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Derry's Salvation Army Has Property Seized for Exit 4A

The progress that is being made recently, regarding the construction of the new Exit 4A on Interstate 93, is good news for many businesses, organizations and residents in the area, but might create a big problem for others.

The Salvation Army in Derry received a letter from the state of New Hampshire, saying that the organization's property on Folsom Road will be seized in the near future, in order to make the space for the Exit 4A project.

The organization recently purchased the Folsom Road property less than a year and a half ago, on December 2017 and staff members say they have been working very hard since then to improve

the location for people in need, but are now being forced to move.

In the letter received, state officials indicated that the state would acquire the property through eminent domain. Salvation Army Lt. Kimberly Clark, said the organization will now look for a new place for its food pantry, clothing closet and church services: "Really, we just want to be able to move to a place that we can be made whole", said Ms. Clark. "We do not want to fight about it. We just want to be in a place that we can serve the community."

Salvation Army Lt. Kathy Mayes, emphasized in a recent telephone conversation, the fact that the organization wants the move to be clean and quiet, but

admitted that the state announcement came as a surprise: "There were always rumors about it, but when we moved in, no one told us we might have to leave so soon," she said.

Mayes also pointed out the biggest problem with the move. While state officials said the Salvation Army would be compensated for the property seizure, the organization will only be receiving back \$500,000, the price that was paid for the current location. However, since receiving the notice from the State of N.H. the Salvation Army has been yet unable to find a new place for less than \$800,000.

"We have been looking", says Clark. "Everything that surrounds us that would be

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Town Council Approves Projects for Public Works Department

Mike Fowler, Director of Public Works for the Town of Derry, had multiple items on the Town Council's agenda to discuss at the May 7 Town Council meeting. Fowler pointed out that these items were based on actions that previously came before the Town Council, that were now ready for the final approval phase of considerations by the Council.

Fowler said, "These agenda items I am presenting are mainly housekeeping and are usually done at year end, so I wanted to take the opportunity here to knock these items out with the Council while they are still hot topics, and so we can

handle all of these at once."

Fowler began his discussion with an overview of the Drew Road bridge project. He requested that the project's fund balance be considered for transfer to the Bridge Improvement Fund in the amount of \$180,153.89. As part of this funding transfer, the Drew Road fund would also then be officially closed. This budget transfer will allow the town to continue to implement bridge maintenance as well as other public works replacement projects. A Bridge Improvement Fund had previously been created to fund future bridge and culvert repairs. The Council approved this funding transfer to take effect immediately.

Changing topics to another item, Fowler pointed out that over the past month, the Southern New Hampshire Regional Water Interconnection Project had been communicated to the Town Council. This project is now ready for authorization by the Council, as a part of the NH DES Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund grant. It is anticipated that approximately 25% of the gross cash flow for this project will be expensed in additional operating costs. The projected value of the improvements to the Derry Water System is \$6.29 Million, all of which will be funded by this Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund

Town Council Approves Budget, Capital Projects, Legislative Committee Bylaws

At the May 7 Derry Town Council meeting, the board unanimously approved a \$48,479,117 budget plan for spending, along with anticipated costs of capital improvement projects. The approved budget resolution will take effect on July 1, 2019.

Over the past month, the

Town Council, chaired by Neil Wetherbee, has conducted a series of department workshops and discussions with the town's department heads to refine the town's budget.

Derry department heads involved with presenting budgets included: Public Works Director Mike Fowler, Chief of Police Ed Garone, Fire Chief Michael Gagnon, IT/GIS Manager

Doug Rathburn, Planning Director George Sioras, Economic Development Director Beverly Donovan, Libraries Administrative Director Cara Barlow, Cable Division Coordinator Owen Provencher, and Parks and Recreation Director Eric Bodenrader among others.

During the budget process, Town Administrator, David Caron led many of the

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Zoning Board Re-elects Officers and Approves Variance Request

The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) met on May 2, and began their agenda actions with the election of officers for the coming year.

