## Council Accepts Agreement, Removes Old Right of Way

At the Tuesday, Dec. 3, Town Council Meeting, Derry Director of Public Works, Mike Fowler, recommended formal acceptance of a right-of-way dedicated to the Town of Derry and aligned to an agreement with Windham.

On November 6, 2019, the Derry Planning Board recommended acceptance to the Town Council of a portion of Nathan Road as a Class V road. The board originally recorded the plan, on September 19, 2016, and all area construction was inspected by the Department of Public Works.

Nathan Road is part of a large subdivision known as Spruce Pond Estates, it

has approximately 100 lots, with all but two lots located within the Town of Windham. The Town of Derry is accepting half of a cul-de-sac located within Derry, which provides road frontage for #26 and #29 Nathan Road, though the connecting streets to Nathan Road are completely within Windham.

While this subdivision development is located predominantly in Windham, there is also access through Derry. An Inter-municipal Agreement has been in place between Derry and Windham since 2013, placing maintenance responsibilities upon Windham.

Typically, acceptance of such an agreement by Derry would require Derry DPW to provide maintenance of the road area,

such as snow plowing and salting. However, given the inconvenient access for DPW equipment, this agreement has aligned such responsibilities with the Town of Windham for winter maintenance in perpetuity. Town roadway maintenance costs are estimated at \$6,000 per mile/per year. Now the cost for this area is mitigated by the Inter-municipal Agreement, which releases Derry from winter maintenance. Derry's costs will include future long-term capital costs such as pavement rehabilitation.

While the Derry Town Council formally accepted this right-of-way as aligned with Windham, another older right of way

## State Regulations will Delay Derry Solar Energy Project

Sometimes the best-laid plans go off track, even at the last minute. In this case, Derry's solar project that has the potential to save Derry taxpayers money and supply cost effective clean energy power, is now on hold.

The project was nearing final negotiations and was close to a vendor contract commitment that would have moved the project into high gear for installation.

The initiative is still projected to provide deeper tax savings for residents down the road, but the project is now on hold, due to issues

inherent within the State's current Net Metering legislation. Specifically there are certain New Hampshire regulations and metrics that impede optimized cost savings for larger solar energy projects.

Net Metering is a system in which solar panels or other renewable energy generators are connected to a public-utility power grid. The surplus power, if any is produced, is transferred onto the grid. Customers can gain credits from taking advantage of net metering to offset the cost of power drawn from the utility. Those credits can be used when the solar system is not out-

putting power, such as when the sun sets or is blocked by clouds.

Jeff Moulton, Chairman of the Net Zero Task Force and Mike Fowler, Director of Public Works were at the Tuesday, Dec. 3, Derry Town Council Meeting. They briefed the council and the public about this solar energy project in Derry that is still under consideration. The project deployment near term will be located at the old Derry landfill. The bottom line is that current NH regulations on the books impede municipalities, such as Derry, from deploying solar with optimized cost

## Planning Board Approves Waiver Requests for Two Plans

Derry Planning Board Chairman, John O'Connor, told Tim Peloquin, of Promised Land Survey, "You are two for two, Tim."

Peloquin was at the Board meeting on Thursday, Dec. 4, to present requests for two of his clients. Both

clients were granted acceptance approval waivers for different property projects, after reviews of the two different property plans.

Peloquin's survey and engineering business supported the plans for a subdivision of property to be located at 83 Frost Road near the Windham-Derry border, as well as another

subdivision waiver request for a property located on 64 Lane Road in Derry.

The property on Lane Road is a parcel of about two acres that is being subdivided in two parts to include construction for new residential home. This project also requires a waiver, as there is to be a unique

savings, which is related to how Net Metering credits are calculated and aligned to the state's electrical utility resources such as Ever-source.

There have been multiple attempts to change the Net Metering regulations through the legislative process over the past several years. The NH Executive Branch has blocked even bipartisan legislative bills to change current regulations and better support larger solar energy deployments. Governor Sununu vetoed updated Net Metering Legislation last summer and that legislation cannot come up again until late winter or

spring of next year.

"We really wanted to see this project happen," said Town Council Chairman Neil Wetherbee. "Everyone on this council is committed to ways to save taxpayer money. Unfortunately, because of the regulations and legislation, as it currently sits, that wasn't possible at this time. I'm hopeful we can work around that, and it seems there's commitment from the governor's office for some wiggle room for municipalities trying to save taxpayer dollars on the local level. So, hopefully as the fourth largest community in New Hampshire, we can lend our voice to support this and lend our project data to make that case to whoever needs to hear it in

order to get those regulations changed."

