likely to live on for a time. They thanked Andy Day and

Elena Wentworth, owners of the Cask and Vine restaurant and drinkery on Broadway, for their efforts to develop a beautiful mural on their building that faces Sabatino's Restaurant in Derry. The wall mural is being created by a professional graphic arts group to highlight the Nutfield 300th Anniversary celebration.

At this meeting, the Planning Board also looked at the proposal by High Meadows, LLC for a subdivision development to be located on property at 46 High Street, Derry not far from the downtown area. However, upon review the board found the developer's application made for the Planning Board's public hearing was incomplete.

That is, the final application phase submittals related to compliance were not in the spirit and intent of the regulations, for the Planning Board to conduct a public hearing at this time. The review and hearing for this proposal was moved to April 17th for the applicant to have time to complete the process.

One area of Derry that has been a visual landmark for local Derry residents for the past era, is the flea market site of the former Grand View Farm area across from Clam Haven. That flea market was operated for several decades before shutting down a few years ago, though many locals will still recognize that area, as the

## Weatherbee Named Council Chair After March Election

The Derry Town Council meeting on March 19th conducted a swearing in of the newly elected town councilors, all of whom were re-elected incumbents. This included Brian Chirichiello of District 4, Charlie Foote of District 2 and Jim Morgan, current Chairman of the Town Council.

Morgan, was first elected three years ago after a special town election was conducted. This election was initiated as the result of community reaction to a Town Council makeup that set large town budget cuts, resulting in municipal staff layoffs and a closed fire station. That election also cre-

ated some division around town and had brought out a record voter turnout. And that election changed the council makeup and reversed the budget issues of that time.

Morgan has felt his role as Chair was to help boost confidence among residents, municipal officials and the Town's workers, some of whom had become disappointed with the Town's direction. Some of Morgan's actions working with other councilors during his time as the Chair, included hiring former Londonderry Town Manger, David Caron as the Town Administrator, negotiating union contracts and hiring Beverly Donovan as the Town's Economic Development Director.

The Chair called the meeting to order and after the Pledge of Allegiance, an overview of house rules for the public attendees and a roll call, Morgan put forward the first order of business for the meeting. This was a call for the council procedure to elect officers for subsequent Town Council meetings.

In an amicable public and intra-council election process, the council nominated and selected Neal Weatherbee to be the new Town Council Chair and Jim Morgan was subsequently elected Chairman Pro Tem (Vice-Chair). Morgan and Weatherbee then exchanged seating places at the meeting and Weatherbee conducted

# Town Council Gets to Work After Recent March 12 Election

At the Derry Town Council on March 19, the council launched its new meeting lineup after the recent town voting with Neil Weatherbee now presiding as Chairman; The council meeting was conducted with a concise agenda.

Mike Iannuzzi from Derry representing VFW Post 1617 and Rolling Thunder N.H. addressed the council at the public forum time of the meeting. Iannuzzi overviewed that Rolling Thunder is a POW-MIA organization and motorcycle club. The major function of Rolling Thunder is to publicize the POW-MIA issue and educate the public that many American prisoners of war were left behind after all previous wars.

Iannuzzi stated "We have started working on a project around Derry to get POW-MIA flags flying around the town and we currently have 13 area businesses involved with our project."

"We are planning to launch this project on Saturday, May 18, and on that

date, we will support a flag raising ceremony. We are also interested getting POW-MIA flags raised at five other locations in Derry. This would include flags at the recreational center on Broadway, the Opera House, the flagpole at the end of Martin Street, at the rotary traffic circle near Pinkerton, and at the Town Hall.

"The VFW and Rolling Thunder will be donating the flags, so we are not asking the town to pay for them and we are doing a flag raising ceremony that morning. We want to keep the POW MIA message going forward, so these people are not forgotten and we are requesting to have the flags flying there on a permanent basis."

The Town Council will consult with other Town officials to fully understand the logistics and then follow up with Mr. Iannuzzi's request.