Michelle Navarro, ZBA member was the first to speak about nominating officers. She said, "I believe we are functioning perfectly well with our three current officers, and I would like to nominate each of them to continue on."

Randall Kelley followed up Navarro to also support the reelection of the current

officers. Upon further discussion and voting, all board members decided upon the reelection of Lynn Perkins as ZBA Board Chair, Heather Evans to continue as the Vice Chair and Stephen Coppola to remain as the Secretary.

After the board member reelection, Perkins said, "In the past year, this board continues to develop and we are like the New England Patriots, in that everybody can do anybody else's job here, and that's how we like to see it. Over the past year, we've had to move people around once in a while, and I'm happy to see that every time

we've had to do so, we've had competent people step up. Thank you members."

The first agenda item for the ZBA was a public hearing for an application requesting a variance from Brian and Gisele Mercier. Specifically the variance request was related to the Town of Derry Zoning Ordinance regarding building constructions near property lines for this type of zoning. The Merciers want to construct an attached 2 car garage less than 15 feet from the side property line at 42 Beaver Lake Avenue, which is nearby Beaver Lake and is, zoned MDR (Medium

Density Residential).

Mrs. Mercier spoke to the board members about this application request for the ZBA consideration, "Granting the variance will not be contrary to the public interest, because the proposed garage does not conflict with the purpose of the ordinance which is to ensure adequate separation between adjacent lots and there will be no threat to public health, safety or welfare with this construction. The proposed garage will be built within our fenced-in yard area and the garage will be aesthetically pleasing when seen from the lake or from the street. The encroachment would be 7 feet from the road and this construction would not adversely affect our abutters."

With regard to the variance, Mercier further stated, "The spirit of the ordinance will be observed because we intend to build with respect to existing buildings in the area and our garage will be built with the intention to enhance the area. Substantial justice will be done because allowing the variance is a reasonable use of the property without harm to anyone."

"Justice would be afforded as this will allow us to properly store our motorcycle, ATV, plow, riding lawn more, vehicles, our boat and

our tools instead of storing them indoors. The values of the surrounding property will not be diminished because we intend to build a quality structure that may enhance property values and since there is no one directly across the street, the view of the lake would not be altered. Enforcement of existing zoning ordinances would result in hardship to us. And the proposed use is reasonable because it is appropriate to have a proper place to store things and for us to have better access to our vehicles in the winter months."

The board discussed the situation and noted the encroachment of 7 feet into the side setback near the road that with the garage construction will be also within about 4 feet of the existing fence. The board pointed out to the Merciers

that this construction will take special permitting as their lake area property location requires approval by the N.H. DES (Department of Environmental Services) and must be aligned with the town's water services. In the public questioning time for the variance request, the Mercier's across the street neighbor, questioned whether the fence would be moved closer to the street and offered her support for the Merciers to build their garage, when she found out that the plan calls for keeping the fence in the same location.

The Board unanimously approved the variance application request, subject to all state and town regulations, permitting and inspections and with board support for the fencing to remain in place within 4 feet of the road.

workshop discussions and provided recommendations, proposed budget specifics and the numbers to the council.

By town's charter, the council had to approve the budget by the end of May. The Council members were efficient with their workshops and finished the budget process before the dead-

line. The town charter requires that the town operate under a tax cap, restricting the amount of tax increase allowed during the budget planning process, based on calculations through the Northeast Region Consumer Price Index. The tax rate will be set officially in the fall. Town Administrator, Caron, projects the tax rate will be set at about \$7.72 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

The Council also adopt-

ed and approved the FY 2020 - 2025 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). David Caron, Town Administrator said, "As required by the Town charter, the council has a responsibility to adopt the capital improvement plan by May 31. This is a budget-planning document and by adopting the CIP, the Town Council and the town are not committed to funding these projects. This is simply a six-year

view of where we think the town should invest its capital infrastructure - so we recommend adoption."

The approved resolution for the CIP will also take effect on July 1, 2019. The amount of the overall town budget number as approved, includes these capital improvement projects, the general fund and cable and wastewater/water funding. Cable and wastewater/water however, are paid for

through user fees and therefore have no financial impact to the town's tax rate.