Wetherbee further stated, "And if it's not going to save the taxpayers money, we're willing to put the brakes on any project, and we are not committed to this project at all cost. Putting this on a hold is best for the taxpayers now and we are doing the right thing here; hopefully this project will happen in the near future to make this a tax saving arrangement."

Moulton and Fowler both pointed out that they would continue the project and look for changes in legislation next year as it is an election year and there may be new support. The Net Metering Bill from last year may be overridden or

altered in a compromise with the Governor.

Town Council member, Joshua Bourdon is the council liaison with the Net Metering Task Force and Bourdon stated his thoughts about the project status.

"When we formed this committee, one of our top priorities was to save taxpayers money," said Bourdon. "...we will continue

to push forward in that manner until this project makes sense. The existing solar project we have working already is doing well and it is not costing the town any money and it is powering the transfer station."

Bourdon further stated, "We are not the only community interested in these types of projects. We want to lower our taxes and we

want to be fiscally responsible through green energy. We also have other options, but we can make a much bigger difference here, with a little bit of help. I'd love to see our legislators and our next Governor, whether it be Gov. Sununu or someone else, really pay attention to what we're trying to do here in Derry. We're trying to help the taxpayers out."

boundary change to include additional land area around the property location.

JoAnn Curran, the property owner of 64 Lane Road, requested a waiver for a two-lot subdivision. Curran's existing home is also located on this property. The new single-family home to be built will also include additional acreage that will be comprised of land adjacent to the Curran's property.

Planning Board Director, George Sioras, pointed out that, "All town departments have signed off on the single-family development. Chairman, James Degnan, of the Derry Conservation Commission, has also signed off on the plans."

Peloquin overviewed the project concerning the subdivision of Curran's property saying, "The property had a variance granted on September 16, 2018 for a short-frontage. The desire of Ms. Curran was simply to divide it into two lots, including one very large lot at the rear of the property and she would stay in her current home."

Chairman O'Connor

pointed out that the variance was also granted as the property is slightly short of two acres and is actually 1.91 acres, as well as, a

50-foot dividing boundary, which will extract area from the 2-acre property. Peloquin noted that the additional acreage to be added to the new residence would be created from additional acreage that has been reviewed via a Conservation Commission walk-through. The intention of this added acreage is not to further subdivide the property, as there are wetlands and conservation area land adjacent to this new parcel that will be cared for appropriately under the ordinance.

No one came forward with any objections during the public hearing segment of this review hearing. Upon further discussion of the plan, the Planning Board granted acceptance of this plan.

Peloquin is also working with Steve McMaster, of McMaster Development, for a development plan project located on 83 Frost Road that will require a new waiver. Sioras overviewed the request saying, "The Planning Board approved a vari-

ance for this 2-lot subdivision back on May 15 of 2019. The waiver request is for the boundary monuments and underground utilities. Department head signatures are set, and there are no state permits that are applicable at this time. Approval of this waiver request is recommended."

Peloquin explained there had been changes needed in the original plan, which is why a waiver is now being requested for updating boundary markers and utilities access. It turns out that the development will require an overhead electric utility connection, instead of underground support, which was not determined at the time the variance was granted last spring.

At the public hearing for this waiver, a Windham resident who lives near the area, requested that the markers for the boundaries be clearly laid out with granite markers, which Peloquin said would be supported appropriately.

After deliberation, the Planning Board granted the waiver from this acceptance review for this property and the project will move forward as requested.

# Elementary Students Demonstrate Advanced STEM Program

East Derry Memorial Elementary School (EDMES) Principal, Bill Fox, was at a recent School Board meeting. At this meeting there was a presentation of the school's Volunteer of the Year and a First Lego League STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) presentation by a student team from the school. EDMES Assistant Principal, Carrie Sindoni, first introduced Candi Westgard, as the school's Volunteer of the Year.

Sindoni said, "Candi serves as the Vice President of the East Derry PTA. She and her husband Drew and her two daughters, Ava and Erica, are a fixture at our PTA events. We truly would not be able to support all of our events without her assistance."

"Candi and her family

can be seen working at various events including the playground cleanup, Fall Festival and Colorathon. Drew even loaded up his truck one weekend at the beginning of the school year to add play sand onto our sand table and sand box. This year Candi spearheaded our Colorathon fundraiser that raised almost \$10,000 for our PTA. This allows us to enable students to have access to a variety of programs throughout the year — whether they be STEM activities or various other technological access needs that these funds allow."

