

Derry Joint Legislative Committee Looks Ahead

DERRY - The Derry Joint Legislative Committee met on Wednesday, July 22, with members of many of the Derry public bodies coming together to discuss how best to make the community better.

Lynn Perkins sat as chair for the meeting, and started by welcoming all that were attending, some of which were attending via videoconference due to the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Perkins reminded those attending the purpose of the meeting, the collaboration of the Town

Council, School Board, State Representatives and the State Senator meeting to come up with solutions to keep Derry moving forward financially, and discussing ways the state can help in that regard.

Derry Superintendent, Dr. MaryAnn Connors Krikorian, led things off with the help of School Business Administrator Jane Simard.

Simard started by giving the committee members an update on the financial state of the school district, the Undesignated Fund Balance currently stands at \$530,000, and the district has not spent anything from the fund since its

inception two years ago. She also said that since their year-end audit doesn't start until Aug. 10, she could say what the tax impact would be at this point from the district, but she estimated that it would be less than the 54 cents per thousand they estimated last fall.

Simard added that due to the pandemic, the transportation costs over the last few months were renegotiated, creating a large cost savings, but on the flip side of that the district saw a number of items lost in their budget, like rentals and reimbursement of kindergarten tuition.

Beach Rights and 48 Unit Plan Discussed by Sandown Selectmen

SANDOWN - During the Public Comment section of the Monday, July 21, meeting of the Sandown Board of Selectmen, members heard concerns brought forward by residents on two matters. One issue was the concern of a large development being built at the end of Ferguson Lane the other was on beach rights for a beach on Angle Pond.

Resident Joanne Donahue, who lives on Ferguson Lane, addressed the selectmen with a concern she has with a planned development by

D&H Construction at the end of her road. She explained that the company has applied for an application to build a 48 unit townhouse-style community, and she feels it's pretty large for the area.

Donahue was hoping that the Selectmen would support her in her effort to make sure this development meets all the requirements in town for such a project.

She said, "Based upon RSA 676:4, you the Selectmen, have the opportunity to request of the applicant, at their expense, to conduct additional investigative studies to ensure that this

development meets all of the requirements of the town, and the town residents, while also fulfilling and supporting all of our economic, fiscal, town safety protocols that are required."

She was asking the board to support her request for a Traffic Impact Analysis, a better understanding of the fiscal impact and to also conduct a hydrogeologic impact Analysis. She added that the last item would determine the groundwater and well water impact.

Her concern being that there were three homes on Ferguson Lane

Chester Academy Group Holds Reopening Forum

CHESTER - Members of Chester Academy held a Reopening Forum on Thursday, July 23, and presented a PowerPoint presentation constructed by the Re-Opening Committee on what is currently being planned for the fall in regard to getting children back to school.

The presentation started with explaining the school's Guiding Principles, which were stated as being S.A.F.E. (Secure, Actionable, Flexible and Effective), and that will be the focus used to bring students back to school.

The Re-Opening Committee focused on developing a plan to provide an opportunity for Chester families to safely return to school, while recognizing that some families want alternative choices.

The committee added that the success of the plan will largely depend on the entire communities com-

Derry Town Council Makes Preparations for Upcoming Elections

With fewer than 100 days until the national election on November 3, town officials and the town council members continued to firm up plans and procedures for voting at the July 21 meeting. For the safety of Derry residents and ease of access to promote voter participation, the town council passed unanimously Resolution 2020-033 that designates Calvary Bible Church as the polling location for the September primary and Pinkerton Academy's Hackler Field House as the polling location for the November election.

In the past, Derry has used a variety of polling locations. Because of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and its potential impact of limited available poll workers, the Committee of Elections has recommended that the Town Council designate one polling location for both upcoming elections in the fall.

At several moments during the meeting, voting by absentee ballot was

encouraged to promote safety and civic engagement.

Town Clerk Daniel Healey explained that residents who want to vote in the upcoming elections by absentee ballot must first complete the absentee ballot application. Several options are available to obtain this application: 1. Download it from the New Hampshire Secretary of State site; 2. Download the application from the Town of Derry site; 3. Call the town clerk's office to request an application and it will be mailed to the resident; or 4. Stop by the Municipal Building (drive-thru, if preferable) to grab the absentee ballot application.

"Residents who need help with the application," said Healey, "can contact the town clerk's office. We are here from 8-4 Monday through Friday and we check our email constantly."

Residents who are planning to vote by absentee ballot will have the option to select COVID-19 as the reason for their request. Per Healey, the State requires only one

application request for both the primary and general elections. Once the town clerk's office has received the application, it will be uploaded into the system. At that point, residents can monitor the progress of their application. This process also applies to residents monitoring their absentee ballot to ensure their vote has been recorded.

