## Trick or Treat Concerns Voiced at Sandown Selectman Meeting

SANDOWN - During the Sandown Selectmen meeting on Monday evening, Oct. 28, Police Chief Joe Gordon shared some information that he had received from the CDC in regard to handling Treat or Treating in the town.

Gordon started by saying that he wanted to share his views on the subject of whether or not Trick or Treat should be celebrated in town.

He told the board that the Sandown Scouts and the Conservation Commission had canceled the annual Spooky Walk.

He said that the CDC

guidelines have shown that door-to-door and Trunk or Treat trick or treating is show as a high-risk activity.

He added, that in his opinion, it is not the best thing for the Town of Sandown, but left it in the hands of the Selectmen.

Gordon added that haunted houses were also a high risk.

He suggested that the town make a slight variation on how residents celebrate the holiday, saying that bowls could be left at the end of driveways to allow for social distancing.

He also cautioned the Selectmen away from allowing neighbor parades to happen through-

out the town, saying that he would just not have the manpower to monitor that activity.

Selectmen didn't see a way or need to cancel Trick or Treating on Halloween, but advised residents to be cautious.

The town will celebrate the holiday on Saturday, Oct. 31, from 6 to 8 p.m.

Also at the meeting, Gabriel Gerhard attended to discuss a proposed Eagle Scout project of re-roofing the Hearse House near the Meeting House.

Gerhard told the board that he would be rehabbing the roof of the house to prevent further decay. He would also be

## Derry ZBA and Residents Argue the Value of Turning Back Time

DERRY - The Thursday Sept. 17, meeting of the Derry Board of Adjustments involved a rather short case followed by a much larger one.

As the first case, 20-136, presented before the ZBA by attorney Brian Germaine, Esq, on behalf of the Marino Family Trust who were looking to expand their property with a second story, with board member Heather Evans recusing herself in favor of alternate member Donald Burgess, the case was zipped through unanimously and with all dispatch, and it was left to the

second case presented to provide the drama for the evening.

The second case was a proposal requested by Germaine on behalf of his clients for the changes proposed to the 1930's era single story structure home along Beaver Lake to demolish the existing structure and rebuild a two story dwelling - although staying within the original footprint - were granted after a thorough but succinct discussion and deliberation by the board, while the case of Mr. and Mrs. Tanguay dominated the meeting.

Chair Lynn Perkins stepped down and was replaced by Corbett, with

Evans returning to the fold and Burgess stepping in for Corbett.

The variance case of 20-137, involving the Tanguay family who had contracted for purchase the zoned three family dwelling unit located at 32 North Shore Road in an established neighborhood absorbed more than three quarters of the meeting. This particular farmhouse, dating from the 1700's has a somewhat murky past, according to neighbors and documentation.

In testimony from Mrs. Tanguay, the home had been occupied by a squatter for at least a decade, no one could reach a consensus

## Hampstead Selectmen Hears Update on Drought, Restrictions Could Come

HAMPSTEAD - The data collected by the National Drought Mitigation Center paints a dire picture of the situation in southern New Hampshire. The NDMC compiles the U.S. Drought Monitor, a scale ranging from D0 to D4, with D4 being the most severe.

"After a somewhat dry spring, the Hampstead area entered the summer in the D0, abnormally dry, classification, said the chair of the Hampstead Water Resources Committee, Ken Richards. With little rain in June, the situation was exacerbated, and the town reached D1 conditions on June 23. Two more dry months brought Ham-

sptead to D2, officially making the drought "severe."

Hampstead usually receives between 3 1/2 to four inches of rain per month during the summer. This year, Hampstead's total summer rainfall fell six to nine inches, according to Richards. "We haven't seen a drought like this

# Hampstead Selectmen Talk Trick-or-Treating, Gyms Reopening

**HAMPSTEAD** - The Hampstead Board of Selectmen made two decisions regarding the handling of the pandemic within the town. They declined to make an official decision one way or the other regarding the cancellation of trick-or-treating amid the pandemic, during its meeting on Monday, Sept. 14, but indicated that it will not be cancelled in all likelihood. During that same meeting, they allowed a local gym to

begin the process of letting people return to use their facilities.

Chairman Sean Murphy looked to nearby towns to set the precedent for how to handle Halloween, but “nobody’s really made a commitment one way or another,” said Administrative Assistant Sally Theriault. Tilton is the one exception, she said, as they have decided to go “full steam ahead.”