Sindoni summed up, "For these reasons, we are happy to present our volunteer of the year award to Candi Westgard. We truly appreciate all she does for the East Derry Memorial Elementary School."

After the reward was presented to Mrs. Westgard, Principle Fox

overviewed that some of his students had prepared a special presentation for the school board.

Principal Fox also pointed out that with the funds raised by the PTA the school could support this type of STEM program. He said the idea for this presentation began several years ago when the idea came up for First Lego League program competi-

tion. EDMES is now one of the only elementary schools in the state to offer this type of weekly student project meeting to support the First Lego League program.

This initiative involves programming Lego and robot device setups and the kids put in a lot of hard work coding and constructing different Lego effects, engineering setups and creating proper environments for their project.

Dave Cavino and Matt Sorso, student parents, supervise the program and they provided an overview of the project. They coach 11 EDMES kids in the First Lego League contests that are part of global Lego program.

The way the league works is that a competition is set up with different contest aspects that include developing a project mission to earn points. Teams have to come up with a

unique problem and then provide a presentation of their solution to that problem. The contest requires critical thinking, engineering and teamwork to be successful.

First Lego Leagues are also about multifaceted core values. One value is discovery — where teams explore new skills and ideas. Then there is innovation for teams to use creativity and persistence to solve problems. Next there is impact where teams apply what they learn to improve the world and the final core value is inclusion for teams to respect each other and embrace their differences. Teamwork is stressed in the league as the kids are taught that they are stronger when they work together.

The kids showed the school board members and the public a program presentation they had set up. The kids had programmed a Lego robot to drive a small Lego crane in a simulated building development environment. There were additional actions programmed in the environment including a wheelchair swing as well as setting up an operational elevator that would move certain things to different

areas.

The problem they set up was to solve how blind people might pick up their guide dog's poop to keep a city environment clean. Their solution included having service dogs set up with disposable poop bags. The kids even set up a buzzer, so that a blind person would hear a triggered sound when their service dog pooped.

The team paid a lot of attention to detail to ensure the idea was practical and they utilized certain types of elastic designs they felt were viable for use with service dogs. The kids outlined other possible solutions including certain wheelchair innovations, service dog and stoplight safety, and even worked out how to overcome that dogs are color blind.

Overall the team's Lego League project that was presented was very impressive for the school board and the kids demonstrated advanced engineering ideas. Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Connors-Krikorian said, "We want you to know how proud we are of you and want to thank your parents and school administrators for your support of these core values."

was alleviated. Specifically, a formal request was presented to the council to release a previously dedicated right-of-way off Juniper Road, where a planned subdivision was never constructed. That land also had been placed in a conservation easement, thus negating the need to maintain rights over this land.

Petitioners Christopher Donato and Linda Keighley are property owners of a residence on 35R Juniper Road and they submitted a formal request asking the

Town of Derry to release a 230-foot by 50-foot wide dedicated right-of-way located between two dwellings 35L/R Juniper and 33L/R Juniper.

Derry's regulations provide a mechanism by which a municipality may discharge a formerly dedicated public right-of-way. Derry department leads reviewed this request and provided a report to the Town Administrator with their recommendation to grant the request.

The right-of-way for this portion of Juniper Road was originally set up in a 1978 plan. However, that right-of-way was

never completely constructed as this section was conceived in anticipation of a future subdivision, which was never built.

So, there is no current need to neither retain the right-of-way nor provide a secondary access. Juniper Road is now a fully developed subdivision with several coned's and the

development has direct access to Old Auburn Road and Chester Road via Hickory Drive and Cole Road.

The Town Council has been asked to release these types of "paper streets" at the request of an abutter on previous occasions so the council again supported such a request.

And before you know it, it will be time for good old Santa Claus to jump out of his sleigh and down through the chimneys with lots of toys, all for the little ones' Christmas joys.

While new toys will bring just about any child joy for years to come (or however long it takes until the novelty from the latest fad wears off), there is also the chance that certain toys could cause just the opposite.

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission of the United States, approximately 240,000 children were treated for injuries caused

by toys in 2016. Though this number seems awfully high, the number of injuries seems to have come down from the year before.

