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## Planning Board Approves New West Running Brook District

The Planning Board conducted their second Public Hearing for the purpose of amending Article IV to add a 24th district number under the name of West Running Brook District.

In addition, the public hearing and board discussion was set up to amend Article V Zoning Map areas and Article VI District Provisions. specifically for the West Running Brook District, which would be set up as mixed-use district with specified residential and commercial development requirements.

At the July 25 meeting, Planning Board Chairman,

John O'Connell said, "Before I open this amendment action to a public hearing, I have found some issues I want to bring to everyone's attention. So, in doing research on the West Running Brook District, I found that as we have been moving forward on this district, we have forgotten a very important piece.

That piece was brought up back at the end of last December and then got dropped because we have been so busy here. And that piece is in the architectural design review regulations and in that, it refers to the new section 170-84 and then a quite extensive section in section 170 - 86.1.

I cannot in good faith

vote yes on this district — knowing that this issue is out there and has not received any public hearings or purview from the board since that period of time. So, I wanted to bring it to the board's attention, so we can now open up the public hearing."

At the public hearing, no one from the Town came forward to provide further discussion support or challenges to the amendment process for the new district, so the amendment consideration was brought back to the board for further discussion.

O'Connell said, "There are a couple more things I want to mention on this

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## Derry School District Food Service Updates FY19-20 Prices

At the School District meeting this past month, the School District supported small changes in prices for food services across the district. Jane Simard, Business Administrator, presented an overview of the current status of the food services program with support information from Food Services Director, Susan Boroskas.

Simard said, "I would like to present information about the upcoming 2109-2020 food services prices. I met with our food services committee and board members including Brenda (Willis) and Michelle (McKinnon) and presented evidence as to why we want to make a recommendation to have a price increase.

So, I want to go over the calculations to justify the price increases with you."

Schools are required to increase the price of paid meals if the price charged is less than the difference between the Federal reimbursements rate for free meals and paid meals as per the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010, Section 205 - "Equity in School Meal Pricing Program. The last increase for food services from the district was during the 2017-20018 year.

According to Simard, 10 Employees and the Director of Child Nutrition are considered full time employees with benefits. Labor costs for the program are upwards of 60% of program budget. Those in the union are getting a 50-cent per hour increase and the

directors, managers, and a driver are getting a 3% salary increase.

In 2017-2018, expenditures exceeded revenues by \$47,494, largely due to replacement equipment and repairs. Items purchased during that time period included a pass-through refrigerator, a dishwasher, 3 icemakers, 2 convection ovens, convection steamer, and 2 warmers. The equipment being repaired/replaced this year includes a freezer unit located at East Derry Memorial.

Currently there is some updated equipment needed to be purchased to support the food services including a steamer at Ernest P. Barka, a convection double oven at East Derry, and there is a needed freezer repair at continued on page 5

On June 23, at 7:15 p.m., Marzola allegedly hit with his car John Pothier, who was mowing his lawn on North High Street in Derry.

Police say that Marzola left the scene without stop-

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# Elizabeth Warren Makes Campaign Stop at West Running Brook

Chloe Duchamp from the greater Derry area was among the approximately 600 people who attended Senator Elizabeth Warren's Town Hall at West Running Brook Middle School in Derry on Saturday, July 27. As she was waiting for the event start, Duchamp voiced her support, "I think Liz Warren is the right person for the country with her plans to help people gain more opportunity and to help lower living costs with plans such as her plans for child care, education and healthcare."

"I have young children, and I like her plan to help families support child care as I work multiple jobs to support our family – and child care is so expensive. It is hard to find affordable, good preschool day care with the right hours that I can trust to provide quality care for my kids."

Warren's idea for child care – per her campaign plan list – is to provide grants to states, cities, nonprofits, schools, and other local partners to "create a network of child care options that would be available to every family."

As the Town Hall began, Warren outlined that fighting corruption is a battle that the American people must

win. Warren outlined corruption aligned to moneyed interests across Local, State and Federal levels that are connected across markets driven by corporate interest and abuse of political power. Warren pointed out this situation has led to 1% of the population having the same wealth as 90% and this situation must be addressed appropriately.

Warren has put forward a plan that raises taxes from the wealthiest of Americans, those with a net worth of \$50 million or more. Under Warren's plan, these wealthy households would pay an

annual 2% tax on every dollar of household wealth above \$50 million, and a 3% tax on every dollar above \$1 billion.