Families and individuals who do not want to risk contracting or spreading COVID-19 have the option to not participate, which

led the board towards supporting trick-or-treating occurring. A spread among those who do participate, however, could lead to a spike in cases locally.

“My thought is... there is no need to cancel trick-or-treat,” said Murphy.

Selectman Chad Bennett agreed with Murphy, but suggested the board holds off on setting their plans in stone. “I’m not against it. I don’t know if I want to jump on a definite yes right at the moment, because say every other town around here says no,

I don’t know if Hampstead is going to get a ton of people coming in,” he said.

That concern is what led the board to table the talks. While the town may be able to handle its own children trick-or-treating, a crowded Halloween raises the risk that the virus could spread.

Continuing on with pandemic-related conversations, the board gave permission to one local gym to open on a very limited basis. The staff is required to let one group in at a time, schedule the visit ahead of time and ensure

that all facilities that were used are sanitized for the next group. On top of that, they will only be permitted to open on weekdays. This trial run is to be monitored closely, and the results will be reported at the next meeting. The board members had their reservations, but they ultimately said that, pending positive results, this could lead to fewer restrictions and a full reopening in the near future. “Try that temporarily, see how that goes, and then if all goes well, we’ll just keep doing more,” said Bennett.

The vote to approve these measures passed unanimously among the three voters. This trial run will last one month. The board will consider the next steps during one of its October meetings.

With further developments to come on both of these topics, October will be a crucial month for the selectmen in determining how to move forward in the face of the novel coronavirus. The board will continue these discussions when it reconvenes for its next meeting.

# Hampstead Conservation Committee Discusses Recycling Project

**HAMPSTEAD** - Hampstead is getting involved in a community recycling project after the idea was proposed during the Conservation Committee meeting on Wednesday, Sept. 16.

Community member

Darlene Cody brought the suggestion to the committee “A volunteer collects 500 pounds of plastic, within a six-month period of time, and... they in turn donate a four-foot bench,” she said. She also volunteered to be in charge of the collection of the plastic.

The project is being

run by Trex, which manufactures composite decking and cladding.

The list of products that can be contributed is long. All types of plastic bags, plastic casing and newspaper sleeves are just a few of the many items listed at the meeting. Cellulose, hard plastics and trash with food residue cannot be contributed.

Two other local organizations, the Hampstead Garden Club and the Sandown Garden Club, both participated and completed the challenge,

said Cody.

The board’s chairman, Timothy Lovell, made sure to point out the difficulty this project could present. “500 pounds is a lot of collection, when you think about it, because plastic is so light,” he said. “That would be a big project, but wow, that would be an awesome thing to do.”

In order to successfully complete the challenge and receive the bench, the plastic has to be collected within six months of the start date.

In addition to the prize, the collection of 500 pounds of plastic waste that would otherwise go to a landfill is a way for Hampstead to make an ecological effort to limit the town’s waste. All the collected plastic will eventually be turned into decking.

The plan is to advertise this effort with online and traditional tactics. Posts are expected to be shared on Facebook, and Hampstead residents can keep an eye around town for informational posters, too.

To make contributing easier, Cody expressed a willingness to pick up

plastic items herself and host one of the collection bins at her house.

For the sake of giving the cause more exposure, Selectman Liaison suggested presenting this information again at a future meeting, attracting more eyes and as well as offering an outlet for a more structured presentation.

The Hampstead Conservation Committee meets on the third Wednesday of every month. October’s meeting is scheduled for the 21. More information on this project and other agenda items can be expected at that time.

# Derry Planning Board Eyes Changes to Downtown Zoning

DERRY – The Wednesday, Sept. 16, meeting of the Derry Planning Board Chairman John O’Connor led with the informal announcements regarding electronics usage and emergency procedures as well as the Covid-19 amendments to the meetings rules allowing for a quorum by distance as per the governor’s emergency pandemic order.

Beginning with a motion for the approval of the minutes from the Sept. 2 meeting, including the site walk regarding the Pinkerton plan,

the motion passed. Moving along to correspondence the board discussed one item, the September/October 2020 issue of New Hampshire Town and City, a publication of the New Hampshire Municipal Association, this issue is available to be viewed in the Planning Office.