The council scheduled next steps for Ordinance #2019-002 - Relative to amending Zoning Ordinance Article VI, District Provisions in the Central Business and Traditional Overlay Districts to all residential uses above the first

floor. This ordinance has gone through nearly all of the complete town process including Planning, so the Town Council will schedule a public hearing for this at the April 2nd meeting.

The primary effort of that zoning change is to consider allowing residential occupancy above the first floor in certain business district area buildings.

The idea behind this is to open Derry to more housing availability, where there is currently a problem for available, affordable housing in town.

Next up was a public hearing to move 5 parcels from the Central Business District to the Medium High-Density Residential zone and move 6 parcels from the Medium High-

Density Residential District to the Medium High-Density Residential II District.

Planning Director George Sioras presented that this ordinance was to clean up a zoning error from several years ago on the Town map. These parcels are in the downtown area around Maple and Elm streets including the old shoe factory area on 19 Elm Street that is garnering sales interest that would be good news for town. The intent of the ordinance is to allow the town to both market and redevelop that property area with zoning that will allow the town and economic development in particular, to get better usage for those properties.

At the public discussion for this ordinance, a Derry resident Kyle Turly, reported he understood the only material difference in the zoning change for him is that no multifamily properties will be allowed, where he is currently living - though accessory apartments such as an in law

apartment would still be permitted. Director Sioras confirmed that is the case in this situation, so the resident was satisfied that this re-zoning would be viable for him.

That ordinance has been moved through the Planning Board and the complete process with full approvals. The Town Council after brief discussion passed the ordinance which will go into effect in 30 days from the adoption by the Town Council.

Finally the Town Council heard from Dave Caron, Town Administrator who presented a Resolution to authorize Apollo Vineyards to serve wine samples at the Derry Homegrown Farm and Artisans Market.

Apollo Vineyards has been a mainstay at the Derry Farmers Market for several years and this resolution will enable them to continue serving wine samples at the market for the upcoming years, so they don't have to continually file complex applications to request that capability every year.

Michael Gendron, President GDAC was at the Derry Town Council Meeting on March 19 to report, "Our Community is only a couple more weeks away from the Founders Weekend for the Nutfield 300th celebration."

Saturday April 13 will mark the historical birthday date for for Nutfield 300th celebration. On that date, 300 years ago that Rev.

Father McGregor and his group of 16 Scots-Irish families held the first official Nutfield community meeting." Gendron said, "Saturday night is this area's birthday and the night of the Greater Derry Arts Council Nutfield 300 Gala at the Derry Opera House. This event will be a great evening of fun as well as a lifetime birthday celebration event to remember."

Kerran Vigroux, Secretary GDAC was also spoke

at the Town Council public forum to overview Gala specifics, "The Gala is a semi-formal dress event. Everyone should come dressed up and this means people should not come dressed casually." flea market's old pink elephant statue is still watching traffic go by in that area of town.

Specifically, this location is the corner on South Main St. and Island Pond Road. At this time however, that property is now included in a new development proposal for a convenience store, gas station and drive-through doughnut shop.

Representatives for the developers, Howie and Ralph Glynn of Grand View Farm Realty LLC, who purchased the property a couple of years ago, provided the Planning Board with initial

details of their plan. The land includes about an acre for the new development and is currently zoned for General Commercial IV Zoning District. The plan proposes an almost 4000-square-foot building, with about 1,000-feet of that square footage to be developed for the doughnut business. The proposal for the property is in the design review phase of the process, so the Planning Board did not vote on this initial design proposal.

This area, especially when the Clam Haven drive-up is open, is a very busy town intersection, so the developers will be working with the state's Department of Transportation to plan

appropriate intersection upgrades that will be needed for the project. The entrance for this planned building complex would be from Island Pond Road and intersection improvements would also likely be needed to expand traffic lanes for exit and entrance access.

The timing for the planning phase of the former flea market area is good as the Planning Board has been

discussing possible zoning changes in the area, primarily around the proposed new Village District which is adjacent to this area.