From that plan, Warren outlined the list of actions that could be addressed — including universal child care that would help support a good education start for every child five or younger, universal pre-K for every three- and four-year-old, and increased wages for all child care workers and pre-school teachers.

Warren's plan would have a focus on education to provide more opportunities,



where the job market is rapidly changing. She has a plan for free tuition and fees for public technical schools and community colleges while supporting actions to forgive current student loan debt for 95% of students.

Warren received loud applause when she noted that the wealth tax would also support \$100 billion over 10 years to combat the opioid crisis as well as provide down payments to fight climate change and support Medicare for all.

"What we're saying is that if you make it really big, pitch in two cents, so every-

one else has a chance to make it in this country!" Warren exclaimed.

With regard to stopping corruption, Warren has told NBC that she is a capitalist, and she wants to see markets developed with fairness for capitalist opportunity. She said, "I believe in markets. What I don't believe in is theft, what I don't believe in is cheating. That's where the difference is. I love what markets can do, I love what functioning economies can do. They are what make us rich, they are what create opportunity, but only fair markets, markets with rules. Markets without rules are about the rich take it all, it's about the powerful get all of it. And that's what's gone wrong in America."

Warren said that after

she read the Mueller report in its entirety, she confirmed that Russia, a hostile, foreign government had helped Trump during the 2016 campaign, and that the candidate fully welcomed that help. And as the federal government investigated Russian interference in the election, Trump did everything he could to obstruct justice and impede the investigation. Warren said: "I believe the case has been made fully in the Mueller documents, with footnotes and affidavits. It is time now for us to begin the impeachment proceedings, and to have a vote in the house and in the Senate."

Warren also addressed the President's verbal comments and tweets directed towards certain House members as well as tweets sent out by the President that Saturday morning about Rep. Elijah Cummings, a Democrat from Maryland. Cummings is the chair of the United States House Committee on Oversight and Reform and is investigating potential corruption including associates of the President.

Warren says Trump's tweets were the efforts of a "brutal bully" — with this tweet harshly focused on Cummings. She said, "Trump is a racist who makes ever more outrageous racist remarks. It is insulting both to the congressman and to the people he represents. To be attacked by a President issuing racist tweets is beyond insulting. It is disgusting. This President brings shame to himself and the office."

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ago, we received a letter from FEMA (the Federal Emergency Management Agency), and FEMA is proposing new hundred year flood plans, so that is going to adversely affect this area here, especially for certain properties near the

Humphrey area. I also wanted to mention that when I look at the census track and if we're going to support an opportunity zone, it stops at Humphrey

Road. So, all the other areas that we're trying to do could be eliminated."

Board members discussed the current opportunity zone and most members felt that the opportunity zone would not really impact the idea for the creation of the West Running Brook District.

After much discussion among Planning Board members, it was positioned that these issues may not be an inherent problem for the creation of the new district, in consideration of the architectural design review regulations. Several members felt the Planning Board would still be able to change appropriate areas with regard to the architectural design accordingly if necessary.

Town Council member Brian Chirichiello — who is the liaison for the Planning Board mentioned the architectural design review document he had in hand actually covered the West Running Brook District.

However, the Chair pointed out that this new district may not have been fully covered in the official architectural design review documentation.

Derry Planning Director, George Sioras, helped clarify, "There are couple of things about the architectural regulations — they are not impeding a zoning change and the planning board can do that work as a

part of the LDCR (Land Development Control Regulations) and it can be done the same day as a meeting and it does not have to go to Town Council.

After additional discussion about the district and with knowledge that the Town Council would be taking the Planning Board's work and recommendations forward to Town Council meetings for further public hearings, the board took vote on the motion to approve the amendments.

While the amendment passed, Chairman O'Connell voted against it — saying, "The reason I am voting no is because there are no dimensional standards, so I am seriously concerned that we will be setting a legal precedent and this amendment could be in court situations. The other fact, is that the Master plan may not be in tune with what we are trying to do here, so we should factor that we are trying to put a district into areas where some people say the lots are not large enough."

The amendment was passed by the Planning Board with five yes votes, one no vote and one abstention, so this amendment and the final approval process for the West Running Brook District will now be moved to the Town Council for their considerations and for public hearings.

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ping to assist the injured man. Now, Marzola is also being charged with Insurance Fraud (Misdemeanor), related to the information he allegedly provided to his

insurance company regarding his damaged 2008 Ford Edge that was hit during the accident.

The suspect was released on a \$1,500 personal recognition bail and will face arraignment at the Rockingham County Superior Court

on Aug. 9.