The public hearing was opened with the headmaster of Pinkerton Academy, Dr. Timothy J. Powers, in attendance. As there was no one attending in person either for or against the proposed improvements at the school, and there were no Zoom participants of

either opinion, the Board then went into the non-public portion of the meeting. O’Connor thanked Ms. Davidson for the photos and video she had provided concerning the proposed improvement to property and a motion was then made to grant the stabilization of the disrupted section adjacent to the planned new turf field, Mr. LaRue reported that the DPA had no issues with the plan, and the motion passed unanimously.

Two future workshops were then announced, although they were hoping to have a presentation that

evening to preface one of the workshop topics by Mr. Bob Mackey of Code Enforcement, “But he is ill at home,” O’Connor stated.

Also addressed as a topic of an upcoming workshop, electronic message board signage advertising, this issue was slated for discussion on Oct. 7, with board members speaking further concerning the changes in sign board technology since last addressing this issue just five to seven years ago, but any in-depth conversation was tabled due to Mackey’s current health issue, as his input is crucial to the subject at hand.

Member Jim MacEachern stated the need to “look at the unintended consequences” of changing one requirement and not another, as per the many different styles and types of signage as the board scheduled the issue for the upcoming workshop.

The next workshop item was concerning changes to the traditional business overlay district, especially pertaining to the issue of housing, allowing for the possibility of rezoning for higher density housing within the downtown area. Referencing larger areas such as Manchester, the

Town Council has asked the Board to look at the possibility of expanding available urban housing within the downtown Derry business district, particularly adjacent to Broadway Avenue. After discussing overlay maps, the board decided upon October 7 as the date for this workshop, although continued parsing the issue of potential parking issues contingent with more occupants within the designated area during all hours of the day and night within the earmarked space. The Board then adjourned until the next scheduled meeting on Oct.7.

# Conservation Commission Begins Tying up 2020’s Loose Ends

DERRY - The meeting began with the customary roll call and approval of the minutes from the previous meeting with one query as to the verbiage of a reported action, causing a motion to delay the approval of the minutes until the next meeting. This motion was approved.

Tackling correspondence next, Chair James Degnan reported a share from New Hampshire DES regarding groundwater and spoke of timely reminder after reporting correspondence regarding Shepard Park in Corneliuson Woods where a cleanup had been recently held.

Apparently, there is still noticeable debris at one picnic site, which will

be dealt with. Degnan further noted that although a trail cam is stationed at the boundary, it is pointing away from the park, which led into the standard seasonal warning concerning the public’s need to wear appropriately noticeable gear such as blaze orange and to outfit their pets as well during hunting season while enjoying the outdoors, even while walking within their own property. “Just make sure that you can be seen, and that goes for your animals as well,” Degnan stated.

“It’s time we start putting the bow on 2020” Degnan said as he brought up the topic of the volunteer Land Steward program and the forms that the commission had created outlining the job description, qualifications and duties of

the program volunteers. Member Eileen Chabot inquired whether the job description was a must have or a wish list, Degnan answered “This was what we were hoping for” and also, “These are the things that we can expect.”

Chabot queried, “Wouldn’t this list exclude volunteers with an interest in just monitoring the properties but don’t have the skills to clear ditches and run machinery, would it make any sense that when somebody signed up we could have them identify the activities that they’d like to participate in?”

Said Degnan, “We could change skills and interest (on the form), we could say skills and abilities,” as the board then discussed the possibility of pairing one observer with another volunteer who had

the physical ability to participate in the more rugged aspects of land stewardship, so as not to exclude community members who do not have the physical ability to clear trails. Traditionally, there have been two to four Land Stewards per property, so the balance struck by the board’s need to review the wording of the Land Steward applications should not affect their performance in the field.

Announcing derryconservation@gmail.com was now registered as the new go-to communications portal for the potential Broadview Camping Program as

well as the Land Steward Program, and a centralized hub for Conservation activities other than the Broadview Garden Program – which has its own email address, broadviewgarden@gmail.com Degnan also presented the new UNH Cooperative monitoring report forms which were passed to board members for their perusal.

In other business, “We are going to try to go fast and furious on getting the stewardship and monitoring reports wrapped up for 2020,” said Degnan as he dove into the need to work at the GPS mapping ven-

ture while the trees were not obscuring the signal as they do in high summer. He also stated the need to keep the momentum going on public participation which had stalled somewhat due to the pandemic.

