Londonderry High School is also well prepared for safety emergencies and the school district has put

additional security measures and preparedness in place over the past years. High School Principal Jason Parent says, "We are proud of how our Emergency Preparedness Committee has helped us ensure a safer environment for our schools. Working closely with Londonderry police and fire departments, we have conducted a series of drills and trainings that provide our staff and students more autonomy in making safe decisions.'

Principal Parent noted that the close proximity of Londonderry High School to both the fire and police stations helps to better support the comprehensive safety plan for the school.

What a mother Mary Bell Washington must have been, to have, had such a profound influence on her son.

The tax rate is anticipated to be \$7.72, which is one cent below the level authorized by taxpayer approved tax cap, even though our revenues are moderating. We are positioning the Town to manage future expenses and liability, though revenue growth is projected as flat."

Caron has been promoting a change in the budget process by disconnecting

sustainable revenues from what he called "situational" revenues. One of his primary goals for this recommendation is to increase transparency in the budget process long term. As a result of previous workshop communications Caron reported, "The Town Council members agree and support this practice of ensuring that the Town does not rely upon situational revenues for its operating budget."

At the next meeting, the council will consider adoption of this budget and the capital improvements program. On May 21, the Town Council will likely vote on the expansion of the TIF district, so residents who want to voice questions about the budget, as well as the Capital Improvement Plans, should consider attending upcoming Town Council public hearings.