The Derry Police Department credited social media and local news media for sharing the news of the incident and helping in developing the information that eventually led to the identification of the suspect.

## Food

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West Running Brook.

During 2018 - 2019, Derry's food services prices are \$1.50 for breakfast, \$2.70 for Elementary school meals, and \$2.90 for Middle School meals.

Overall the Derry Cooperative School District food services program and pricing are towards the high end in comparison with other districts in the surrounding areas. For example, the Londonderry school district has prices of \$1.75 for breakfast, \$2.00 for Elementary school meals, and \$2.75 for Middle School meals - while Windham has prices of \$1.50 for breakfast, \$2.50 for Elementary school meals, and \$2.60 for Middle School meals - and Bedford has prices of \$1.25 for breakfast, \$2.65 for Elementary school meals, and \$3.25 for Middle School meals.

A proposal to increase prices by 25 cents for breakfast was NOT approved by the school board, so the prices for the upcoming year will be the same and there will be efforts to analyze how to more efficiently provide breakfast to serve more breakfast meals to help offset costs. The proposal to increase lunch prices to \$2.80 (+10 cents) for Elementary school meals, and to \$3.00 (+10 cents) for Middle School meals was approved

by the School board.

The additional pricing structure for the upcoming school year approved by the school board for Elementary Schools and the Middle Schools includes Lunch reduced at \$.40 (no change), Lunch adult at \$3.75 (an increase approved to raise prices by 15 cents), Breakfast reduced at \$.30 (no change), and milk at \$.40 (no change).

One of the biggest issues the food services is faced with, concerns unpaid student balances. Including all the schools in the district, there is currently a total unpaid student balance for food services of \$24,681.82, with biggest unpaid balances of \$10,397.14 at West Running Brook and for \$5,555.94 at Gilbert H. Hood.

Simard pointed out, "I have mentioned before that these outstanding balances become the debt of the district, because the food services program cannot run in the red for account balances, so right now we have taken that debt on as a district." "We have been sending out email reminders weekly to

those parents signed up on the school box account, so every week they're getting those reminders, that if they owe money, they should put money into their account. We are also making phone calls to collect that money." Simard discussed, "If the child's account is paid off, then we do a update to the District debt accounting. Sometimes we do get donation money to help those students who cannot afford it - to pay off their debt. We try to pay off for the students with small debts first, so they can qualify for free or reduced pricing and not accumulate more debt. We have also raised funds to help with the student balance where appropriate."

Simard indicated that while Derry School food services prices are a bit towards the high end in comparison with other districts, it should be noted that the Derry School food services are not combined with high school food services, that would likely help lower costs slightly, with offsets of a more comprehensive food program including snacks."



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# DPW Connecting with Southern New Hampshire Regional Water Project

At a recent Planning Board meeting, George Sioras, Planning Department Director, introduced Tom Carrier, Deputy Director of Public Works — who provided an overview of work in progress for a Public Works project that involves the town's water supply. Carrier updated the Town and the public with informa-

tion about the current project actions in Derry that are a part of the Southern New Hampshire Regional Water Project (SNHRW). This project is related to the drinking water and ground water enhancements for Derry and other southern N.H. areas that are part of this regional project.

Carrier overviewed the work saying, "The project is now work in progress and includes support from the

State of New Hampshire. The parties involved are coordinating to extend municipal water supply to communities that have water supply contamination issues and shortages. The first phase of the project is to move 1,000,000 gallons of water from Manchester waterworks through Derry south via route 28 to Windham, Salem, Hampstead and eventually into Plaistow."

"Derry's portion of the

project consists of 7600 feet of 16-inch water line from the existing town connection on Ryan's Hill to the Derry/Windham town line. A separate part of the project that will consist of building a pumping station in Derry will be discussed with the town and the public at a later date."

Carrier said, "We wanted the public and the town to know about a new pressure reducing valve station (PRV) that is essentially the size of a large shed that is being built now. It's being constructed on 205 Rockingham Road (near but not on the former— Promises to Keep — property area) on a 48 acre land parcel zoned GC4 (General Commercial IV)." "The Town has worked with the property owner to secure an easement on the lot, so the property will be retained by the owner. The purpose of

the building will be to reduce pressure with two pressure-reducing valves that will be located at the site. This building site will not include pumping equipment."