The Planning Board wrapped up with workshops including further discussions about the newly proposed mixed zoning for the West Running Brook Village District, that would include the area across from the Grand View Farm area plan.

# Derry's Master Plan Looks for Community Input on Saturday, April 6

Derry residents will soon get to imagine what their town can look like to live in over the next 10-15 years at the next Master Plan meeting.

George Sioras, Derry's Planning Director and the Town of Derry invite all residents and business leaders to come to the Master Plan forum at the Derry Municipal center building third floor, on Saturday, April 6, at 10:30 a.m. to help refine the visions and goals identified at the November Master Plan forum and from other follow-up community planning meetings.

The Derry Master Plan process will continue throughout 2019, though this April forum is a significant meeting to attend. The first forum yielded a lot of creativity and has been a great

start for the town's master planning process, so if you did not make that meeting, please consider coming to this one. A summary presentation of that first forum is now available from the town's Master Plan website. [www.derrynh.org/planning/master-plan-update](http://www.derrynh.org/planning/master-plan-update).

This April workshop will be a concise couple of hours in time, and the meeting will provide an overview of ideas, issues and creative efforts for the town that have transpired over the past several months' time. There will be posters for your reference that will list key results from the surveys, workshops and findings for your considerations.

The key purpose of the meeting will be to refine these visions and goals that have been developed. The forum will be targeted to

gather community input as well as to share findings regarding existing conditions of the town and the plan. The idea of the Master Plan is for Town Officials, outside planning consultants, and the community to identify priorities and strategies for moving the town's plan forward.

This forum is a great time for the Derry community to come together to create a shared vision for Derry's future. This in turn will be used as the foundation for an action plan to outline steps necessary to attain that vision.

Sioras says "I have been asked by community members if their vision of Derry really is useful for town planning purposes and that answer is solid yes. Residents should come to the April 6 workshop, so they can provide ideas and see ongoing efforts being developed by our residents and business leaders."

"The key is that once the plan is built during this year, we will map out timelines for planning specifics that are derived from resident feedback, ideas and actions. We will scope out what can be realistically executed, and track this so the community will see how and when their ideas can be implemented."

Residents of Derry can

look at the Master Plan from 2010 and see ideas from residents of that era that were implemented, including much of the revitalization of the downtown Derry area.

The recently completed Derry Age Friendly survey is now online for the community to check out. Sioras was delighted that the survey was picked up by a statistically relevant number of residents and that information from the survey has been insightful.

Sioras has been on a mission with Elizabeth Robidoux, Derry's Planning and Economic Development Assistant, to engage the community about the Master Plan. They have been reaching out to residents all over town such as at the Senior Center, at coffee shops, at McGregor Library, and at the Taylor library. They report they have found a lot of enthusiasm from people about getting involved to help plan the town's future.

Your vision and ideas are what will shape the future of this Derry community where you live and this meeting on April 6 is where you can get creative and meet other interesting area residents. The town wants your thoughts to help define what Derry will be and they will even be serving light refreshments for you at the meeting, so please come out

and join the planning vision.

The meeting will be held in the third-floor meeting room of the Derry Municipi-

pal Center. Plenty of public parking is available in the municipal lot. We hope to see you there.