Out of control rabbits and perhaps the need to obtain some foxes was the report on the current Broadview Garden situation, and it was noted that some of the gardeners have already pulled up stakes although there are a few still producing, apparently the bumper crop of rabbits are quite pleased.

# Editorial

## Fire Safety All Year

Oct. 4-10 is Fire Prevention Week this year's theme is "Serve Up Safety in the Kitchen", many fire departments are figuring out how to get information out to the public to educate them. If this was a normal year the month of October would be filled with open houses and events to emphasize fire safety.

"Cooking continues to be a major contributor to the home fire problem," said NFPA Vice President of Outreach and Advocacy Lorraine Carli. "The good news is that the vast majority of these fires are highly preventable.

Nearly half of all home fires involve cooking equipment, with unattended cooking being the most common, according to the NFPA.

This year's messages is about never leaving cooking unattended, keeping flammable objects such as towels and food package at least three feet away from stovetops, and not using stoves while sleepy or after consuming alcohol.

It is so important, to reinforces why everyone needs to have an escape plan. And the importance of having smoke detectors in every bedroom. Fire officials note, that half of home fire deaths result from fires reported between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., when most people are asleep. They also say that having a working smoke alarm cuts the chances of dying in a reported fire by half.

Other tips: Draw a map of your

home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit. Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out. Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them. Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find. Close doors behind you as you leave this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.

Your local firefighters are ready to talk fire safety to you anytime. With a fire doubling in size every 30 seconds, the importance of taking fire prevention seriously is a no-brainer.

Calling 911 is another focus of fire safety. With the prevalence of cell phones and the frequent absence of landlines, children and everyone else need to know where quick access to the phone is in the middle of the night.

As the saying goes, they're the ones running into a burning building as everyone else is running out.

Help them out and keep them and yourself safe by learning fire safety and fire prevention tips, and putting them into practice, this month and every month.

sus of how many bathrooms the dwelling contained, and just how truly “nonconforming” this grandfathered nonconforming property really was.

From town records, it appears that the property was transformed from a single-family dwelling into a multi-unit property over 20 years ago and, as concerned neighbor Daphne Thourogood testified, that a previous owner was, “A kind of a shifty, shady character,” was not quite on the up and up and the then-neighbors closest to the home in question, she queried as, “What is the polite word for people who sit around and drink beer from 8 a.m., in the morning until 8 p.m., at night?” as not caring who was squatting on the property as the

lawn was professionally cared for and looked tidy. Ms. Thourogood further questioned the proposed parking and congestion issues as did Diane Gallagher who resides next door to the property in question.

Thorogood next spoke, also posing the problem of the prior zoning being spurious and stated that the proposed variance, “illegitimizes and compounds the mistake” of the ordinance requiring single family dwellings only in the neighborhood. Corbett assured all those in attendance that the board was convened for that purpose and would do all within the scope of their authority to untangle the decades old undocumented variance.

Calling in with his concerns was neighbor Peter Shattuck who’s property abuts the rear of the home

in question, stating that, “He had to erect a fence to block out the blight of that house,” posed the concern of the water system, city or private well, and the load that a three family concern would put upon the already drought benighted water demand within the neighborhood. As with all others participants, he also pressed the issue of the long-ago prior zoning of the property stating that he worked in the cyber security field and that industry was always having to go back and rectify past errors as they cropped up, equating a brick and mortar dwelling with computer security code not equipped to deal with modern cyberattacks. Corbett disabused him of the notion that rewriting town ordinances was not as easy as correcting outdated code.

The plans for the ven-

erable home include the main house as the owner’s own home and two, studio apartments – both under 800 square feet – with a garage large enough to alleviate any potential untidy parking situations, a constant concern of all speaking at the meeting, while offering to erect a fence to allay issues of headlights disturbing neighbors quiet enjoyment of their at-home evenings.

It all boiled down to some board members and neighbors wishing to correct the entire situation by overwriting a decades-old variance granted, utilized and taxed accordingly as a three-family unit and return said property to the conventional single-family dwelling now required within the neighborhood, and those who foresee issues with changing history to suit the present.

Corbett pointing out that, the history of the house, what it is and what it should not be with Morin adding that she “Had gone on Google Earth and noticed the mailboxes” illustrating the house had been recognized by the town, state and federal government as a multiple dwelling unit due to the amount of mailboxes ascribed to the property.