The Southern New Hampshire Regional Water Project (SNHRW) water project will move water from Lake Massabesic through Derry to several other towns in Southern N.H. due to ground water problems and inadequate water supplies in Plaistow, Windham and Salem areas. Altogether, five towns in southern New Hampshire will soon be getting drinking water from Manchester Waterworks by the end of 2020 — according to the agreement finalized this past April. Among members of the Southern New Hampshire Regional Water Project (SNHRW) are Manchester Water Works, and the towns

of Derry, Plaistow, Windham, and Salem, along with utility companies in Hampstead and Merrimack.

Phase I water related improvements in Derry include installation of a pumping station near the Derry Meter Vault on Manchester Road in the vicinity of the Derry/Londonderry town line, an upgrade for the existing Rockingham Road pump station, the installation of the 16-inch main on Rockingham Road (Route 28) from existing system in Derry on Ryan's Hill to the Derry town line with Windham. In addition, Derry's portion of the project is proposed to extend through Windham to Goodhue Road. Carrier pointed out, a key part of the project is the installation of this pressure-reducing valve (PRV) station in Derry on Route 28 north of the Windham line.

## Derry Man Accused of Murder in Worcester Deemed Not Competent

Nearly three weeks after being accused of stabbing his ex-girlfriend, Amanda Dabrowski, to death in a restaurant in Worcester, Mass., Carlos Asencio, of Derry, was deemed not competent to stand to trial by Judge James Haddad of the Worcester District Court, last Thursday, July 25.

Asencio was arraigned and held without bail immediately after being arrested by the Worcester Police Department on murder charges, along with armed assault with intent to murder, two counts of assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, disorderly conduct and disturbing the peace. Judge Steven Power entered pleas of not guilty on Asencio's behalf.

Following Asencio's arraignment, he was sent to Bridgewater State Hospital, where he underwent mental health evaluations that ultimately led to Judge Haddad's decision.

On July 3 Asencio entered O'Connor's Restaurant in Worcester, shortly

before 8 p.m. and located Dabrowski, who had just come out of the restaurant's restroom and was about to rejoin the book club she was attending for the first time. Asencio was holding two knives and stabbed the woman, whom used to date, between 15 and 20 times.

Dabrowski screamed for help and a few people who were in the restaurant rushed to help her. Asencio then stabbed one of them and that male suffered a non-life-threatening wound. He was assisted by other restaurant patrons and they managed to hold Asencio down, until the Worcester Police arrived.

The next day, the Middlesex County District Attorney Office said in press release that on April 21 Asencio allegedly entered a residence on East Main St. in Ayer, Mass., wearing a mask and in possession of a handgun and a stun gun. In the residence, he attacked Dabrowski with the stun gun. Five days after the attack, the Ayer Police issued an arrest warrant.

On the day of that attack, Massachusetts authorities contacted Border Patrol in

Canada and were notified that Asencio crossed the border and allegedly boarded a 1:30 p.m. flight to Mexico. Police then obtained and executed a search warrant for Asencio's home and as a result of the investigation, applied for the arrest warrant for the charges of breaking and entering in the nighttime to commit a felony, armed home invasion, assault with intent to murder, armed masked robbery, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon and assault and battery on a household of a family member.

Ayer Police and Middlesex District Attorney Office notified the United States Marshal Service and federal border patrol authorities, to make them aware of the arrest warrant and to request assistance with the suspects return. The warrant was entered into the National Crime Information Center and over the next month, investigators obtained information that indicated the Asencio was still in Mexico and no arrest had been made. It is unclear how he was able to reenter the U.S. without being arrested.

## Four Injured When Derry Man's Boat Explodes on Lake Winnepesaukee

Four people were injured when a motorboat, that belonged to Jason Johnson of Derry, caught fire and exploded on Lake Winnepesaukee near Weirs Beach in Laconia on Saturday, July 27.

According to the New Hampshire State Police — Marine Patrol press release, the unit received a call at about 3:51 p.m. from a person who reported a boat explosion. The caller stated that the vessel was fully engulfed in flames and that multiple people were in the water, after evacuating the boat.

When the emergency responders - Marine Patrol troopers, Laconia Police

Department officers, Laconia Fire Department, Gilford Fire Department and the Meredith Fire Department - arrived at the scene, they found all six passengers, who were on the boat earlier, already out of the water. A preliminary investigation revealed that a 1993 25-foot Formula powerboat, owned by Johnson, had just finished fueling and after multiple attempts to start it, a large explosion occurred.