The majority of these injuries seems to affect the head or face of children, and the type of toys identified as the most risky were riding toys, such as scooters, skateboards, and motorized cars. Riding toys continued to be associated with more trips to the emergency department for treatment, said the CPSC. The largest contributor to child injury were "toys, not specified," meaning it could have been any number of toys that caused a child harm.

It's heartbreaking to think that a toy, left from a visit from Santa Claus, could lead to a visit to the doctor's office, and possibly even mean that the rest of Christmas vacation need be spent healing from an

injury, but that doesn't have to be the case.

Aside from being the most wonderful time of the year, December is also National Toy and Gift Safety Month. As you shop for your little loved ones, or help them prepare a list for Old Saint Nick, keeping these safety tips in mind could save you a trip to the emergency room.

If you plan on decorating your holiday parties with balloons, or happen to have any December birthdays coming up, keep in mind that young children can choke on popped or deflated balloons. According to Child and Family Services, it is best to keep deflated balloons away from children younger than eight years old, and for fragments of popped balloons to be discarded immediately to prevent young children from ingesting them.

Along that same line of

thinking, for your December baby's birthday party, avoid handing out goodie bags with super balls or toys with small parts if your little one is under the age of three, as small children could choke on any of these things.

Toys that contain high-powered magnets are dangerous and should be kept out of reach of children when not in use, and should only be used with the help of an adult.

Riding toys such as scooters, roller blades, or anything else with wheels should only be given to children meeting the age, height, and weight criteria, and children should always be supervised and made to wear helmets, kneepads, and elbow pads when using the toys. Play it Safe During December's Toy Safety Month! Parents should also be mindful of the terrain these toys are used on, and keep an eye out for potholes, hills, and other location-specific hazards, particularly those relating to any possible vehicle traffic.

Once your little one excitedly opens his or her gift, there are a few precautions offered by Child and Family Services. First, be sure to immediately discard any plastic wrapping

or toy packaging (recycling when possible) before they can become a choking hazard. Second, keep toys that are appropriate for older children out of sight, mind, reach, etc from younger siblings. Finally, any battery charging should be supervised by parents, or specifically done by parents, as chargers and adapters could potentially cause burn hazards to young children, and some chargers lack any mechanism to prevent overheating. It is important to pay attention to all warnings and instruction labels. Preventblindness.org also offers some helpful advice in keeping tiny tots, with their eyes all aglow, safe this Toy Safety Month.

According to the site, there are three rules of thumb for keeping kids safe while playing with toys. The first, only buying toys meant for their age group. The younger crowd sometimes is in a rush to grow up and may be excited by a toy marketed to big kids, but if he or she is not old enough, it's not worth the risk. Second, parents should demonstrate to their kids how to play with their toys safely. And finally, moms and dads should always keep an eye out

while their children play, to circumvent any possible issues.

They also advise that before purchasing a toy, parents would be wise to read all warnings and instructions on the box, consider if the toy is right for their child or children's ability and age, void purchasing toys with sharp edges, purchase toys that are able to withstand impact and not break into hazardous pieces, Look for the letters, "ATSM," as this indicates the product meets the safety standards set by the American Society for Testing and Materials International, and finally, avoid toys that shoot or include parts that fall off (and that BB guns are NOT toys).

When it comes to matters of safety, it may not be all fun and games, but it's not all business, either. There are things to keep in mind, but when all is said and done, parents know their children, and toy safety comes down to common sense, for the most part. Perhaps the best way to ensure toy safety is to make playtime a family activity, making parents available to prevent any sort of toy injury from taking place. Of course, accidents do happen, but in this case, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of treatment.

# Hero Pups Unites Puppies with Local Veterans in Need

Hero Pups is a nonprofit organization, located in Stratham, but they service all over the greater Derry – Londonderry area. They work to place veterans and first responders, who are struggling with post-traumatic stress disorder, anxiety and other service related challenges with an individually trained service pup. Laura Barker, the founder of Hero Pups, is helping both ends of the leash with her extraordinary services. By adopting shelter and rescue pups whenever possible, it's a win win.

"My son is a Wounded Warrior, shot in Afghanistan. While we were going through the process for his surgeries, I was able to see first hand a therapy dog coming into the hospital and really making a difference. It was just like an "ah-ha moment" for me and I knew everything in my life had come to a point and you find the good in something when before it seemed like there wasn't any good at all. I knew I wanted to be a part of this." Laura explains on how she got the inspiration for Hero Pups.