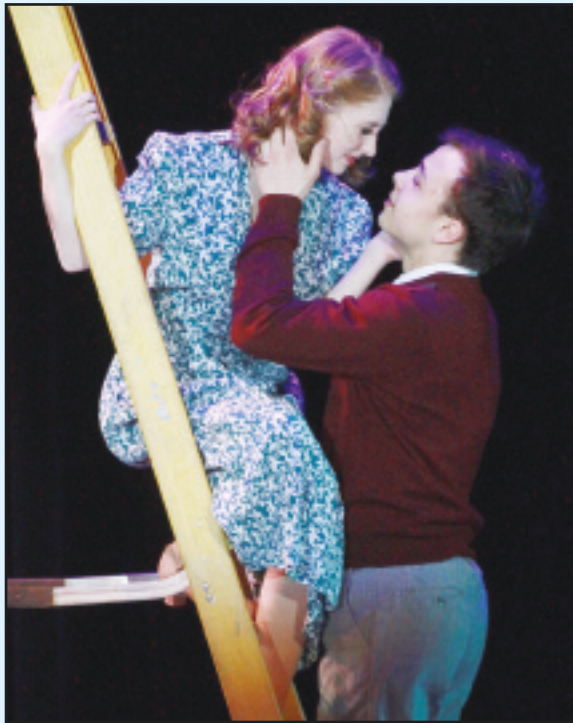

the meeting agenda as the new Chair.

Weatherbee, expressed appreciation for his new role and vowed that he would continue council efforts to move town issues and actions in a positive manner for the community. Weatherbee first started working for the town on the Conservation Commission only a few years ago; he expressed

appreciation that the council had given confidence to him for this position.

During the meeting, Weatherbee overviewed discussion about updating the the councilor liaison committee relationships. As the discussion unfolded it became apparent there will be several changes in the liaison roles going forward though the council will finalize these changes over the near term.

Weatherbee offered that he will continue his liaison

relationship with the Conservation Committee and Pinkerton Academy; Councilor Joshua Bourdon will continue to work as liaison to Net Zero.

Phyllis Katsokiores, Councilor at Large will continue to support the Heritage Commission and Safety departments and Richard Tripp will likely continue to liaison with the Derry Public library and Public Works though he will leave his role at Net Zero and Bourdan is now the primary liaison for

the Net Zero Task Force.

Morgan discussed it would be a good time for some new eyes on Economic Development Committee, so that liaison relationship will move to another councilor. Morgan will likely take on the liaison role with the Cable Committee and likely continue with the Fiscal Committee. At this time, there is no longer a council relationship for Human Services, as that town area is now under a different type of program.

The council members discussed several details about the election and expressed thanks to town

voters. The council also gave thanks to all the election workers and staff. Morgan said, "I thought the election went extremely smooth and everybody the great job. We did have a couple people fall down at the polling area, but there was EMS support there right away and those folks got proper help.

Morgan recommended that council should look into what they can do to counter voter apathy and suggested the council should work with Town Administrator, Dave Caron to put that issue on the agenda for further consideration. Morgan stated, "We should definitely want to

have the council embrace the fact that we need to improve the number of people that turn out to vote."

## Building Respect Among Culturally Diverse Groups

Talk With An Expert About Building Respect Among Culturally Diverse Groups on Thursday, April 4, at 7 p.m., at Etz Hayim Synagogue (1-1/2 Hood Rd., Derry) will host a discussion with James B.

Farmer, Esq., entitled "Bridges: Building Respect in Diverse Groups to Enhance Sensitivity." During his 30-year career as a federal prosecutor in Boston, Farmer served, variously, as U.S. Attorney (Interim), Chief of the Criminal Division, Chief of the Organized Crime Strike Force, and Chief of the National Security Unit ("NSU"). As NSU Chief, Farmer supervised the office's anti-terrorism efforts, including the 2013 Boston Marathon bombing investigation and trial. Throughout his tenure as NSU Chief, Farmer met regularly with Arab, Muslim, and Sikh community leaders as part of BRIDGES (Building Respect in Diverse Groups to Enhance Sensitivity), a group formed in the wake of the 9/11 attacks to facilitate quiet communication between federal, state, and local government officials in Massachusetts and the leaders of these communities, who were concerned about their communities' civil rights and felt under intense public scrutiny. Notably, Farmer was the United States Attorney (Interim) during the 9/11 attacks in 2001. Farmer will talk about both the group's challenges and its successes in maintaining vibrant lines of communication during often-trying circumstances. He will also discuss the somewhat unusual decision to have senior anti-terrorism prosecutors participate as part of this ongoing conversation. The lecture series is free and open to all.
