Weatherbee Named Council **Chair After March Election**

The Derry Town Council meeting on March 19th conducted a swearing in of the newly elected town councilors, all of whom were reelected incumbents. This included Brian Chirichiello of District 4. Charlie Foote of District 2 and Jim Morgan, current Chairman of the Town Council.

Morgan, was first elected three years ago after a special town election was conducted. This election was initiated as the result of community reaction to a Town Council makeup that Town Administrator, negotiset large town budget cuts, resulting in municipal staff layoffs and a closed fire station. That election also cre-

ated some division around town and had brought out a meeting to order and after record voter turnout. And that election changed the council makeup and reversed the budget issues of that time

But it would be nice, of course, if we could enjoy a little bit of spring first.



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