During the course of the meeting, Councilor at Large James Morgan raised the concern that

residents who are not computer savvy will find it difficult to locate information about voting on the town office site.

"I really feel that we are suppressing voters when we have to click through the website in order to get there," said Morgan.

After some discussion about ways to make the voting information more user friendly, Town Clerk Dan Healey and Town Administrator Dave Caron indicated they

would contact IT to make the necessary changes to the homepage. Residents who go to the Town Clerk page now will clearly see all of the pertinent information about voting and the request for anyone who would like to work at the polling stations.

Councilor Neil Wetherbee suggested that Pinkerton students and college students who are in the area should be sought out to work the polling stations; more important, the wages must be increased to attract interest.

"For better or for worse, generally our elections are staffed by older, retired people and that's our most vulnerable population," said Wetherbee. "In the end, we need to

make certain we are well staffed."

After a twenty minute discussion, the town council voted unanimously to pay poll workers \$15 per hour and an additional \$15 per hour for hazardous pay because of the potential health implications of coronavirus. It must be noted that Fire Chief Michael Gagnon affirmed that all poll workers will be provided with surgical masks.

Derry residents will notice over the next few weeks signs around town indicating information about the upcoming elections and polling locations. Again, if anyone has a question about absentee ballots, they should contact the town clerk office at 432-6105.

As far as the school projects going on she explained that a company came in to make sure all the Heat and Ventilation Systems were running properly Derry Village, South Range and West Running Brook were all recently paved.

Town Councilor, Jim Morgan, pointed out to the school district representatives that he thought they should be keeping a running tally of what the pandemic has cost the district so that when the next CARES Act bill comes through they would be ready to justify the reimbursement of funds.

The chair then brought up the extra cost associated with food services, which Simard agreed, saying everything served this year will be done on disposable containers, and also there will still be added cost in transporting meals to those students who don't attend school.

Derry Town Adminis-

trator Dave Caron was the next to speak, and he shared the state of the town through a PowerPoint presentation.

He told the committee that the FY20 worked out very well, saying that overall, there is an anticipated excess of revenues totaling \$450,000.

On the Expenditures side, he said 97 percent of the budget will be expensed. All COVID-19 expenses will be reimbursed adding that \$800K is set aside for Derry through the CARES Act and they've used about \$200K. Overall the town's year-end balance is at \$1 million.

Caron said that looking forward, things remain uncertain. Experience tells us that as the Recession lingers, revenues will decline.

He also said that as the state's Executive Orders expires, evictions and utility disconnects will most likely accelerate. The expiration of unemployment may also

impact revenues for the town.

Perkins asked Caron if he is foreseeing any cuts in state aid that would impact the town budget. Caron thought that if state aid were cut beyond 20 percent of what they would normally get, it would be a problem.

State Rep. John O'Connor asked where the nearly \$800K state reimbursement money is being kept, and Caron responded that the funds are given to town's after they have spent them. He added that the upcoming elections would be impacting the budget also.

State Senator Regina Birdsell was next to speak, and she began by sharing that trying to pass bills through the past three months has been difficult at the state level, but as far as the municipal and educational funding, they are not targets for state spending.

Birdsell said that the state has been advised to cut back on betterment funds, such as paving

projects in the ten-year plan.

She also told the board that while she tried to get a bill passed that would allow Derry Code Enforcement to put a lean on properties that were not being kept up along Broadway, it was not one that was voted on this year, but hoped that if elected again she would work to get that bill through.

She also talked about HB1558, which includes kindergarten funding saying that it had not been signed at that point but he had five days to do so.

John O'Connor spoke

on a few bills that he felt were important to Derry. The first was SB159, which deals with net metering of over 4.9 Megs. He said the governor vetoed the bill, but the Senate voted to override that. So now will head back to the house in September, and he hopes that whomever is voted in this year will make sure it passes, saying that it would potentially save Derry \$1 million. He said that the net metering bill, SB166, was passed by the Governor, but it is way under the 5 Megs the town wanted. The third bill he talked about was

another net metering bill, HB1218, which was similar to SB159, but failed to pass due to some timetable issues created by the pandemic.

O'Connor, who is not running for reelection, urged those who are voted in to pursue getting these bills passed.

Councilors Jim Morgan and Josh Bourdon agreed that those bills need to be passed in order for Derry to benefit in energy savings.

The next meeting of the Joint Legislative Committee will be scheduled at a later date.

that had to have their wells re-dug due to lack of water.