Laura Barker is a twice recipient of the President's Volunteer Service Award for her dedication to veter-

ans and military families! She is one of WZID's

Outstanding Women for 2018. She is passionate about using her enhanced background with dog rescue and training working dogs to help this program on many levels. Hero Pups is a 100% volunteer run facility. They operate in a donated space and the community provides donated services from landscaping, snow removal and building maintenance. Barker said, "You won't find fancy, bone shaped doggie swimming pools, or brand new towels for the training puppies here, but the pups are 100% happy and taken care of. I would rather spend each dollar that was given to us straight back to what's important, which is making sure our mission is complete."

The organization does not charge the Heroes for their service dog. To be eligible to receive a pup, a veteran must have left the service with honorable standing and be seeking some assistance, such as counseling, as well as, permanent housing. When the training and screening process are complete the hero is given an individually trained service dog specifically for them. It's a lot of hard work, but Laura believes that the Hero's have already given so

much that the least she can do is provide them a companion to help them lead a happier life.

Each pup graduates with high honors in obedience training and are also trained in 2 special tasks to service that particular hero's disability. Laura and her volunteer staff actually matches each pup

with their perfect partner. "When I see the look of sheer happiness and hope on the face of a hero when I hand over their dog - it's all worth it."

In addition to veterans, Hero Pups provide Comfort/Facility Dogs to cities and towns. The pups are given to work within their communities as a resource

to help make the legal process easier for children, victims of abuse, as well as, coming along to provide support in crisis situations.

Liberty, a yellow Labrador retriever, is New Hampshire's first police Comfort Dog. After completing her training at Hero Pups she became a member of Concord Police force. "A lot of times as police we are dealing with people on some of the worst days of their lives," Concord police chief Bradley Osgood said. "If we can have something like Liberty to help ease that tension, and that anxiety, so they can tell us their story during a crisis, it's a win for all of us." Concord loves Liberty and she loves her role.

Laura also recently teamed up with Merrimack County Department of Corrections. Ross Cunningham, superintendent of the facility, contacted Hero Pups after the organization introduced Liberty. The inmates and the puppies are part of a first-of-its-kind partnership. The inmates are asked to handle and care one on one with a pup. They are asked to

train them on basic obedience skills, like sit, stay and come. The puppies are housed in the jail for about 2 months alternating between inmates and staff.

"The Merrimack County Department of Corrections has been absolutely great to work with," Barker said. "The dogs are extremely well cared for, not only by the inmates, but the staff too. This was definitely the right facility to be first in the state." This partnership is helping both organizations: Hero Pups are always in need of volunteers and with the one on one training from the inmates, Barker gets to train more dogs per month for her patiently waiting recipients, while the jail is teaching inmates skills and responsibility they need to be successful when they return to the community.

Hero Pups is just getting started. They plan on keeping the task at hand: helping people and helping dogs.

The returning lettermen are senior Rowan Rakich, sophomore Abbie Dumnont,

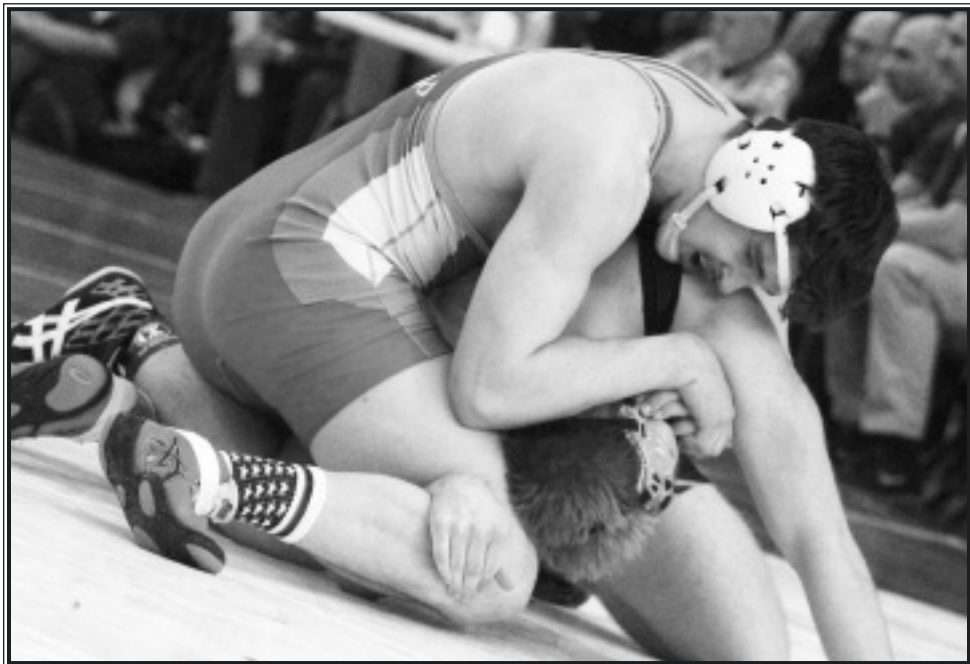
junior Issac Cohen, and senior Cam Sylvester.