Immediately after the explosion, all six passengers jumped into the water and were helped to safety by witnesses and other passengers. While the passengers were being assisted, two people operating personal watercrafts (jet skis) pulled

the boat that caught fire away from the fuel dock and other nearby vessels and into the lake.

The four people injured in the accident were transported to Lakes Region General Hospital. Two juveniles and a 36-year-old female were treated for minor cuts and bruises and released shortly after. A 67-year-old male was treated for a broken rib and minor lacerations and was also later released. State Police added that the cause of the accident is under investigation and asked anyone with further information related to the case or who witnessed it to contact Sgt. 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# Planning Board Approves Maple Street Six Unit Condominium Complex

The Derry Planning Board reviewed the MPV Development, LLC site plan for a six-unit multi-family building to be set up as a condominium complex at 18 Maple St., Derry.

Planning Department Director George Sioras gave an overview of the project saying, "This project has a long history and was approved by the Planning Board originally back in 2005 and the developers were given two extensions including in 2007 and then in 2008. However, the recession hit and stopped the housing market, so the project never moved forward. This is the vacant lot - when you go down Maple St., and on the left - just before the old mill site that the town is redeveloping."

"Under the new zoning

regulations, you can now only have six units and previous approvals for this development were based on nine units. This is now a 6-unit Townhouse project and in the MHDR (Medium High Density Residential) zone. All town departments have reviewed and signed off on the plan, and there are project waiver requests needed to be granted that come from Bedford Design. I think the town and staff would support this project as it is going to help revitalize that end of Maple St., and fit well as the development in that area is getting better. So, we would recommend approval."

Matt Ruth, Engineer from Bedford Design spoke for the developer and said, "We are here to present this particular project. It is a vacant parcel of .73 acres. There is a multi-

family building to the east and a two-family dwelling to the west. What we're proposing is six two-bedroom units with three parking spaces each and that includes one garage space, and two visitor spaces for a total of 20 parking spaces."

Ruth overviewed that the plan has been designed to address site run offs and curbing rework to fit the area. After his overview of the project design, the Planning Board opened the review for a public hearing.

Derry resident, Rebecca Packard who lives on Maple street came forward at the public hearing and expressed concerns about the parking situation that also involved the multi-family nearby using the lot as parking space - and she also expressed concerns about how the traffic flow and congestion would be handled with the new

development.

She made a case that the area was already dangerous with traffic flow and adding traffic to the area would create further problems. She wanted to know what the town was going to do to manage the traffic better in that area - such as putting up traffic lights. Packard also noted that trash and garbage had been dumped near a brook area close to the properties on Maple St., and that she had previously notified the town of this problem.

Bedford Design Engineer, Ruth came back to the discussion and pointed

out the design for the development would address some of the street issues that Packard had discussed with the Board. It was pointed out that the town would act accordingly for the area's traffic. Ruth pointed out that the condominiums also would likely attract owners that would be more responsible to better maintain the property area vs. renters currently living in the area who may be impacting the area with trash.

After further discussions between Board members and Bedford Design engineer, Ruth - Planning

Director, Sioras over-viewed that the updated project development design is appropriate to the new zoning metrics and that waivers requested would also align to town intentions of revitalizing the area.

The board required that the project follow zoning stipulations, condominium documentation requirements and town development process, inspections and certifications.

Members then unanimously granted the waivers requested and approved the project to move forward.

## Pinkerton Alum Matt Taven Enjoys Professional Wrestling Career

Pinkerton Academy alum and professional wrestler Matt Taven is enjoying success these days. The 34-year-old from Derry was honored on July 15 by the Boston Red Sox and threw out the ceremonial first pitch of the Major

League Baseball champions' home game against Toronto.

For Taven, a lifelong Red Sox fan, this was a dream come true, as he later told ROHwrestling.com, the website covering his professional wrestling promotion. "I've lived in New England my entire life, and Fenway

Park's like a cathedral," he said. "I vividly remember getting pulled out of school as a kid to come to Red Sox games, and I try to make it out to a Red Sox game every year. And now I'm coming back as the Ring of Honor World Champion to throw out the first pitch at Fenway Park. Life's good, man."

Shortly after visiting his old high school this spring, during Astromania, the fundraising event held on March 30 at the Hackler Gym by last year's senior class at Pinkerton Academy, Taven's professional wrestling career reached a new high. On April 6, at the G1 Supercard event that took place at Madison Square Garden in New York City, Taven was able to beat former World Champion Jay Lethal and Marty Scully in a Three-way ladder match for the Ring of Honor World Championship after about 30 minutes of fighting.