She finished by saying that she believes that these studies would benefit the whole town, not just the abutters. She also added that she was representing a group called the "Residents for Responsible Growth" and is made up of about 300 residents.

Selectmen generally felt that the matters she brought up would be a matter for the Planning Board to address, and didn't see where in the RSA, it called for the Selectmen to get involved.

The second issue brought to the Selectmen

was presented first by Mary Patterson of East Lane. Her street is a dead end, which has a small beach on Angle Pond.

Patterson explained that back in 1972 the owner of the beach property gave the ownership rights to the town of Sandown, and the beach has not been maintained by the town.

She told the board that the residents of East Lane would like the town to give ownership of the beach them.

Patterson added that there is nowhere to park to use the beach, a those living on the road are current the ones cleaning and raking the area, therefore the want to make it a private beach.

Selectman Jonathan

Goldman asked if the neighborhood was planning on forming an association and questioned why they would want to take on the liability of owning the beach.

The main concern seemed to be an issue with one of the abutter to the beach renting their home throughout the summer, and those renters take over the beach. There was also an issue of people parking illegally along Main Street and then using the beach.

Chairman Darren Hudgins told the residents at the meeting "We're not going to solve this in Public Comment," but told them to send each of the Selectmen an email voicing their concerns, and if there is anything they can do to help they will.

Trails at Broadview Farm Will Close During Mowing

The Derry Conservation Commission will commence a mowing operation of the main field at Broadview Farm Conservation Area in early August 2020. The purpose of the operation is to control invasive plants, improve habitat for grassland birds, and restore the historical

characteristic of the field as pasture.

The operation was developed in consultation with Dr. Matt Tarr, Wildlife Specialist at the University of New Hampshire Cooperative Extension, and will be conducted by Field of Dreams Mowing LLC, which has performed this

function at many other conservation areas in New Hampshire.

For safety reasons, all Broadview Farm Conservation Area trails will be closed to the public during the mowing.

Signs will be posted when mowing will take place.

Override Governor's Veto of SB159

To the editor,

Last week, July 22, Derry's Joint Legislative Round Table met to discuss the town budget. As a candidate for the NH House, I was invited to attend the meeting. It was good to see town and school officials and state legislators working together. I was pleased that two of my key platform issues were addressed.

I whole-heartedly agree with David Caron, the Town Administrator, who asked that any shortfall in state revenues be equitably shared among all state revenue sources. In the past, in order to balance its budget, the state reduced the revenues it shared with towns. The loss of state revenues meant local property taxpayers were left to fill the hole this caused in the town budget.

During the Round Table discussion, Councilor Jim Morgan brought up the need for legislation to raise net metering levels to 5 MW, a proposal I have supported for several years. Building a large solar array on Derry's old land fill would provide enough electricity to meet both the town's and the school's electrical needs

Pinkerton Cosmetology Instructor Named N.F. Cimaglia Educator of the Year

Keryl Reid Rabideau, Pinkerton Academy's cosmetology teacher, was presented the 2020 N.F. Cimaglia Educator of the Year Award during the virtual CEA convention on July 11 - 13. On behalf of Milady, a leading provider of beauty and wellness education, Lisha Barnes made the announcement, highlighting Rabideau's enthusiasm, passion and student engagement both in the classroom and in the remote environment.

The N.F. Cimaglia Educator of the Year Award was established 26 years ago by Milady and the American Association of Cosmetology Schools (AACS). This is a prestigious national award given to an educator who has demonstrated significant contributions toward upgrading professional standards of educational excellence, particularly in the area of student involvement.

A foundation of Rabideau's repertoire as an educator and classroom man-

ager is her ability to engage her students. Specific examples that illustrate her knack of getting the students excited about what they are learning are having a bubble machine filling the lab during the shampoo unit or during the color unit, she and her students wear safari hats and take a trip to the color zoo.

"Animals represent a color category," said Rabideau. "A report color, for example, is a duck because that kind of color slides off

like water on a duck."

What made this national recognition special to Rabideau was that her former and current CTE directors nominated her for the award. A 16 year veteran, Rabideau works tirelessly to instill a good work ethic and commitment among her students as well as model empathy and the importance of listening.

Makayla Plourde, a 2019 Pinkerton graduate who now attends Empire Beauty School, wrote emphatically about Rabideau's influence on her personally and professionally in her letter of recommendation for the N.F. Cimaglia Award.

"Ms. Rabideau makes sure she prepares her students for the next step in their future," wrote Plourde. "Although she wanted us to work for ourselves, she was always willing to help us with our struggles."