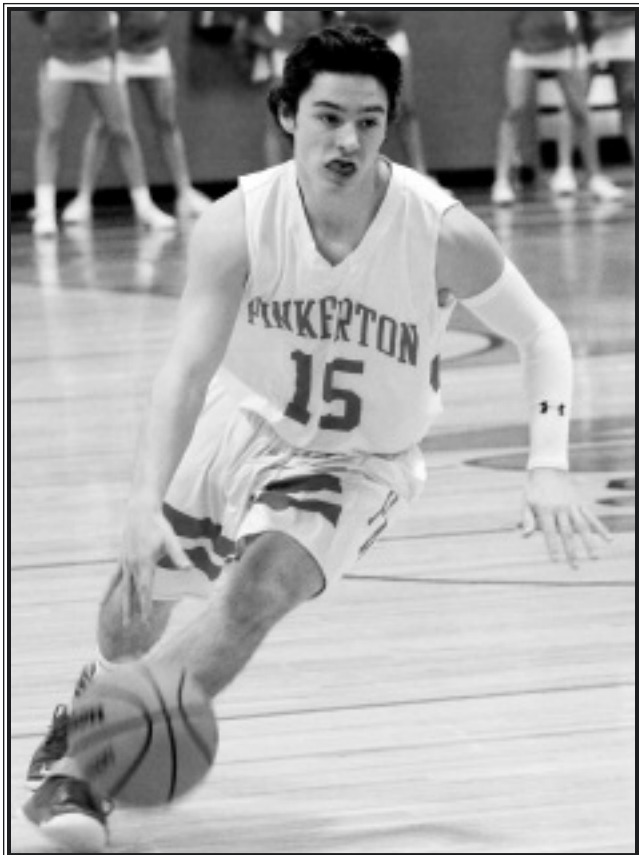
competitive team." Coach Rosinski continued to say.

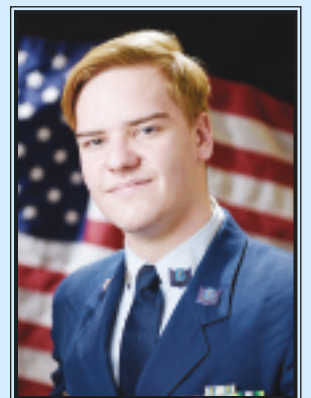
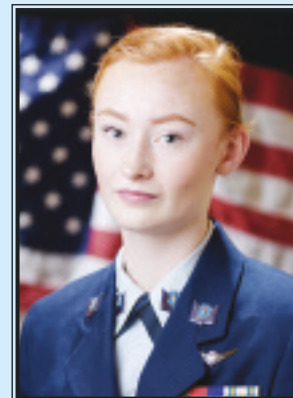
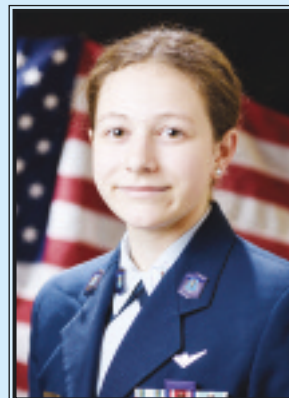

No person is allowed to place any snow or ice upon the surface of the traveled portion of any Town maintained portion of road or highway. Blowing,

shoveling or plowing snow into the street creates a very dangerous situation that can cause accidents. Any person violating this ordinance will be subject to a fine. Location of Mailboxes: As a friendly reminder, all mailboxes and newspaper boxes are allowed to be located within the Town right-of-way at the owner's risk. The removal of snow around mailboxes and maintenance of the mailbox and post are the responsibility of the owner. Residents are asked not to place any permanent or temporary structures, sprinkler heads or landscape items within the Town's right-of-way. The Town does not repair mailboxes damaged during snow removal operations. In addition, stakes, delineators or rocks placed at the edge of pavement can not be guaranteed for protection during the winter season.