With that win, Taven joined Christopher Daniels as the second professional wrestler ever to complete a "Grand Slam" with the Ring of Honor, winning the Ring of Honor World Tag Team title (which he did alongside Michael Bennett in Sept. 2015), the Ring of Honor World Six-Man (which he did alongside TK O'Ryan and Vinny Marseglia in Dec. 2016), a Ring of Honor

Secondary Championship (Which he won back in Mar. 2013) and the main Ring of Honor World Championship. When he threw out the ceremonial first pitch at Fenway Park, Taven was celebrating 100 days as the World Champion.

Last month, a long feature story on Taven was written by Justin Barrasso from Sports Illustrated,

where the wrestler's fascinating story was told, including coming back after blowing out his ACL and MCL at the Ring of Honor's Final Battle event in Dec. 2015. Taven's Ring of Honor character is not always a loved one by the crowd and he was even referred to recently as "Wrestling's Most Hated"

Sanford did not get on the ice, and play any big minutes throughout the Blues' recent playoff run until on game three of the Stanley Cup Finals against the Bruins. Sanford replaced the suspended Oskar Sundqvist in that game, and despite St. Louis' 7-2 loss in

that game, Sanford's good performance, including an assist for his team's first goal, bought him a spot on the team's rotation moving forward.

He played more and more minutes in every game for the rest of the dramatic series and added assists in games four and five and finally, a goal in the visitors title-winning game seven dominant victory at TD Garden.

After the season he was one of 40 NHL players who used their rights and filed for arbitration, before avoiding the process and resigning with St. Louis a two-year deal for \$1.5 Million.

age of 19 and debuted in NASCAR's lower series' in 2015, at Talladega Superspeedway, where he finished 21st in the ARCA Racing Series race. In 2017 he finished second in Talladega, just behind Justin Haley.

purpose field will be ready in the fall, where it could be used for soccer and field hockey. It will not be ready for the start of the fall season though.

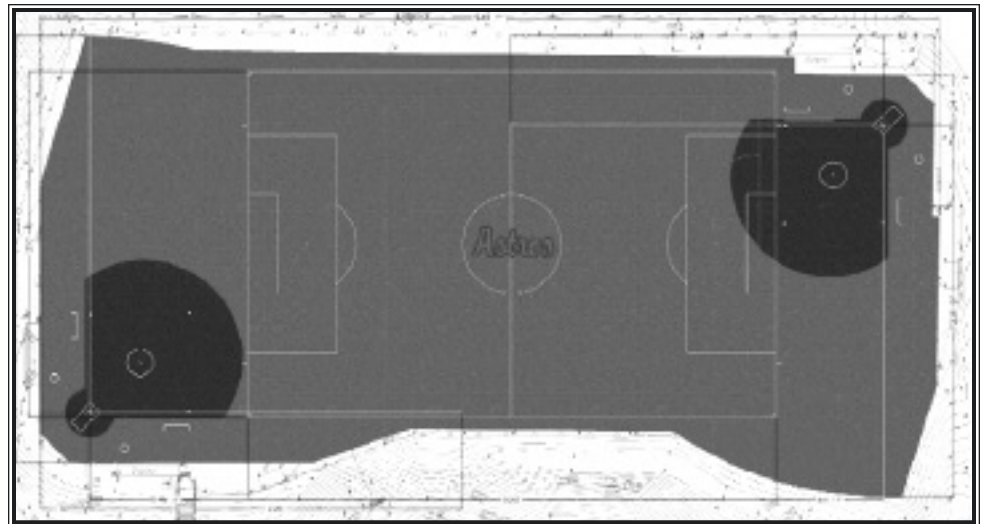

A rendering of the field that will be replacing the current field hockey and softball fields and will also be used for boys and girls soccer and girls lacrosse.

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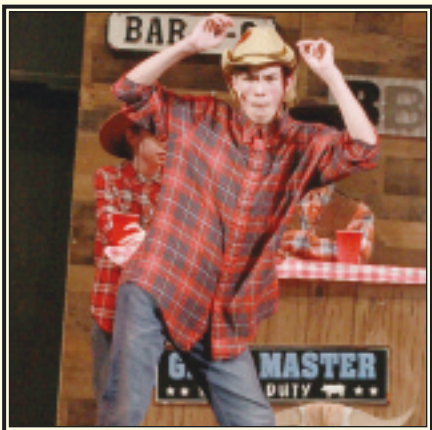