Cosmetology at Pinkerton is a two year program in which students receive comprehensive training in all aspects of hairdressing and related fields. When students enroll in this program, they apply for an apprentice license. Without this license, students cannot be on the floor and/or interact with any clients. Once the students complete the two year program, they will have earned 360 hours toward a secondary cosmetology school.

The benefit of earning 360 hours in the program, according to Rabideau, is that students will not only advance more quickly at a secondary school but will also save money on tuition.

In both Cosmetology 1 and 2, students are exposed to a blend of classroom instruction and hands-on experiences. Students learn a variety of hairstyling techniques, nail design, and proper sanitation. Additionally, students learn about the business side of the cosmetology industry. Throu-

ghout the two year program, students work with customers in the campus salon and job shadow professional cosmetologists.

The pride and passion Keryl Reid Rabideau possesses for her students and program is evident when one visits the cosmetology classroom. As much as she takes pride in earning the distinction as the N.F.

Cimaglia Educator of the Year Award, Rabideau's greatest achievement is the success of her students.

"The secondary schools always tell me," said Rabideau, "that I can tell who is a Pinkerton student - they know this and they can do that."

It makes Rabideau's heart soar knowing that her students are successful as cosmetologists.

Hampstead Conservation Makes Plan for New Trail Maps

The Hampstead Conservation Commission met on Wednesday, July 15. The Conservation Commission was able to meet in person at the Town Hall to discuss the making of new trail maps for the conservation areas in the Town of Hampstead.

The Commission would like to update the maps of all the trails in the town to include online versions as well as a big 4ft by 4ft sign at the entrance of the trail to include individual maps that can be readily available and printed on paper as well.

The first order of business was to allow the Town of Atkinson to

place a 4x4 sign with maps of their trails at the West Rd. trailhead where the trails can head into their town. The motion carried and Atkinson will be allowed a sign that holds a map to their trails.

Next up was the discussion on the update to the trail maps. It was noted that Atkinson used an application called All-trails, which has longitude and latitude included on the map and then they hired Hampstead Print and Copy to make it look more presentable. It was noted that the cost of printing the map was around \$600. Another option the board discussed was using Trail-

finder. Their maps however are not high enough quality when printed and do not allow you to color code the trails to make it easier. Using Garmin is another choice because it can color code the trails, however it is not clear if it will work well with other software. The map itself will be done in house by Board member using software that will eventually make the map something that can be geospatially aware. This will be useful to those who are out on the trails and have a device that will be able to tell them where they are on the trails using the new trail map and modern day technology. To ac-

complish this the Board needs to purchase Adobe Illustrator, which will cost \$239 for a year's subscription. The Board approved this purchase. The benefit of using Adobe Illustrator is that the trails can be color coded and drawn to scale. The board would then be able to have a digital copy of the trails to then make into a master trailhead sign and also have printed copies for people to take along with them as well. This would also allow for a QR code to be made and have the map loaded into an application to see where you are on the trails on a mobile device. This will likely be done

as quickly as possible to help reduce the number of people getting lost out on the trails.

In other business, the board was updated on Hadley Road where contractors had blocked an entrance to one of the trails. A note was sent to the contractor to decrease the grade of the hill blocking the entrance from a 13% grade down to an 8% grade. The board has not yet heard back from the contractor.

The Board then reviewed minutes from the last Conservation Commission meeting before going into a non-public discussion.

Annual Blues Festival To Benefit Veterans Set for Aug. 22

Their motto: "Vets Helping Vets." Their mission: "To maintain public awareness of veteran issues...to remember our brothers and sisters who have fallen, have been taken prisoner or are missing in action while serving their country during an armed conflict," and, "To support and defend those who have defended our country and our freedoms."

According to the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness, as of January 2019 nearly 10 percent of all the state's homeless population comprises of veterans. Now more than ever, in the midst of a worldwide pandemic, those who have defended the United States need the support of those they have fought to protect.

That is where the Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association (CVMA) and the Londonderry Blues Festival come in.

Despite the COVID-19 pandemic, the sixth annual Blues Festival will be taking place on the Commons later this summer on Saturday, August 22.

Funds raised at the festival will benefit the CVMA, an organization

consisting of all branches of the United States Armed Forces who ride motorcycles, and who work to help veteran care facilities provide warm meals, clothing, shelter, and guidance to veterans in need.

As always, admission to the Blues Festival will be free, with opportunities available for patrons to donate to the cause either through food truck purchases, participation in raffles, and through direct donations.

Dennis Martin (also known as Dr. Harp), Blues Fest coordinator and front man for Dr. Harp's All Veterans Blues Band, met with Chief of the Londonderry Fire Department, Darren O'Brien on Monday, July 27 to iron out all of the details to make this event possible.