Some of the capital improvement projects included in the approved budget and paid for through various capital reserve funds include updated cardiac monitoring equipment for the fire department, funding to continue the town's roadway management program, replacement of mobile and portable radios for the fire department, and replacement of certain vehicles and equipment across Derry's Public Works department areas.

At this meeting the Town Council also adopted the new Legislative Committee bylaws. The Legislative Committee has been formed to allow discussions and collaboration, between the Town, School and local State Representatives, concerning issues at the State level, which may effect and are important to the Derry community and its taxpayers. A primary goal for the Legislative Committee in-

cludes maintaining an open line of communications between town government, the School District and the town's elected state delegation. This committee will identify existing and proposed legislation, the impact upon the Derry community, and develop strategies and positions to advocate, amend, support or defeat the legislation, all in the best interest of the Derry community.

The concept for this committee is to provide a forum for all participants to better understand the challenges and opportunities faced by the participants, and develop strategies to address the challenges and maximize the opportunities for the town.

It is a goal for this body to create an atmosphere whereby elected state representatives, supported by town government and the school district, can take a leadership role at the State level, advocating for issues that are in the best interest and benefit for the Derry community.

grant. There will be no cost to the Town, and Derry will also receive \$1.00 per 100 cubic feet of water sold to Salem.

The supporting resolution for this project was approved by the Council, so the Town can now move forward to construct water system improvements as a part of this state-funded initiative to provide additional drinking water to southern tier communities including Salem, Windham, Atkinson, Hampstead and Plaistow. The water will be routed through Derry's existing water system, with extensions that will support appropriate infra-

structure upgrades.

Fowler also brought forward another item that was approved by the Council. This request concerned the transfer of funds from the Department of Public Works Capital Reserve Fund to the General Fund for fiscal year 2019 capital. This was requested to cover expenses for truck and equipment purchases. Public Works purchased two pickup trucks and three salt/sand material spreaders as part of the fiscal 2019 capital plan. The total cost was \$129,929.20 and items were put in service this past winter. Due to the timing of the purchases, the trucks were not included in the lease package and were purchased outright from DPW Capital Reserve.

Rather than attaining five-year financing on the RAM trucks, the payment was made up front in Year 1, requiring this action by Town Council. There are offsetting reductions in the lease proceeds to accurately account for the transaction.

Fowler outlined another agreement to transfer money from the Hazardous Building Capital Reserve Fund to the General Fund, to cover expenses related to a building demolition at 40 Kilrea Road. The Town had become responsible for the dilapidated property in 2014 and the building was demolished late last year at a cost of \$13,018.60.

In the FY 2019 budget, the Town Council had created the Hazardous Building

Teen Driving This Prom Season

A driver's license mixed with a few drinks, texting, and pot is dangerous for anyone, but the reckless combination can be even more so for inexperienced drivers. Even when a parent trusts his or her own teenager to be conscientious, being certain that other teenagers will do the same is impossible.

As prom and graduation season approaches drunk-driving fears of parents escalate and school activism against such activity increases. Though teens will ultimately make the final decisions in terms of their own safety, it doesn't keep parents from waiting up at night. When it comes to teens and drunk driving, there is both good news and bad news.

The good news is that teen drunk driving nationwide has gone down. The bad news is that car crashes are the leading cause of death for teens, and about a third of those are alcohol related, according to Mothers Against Drunk Driving. Not every child makes it home safe, and only some live to tell about it. We hope that students are talking not only about the dangers of drinking and driving, but also about texting and driving and the importance of wearing a seat belt.

Still, motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death among U.S. teens. This is something many people live with and see on a regular basis, so the message must be spread.

I am a firm believer that if we can educate them at a young age, we are going to be able to save their future, as

well as our own. Start conversation with kids early. Every time you hear a story about the subject, share it. It's important for your children's safety. If nothing else, when your child goes to prom or graduation parties, try to find a little comfort in the transportation arrangements. Parents, be smart, be proactive, and have conversations constantly. It has to be in the forefront all the time, a priority.

The dangers of drinking and driving have heightened considerably due to the proliferation of cell-phones. Study after study has shown an increase in accidents connected with texting while driving.

Explain your own position concerning your teen's drinking and texting while driving. Discuss your family's rules about alcohol and agree on the consequences for breaking the rules. Discuss reasons for NOT drinking and the bad consequences that can result from drinking. Always tell you children that if they find themselves in an uncomfortable situation or they have made a poor decision about drinking or drugs that they can always call you and you will pick them up and bring them home. Mothers Against Drunk Driving offers a handbook on its website to help parents talk to their teens about alcohol.

Now, more than ever, local schools, parents, police and community members need to work together to make sure that no family has an "empty chair" after proms and graduations.

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able to make us whole is about \$800,000 or above, which makes it difficult." Mayes added that the organization's goal is to stay in Derry and continue serving the local community, but if they cannot find a new place with the amount they would

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EDAC Elects New Officers, Updates Community About New Business

The Derry Economic Development Advisory Committee (EDAC) met on May 6 with Vice Chair, Christina Gossel kicking off the meeting agenda that started with the election of new committee officers. Gossel noted that Liz Circharo, EDAC Chair was absent from the meeting,

though Circharo had spoken with Gossel, and she wanted to nominate Gossel to become the new Chair. Members John Potuchek and Gordon Graham supported Gossel's Chair nomination.

Gordan Graham was nominated for the position of Vice-Chair. In a final member polling, Gossel was selected as the new Chair, Graham was selected as the new Vice-Chair and Craig Cunningham was reelected as Secretary for the committee. Gossel also introduced the new Town Council liaison, Richard Tripp to the EDAC members and the public.

Gossel said, "Thank you to everyone for allowing me to serve as Chair this term. I have been on this committee since 2016 and since then we've seen some great things happen. I look forward to seeing what we're going to accomplish this next term."

Since George Sioras, Planning Director could not be at the meeting that night; he provided his Planning Department information for Gossel to discuss with the committee and the public.

Gossel reported, "There have been 3 new projects started in the last two weeks including a 32-unit townhouse development for Nut-

field Court on the rail trail, the 30-unit adult — 55+ single-family housing project on Tsienneto Road, and a new for-profit Rehab Facility on Ashley Drive. All of these projects have now broken ground."

The Planning Department has also received a plan from Walmart to add a grocery pick up service, and they will be making some façade improvements for that service. The Walmart plan is scheduled to go before the Planning Board on May 15.

Planet Fitness in Hood Plaza is expanding into the unit next door and the Amphora Restaurant also in Hood Plaza will be expanding to the adjacent unit. There is the new Sun Asian Bistro that has opened on West Broadway and Fodys Great American Tavern — on Route 28 and Ryan's Hill has recently opened as well.

Beverly Donovan, Economic Development Coordinator for the committee and the Town, was present at the meeting to provide her department's activity report.

Donovan said, "The beginning week of May is Economic Development week and it is also Small Business month. So, I want to make a shout out to all

the people who own small businesses, advise small businesses, work for small businesses, or supply small businesses in our area. Small businesses are the lifeblood of our economy and Derry has no shortage of small businesses, and we are lucky to have them in our community."

Donovan reports there are many economic development activities going on in Derry at this time. One important project is regarding further analysis for the Abbott Court concept plan boundaries. The boundaries for the plan need to be set up officially, before the project can move forward with traffic flow studies and additional project planning. As soon as these boundaries are worked out — hopefully over the next month, Donovan will be scheduling a presentation for the project with the Town Council.

There has now been façade work completed within the scope of the downtown façade program including Stevens Auto Services and Sun's Asian bistro. Sabatino's North — Italian Restaurant has also started their façade work, and Halligan's Tavern is working with the planning office on their plan as a part of the downtown façade program.

Donovan said, "There have been lots of nice changes coming to the downtown area and our downtown is looking better all the time."