According to Martin, the Blues Festival will be the only concert event to have been allowed to take place in town amid the pandemic so far.

Naturally, for the safety of everyone involved, CDC guidelines will be in place for the event per Chief O'Brien. Signs will be placed along the Commons to help individuals and family groups (of no more than ten) maintain a distance of at least six feet apart.

According to Martin, there will be a barbecue food truck and an ice cream truck on the common for patrons to purchase food from. There will also be two tables for patrons to visit, one to participate in raffles and one to give direct donations to the Association.

Martin stated that outside non-alcoholic beverages are welcome, and patrons may bring their own chairs and blankets if they wish. Per current CDC guidelines, patrons are urged to wear face masks while in attendance, and are encouraged to bring their own hand sanitizer and other cleaning supplies.

Martin explained that the Festival will have far fewer vendors this year than in years past in order to keep things safe for all in attendance. As a result, there is the possibility of fewer avenues for donations, but Martin is hopeful that the festival will still be able to match monies raised from previous years.

"We hope that people will give out of the goodness of their heart," said Martin.

Martin spoke highly of the Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association, stating that the organization does not profit from any

money they receive, instead putting it all back into their community of fellow veterans in need.

"They don't take one penny," Martin said, "It's all volunteers, no administrative costs."

Along with Martin's band, the Londonderry Blues Fest will once again feature, for everyone's listening pleasure, the Deep Fry'd Blues Band.

Also joining the line-up this year will be the Larry Dougher Band and the Adam McMahon Trio.

All four groups have something to offer listeners of all ages. The young and young-at-heart will all find themselves dancing and singing, and just immersing themselves in the deep, soulful instrumentals and vocals.

"This is a family event, all ages are welcome," said Martin.

Attendees will be asked to remain 20 to 25 feet away from the stage for their safety, though distance will make no difference in listening quality as the smoky-smooth sounds of the Blues will fill all of the Commons, pouring out into the surrounding streets.

The sixth annual Londonderry Blues Festival will take place August 22 from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. Parking will be available at all neighboring churches and at Matthew Thornton Elementary School, said Martin. There will also be volunteers present to help direct parking and traffic.

Those who are apprehensive about attending this year's Blues Festival, but

who would still like to contribute to the cause may visit

www.combatvetnhv1.org or www.combatvets52.com to make donations directly to the local CVMA chapters, and to learn more about the organization.

Donations for raffles will also be accepted via drop off on the day of the event before patrons are expected to arrive.

"I'm there at ten," said Martin. "Just look for the guy who has the Coast Guard shirt on."

mitment to keeping each other safe.

Chester Academy physical distancing guidelines will vary from between three to six feet, depending on the situation, and the school will continue to comply with NHDOE, DHHS, AAP and the CDC on keeping areas clean.

Mask use will be required to all who enter the school or who are on buses or on school property. Pre-K children will be exempt.

The school year will be shortened from 180 days to

177 school days, giving time to train staff for three days, and the committee is recommending the first day of school start on Tuesday, Sept. 8.

If opened, half of the gym will be utilized as an area for students with symptoms to be waiting to go home.

Tents will be set up for screening and check in.

Hand sanitizer dispensers will be placed in every classroom.

There are three options being recommended by the committee:

- Adapted in Person - Which would be starting the year as they normally would with safety proto-

cols in place. There would also be videoconferences for those who choose to stay home

- Hybrid Remote - With most students learning from home, and having scheduled weekly meetings consisting of a maximum of five students.

- Full Remote - That would have all students remaining at home as they did through the spring.

The committee will be presenting their plan for the school reopening in the first week of August to the School Board.

The Hampstead Public Library begins customer access to the building by appointment starting Monday, Aug. 3. This is Phase 3 of the Plan for Increased Services. Appointments are for Library cardholders who wish to browse the shelves in order to select materials to borrow. Each appointment is for a 30-minute period. Time slots are available on the hour from 9 a.m. - 3 p.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays, from 9 a.m. - 6 p.m., on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and from 9 a.m. - 11 a.m., on Saturdays. Only one person in a family needs to make the appointment; however, they will be asked how many from their household will be coming. For example, a husband and wife might come, or a parent with three children, etc. Library patrons can call 603-329-6411 to book an appointment, or reserve a time online via the Library website.

Face coverings must be worn at all times in the building. If visitors do not have a mask, they will be provided with one. Social distancing rules between patrons and staff will also be in effect. If you feel ill or have been exposed to someone who tested positive for COVID-19, we ask that you stay at home.

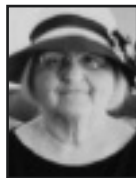