Donovan pointed out that future façade program support is pending as the Town Council will need to be funding a replenishment of that program fund. She is hopeful for Town Council considerations to continue this project.

With regard to commercial real estate and development in Derry, there have been three business zone buildings that have gone under agreement as sold in the past month. As a result, there will be new businesses coming into town and some of them will be developing buildings that have been vacant — which is a good thing for the Town.

There is a lot of activity about the Opportunity Zone including educational discussions with an upcoming breakfast meeting supported by the Chamber of Commerce on May 15 at the Tupelo Music Hall at 7:30am. Donovan reported she had recently traveled to Washington DC to meet with Federal Administration officials, who are developing a second round of guidelines for Opportunity Zone programs in the U.S.

Donovan's department is involved a Town of Derry video creation project with a professional production company, that will be produced in June. The intention of this project is to develop marketing content about what the Town of Derry is all about. The Town has already recorded interesting Town sky view drone footage via IT and Geo tracking location efforts. The Derry Community Access Media team is engaged in this video project to help produce an appealing marketing video that can be used as support for engaging businesses or to attract key projects and people to come do business or visit Derry.

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Aviation Museum Offers Vintage Hollywood-style Memorial Day Tribute

'The Flying Fleet,' MGM silent drama about U.S. Navy aviators, to screen with live music on Thursday, May. Get in the spirit of Memorial Day weekend with a vintage silent film drama about U.S. naval aviators that's a window into what it was like to serve one's country between the World Wars.

'The Flying Fleet' (1929), a star-studded MGM drama filmed on location at key U.S. Naval bases, will be screened on Thursday, May 23 at 7 p.m. at the Aviation Museum of N.H., 27

Navigator Road, Londonderry, N.H.

The movie, made with the full cooperation of the U.S. Navy and filled with scenes of vintage air and seaplanes in action, will be shown with live music provided by silent film accompanist Jeff Rapsis.

Admission for this special event is \$20 per person; \$15 for Aviation Museum members. The screening is a fund-raiser for the Aviation Museum's partnership with the Manchester School of Technology that will enable students build an actual air-

plane in the 2019-20 school year.

"As we approach Memorial Day weekend, this is a terrific way to remember those who served by looking back at what it was like for the generation between the two world wars," Rapsis said.

Starring MGM heartthrob Ramon Novarro, 'The Flying Fleet' follows the story of six graduates of the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis who make a solemn pact to all become Navy pilots.

The film follows the cadets through training with scenes filmed on location at bases in San Diego, Calif., and Pensacola, Fla. Scenes were also filmed aboard the USS Langley, the nation's first aircraft carrier. The Langley, an aging coal transport ship, was outfitted with an enormous upper-level deck in 1922.

But it's not just airplanes and ships. In 'The Flying Fleet,' two of pilots fall for the same gal (Anita Page) off base, causing a rivalry that plays out in dramatic plot twists and action both on the ground and in the air.

Page, a young MGM starlet who had appeared in Laurel & Hardy comedies, would soon retire from the screen, only to return late in life in several low budget horror films released after 2000. She died in 2008 at

age 98.

The teaming of up-and-coming Anita Page and heartthrob Ramon Novarro was considered good box office. In a 2002 interview, Page recalled that Novarro was "... something to dream about. I mean he was so good looking."

A highlight of 'The Flying Fleet' is an appearance of "The Three Sea Hawks," a famous aerobatic team of the era. Drawn from a U.S. Navy squadron at Naval Air Station North Island, San Diego, the team used three Boeing F2B-1 and F2B-2 fighters. Its first demonstration in January 1928 at San Francisco gave rise to a popular nickname: "Suicide Trio" although officially the team was called "Three Sea Hawks."

'The Flying Fleet' was made with U.S. Navy cooperation, with the note appearing in the opening credits: "Dedicated to the officers and men of NAVAL AVIATION whose splendid co-operation made this production possible." The film was the first major Hollywood production to use Naval Air Station North Island in San Diego.

Popcorn and drinks will be available for purchase, and the screening will mark the debut of the Aviation Museum's vintage candy concession counter.