The facts of the case hinged upon the status of the original variance, the fact that the house was occupied by a squatter for more than a decade, the question concerning the issue of the abandonment of the structure since it was sold at auction in 2018 and

whether or not a three family concern would detract from the neighborhood that already housed a nursing home two doors down from the proposed renovated property.

It came down to a tense vote, with Burgess and Virr voting “Nay” and Evans and Morin voting “Yea” and Corbett was a tie-breaker, siding with Evans and Morin noting that this action should clear up any confusion in the future concerning the status of the property. The next step for the Tanguay family is to obtain all of the required and necessary state and local permits, with Corbett offering, “Good luck” to the couple.

I’ve worked for or ran non-profits all my adult life. I know what it’s like to help people and do it with limited resources.

As a legislator, I’ve worked for various special needs populations. I chair the New Hampshire Commission on Deafness and

Hearing Loss. We came up with a laminated card that motorists with hearing difficulties can hand to law enforcement so as to enhance communication. It has proven so popular it is now going into a second printing.

I filed the bill that would add “deaf or hard of hearing” to the medical conditions that may, at the motorists choice, be indi-

cated on a driver’s license or nondriver’s identification. This is now law.

Additionally I chair the groups that are ensuring adequate services to the deaf and hard of hearing be provided by extended care facilities and school systems. This work is in the beginning stages and we wish to hear from those whose loved ones are not being given what they need.

When wells in the northern part of Main Street, Hampstead, went dry, possibly because of commercial over-pumping, I pulled together a group of state and local hydrologists, area stake holders and regional political leaders to

see what laws could be passed to make it much less likely that other residents would have similar problems. One of the bills I filed was signed into law a year ago. Another one is in the works.

We are in the midst of political wrangling like I’ve never seen and it turns me off. I went to Concord to help people, irrespective of party affiliation or political ideology.

# Halloween Cautions Shared by Chester by Town Officials

CHESTER - The Town of Chester recently posted some concerns about how residents will be celebrating Halloween this year.

In the release the town stated that, in no way does the town wish to prevent residents from celebrating Halloween in any manner they choose on their own property. However, we cannot provide the support of Town resources for those activities that the CDC (Centers for Disease Control) has deemed high risk.

The Chester Street Halloween event that occurs every year on Hal-

loween incorporates at least three of the seven high-risk activities from the CDC list. Consequently, the Town will not be providing the usual support for Halloween on Chester Street - including police and fire details, traffic cones, bathrooms, etc.

While trick-or-treating is not prohibited on Chester Street this year, the town wanted to emphasize the following items to be aware of.

- Participation from residents on Chester Street will be much lower than normal.

- There will be no

traffic control from the Police Department so traffic will be moving at normal speeds in excess of 30 MPH.

- There is virtually no lighting on Chester Street making those not wearing reflective clothing and carrying lights difficult to see.

Based on the last two safety concerns, the town encourages those that still plan to trick-or-treat to do this within their own communities that are not located on busy state roads. Furthermore, they are encouraging residents to look at the list of lower risk activities as

an option during this pandemic Halloween.

Lower risk activities include:

- Carving or decorating pumpkins with members of your household and displaying them.

- Carving or decorating pumpkins outside, at a safe distance, with neighbors or friends.

- Decorating your home.

- Doing a Halloween Scavenger Hunt.

- Having a virtual Halloween costume contest.

- Having a Halloween

movie night with people you live with.

- Having a scavenger hunt-style trick-or-treat search with your household members in or around your home rather than going house to house.

The CDC warns people about higher risk activities:

- Participating in traditional trick-or-treating where treats are handed to children who go door to door.

- Having trunk-or-treat where treats are handed out from trunks

of cars lined up.

- Attending crowded costume parties held indoors.

- Going to an indoor haunted house where people may be crowded together.

- Going on hayrides or tractor rides with people who are not in your household.

- Using alcohol or drugs which can cloud judgement and increase risky behaviors.

- Traveling to a rural fall festival that is not in your community.

since 2016, and before that, probably not since 2000," he said.

The effects of the drought are becoming more tangible. Lake Massabesic's water level has dropped by 3 1/2 feet, said Richards. 30 of the 31 water wells monitored by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Service's water division have lower amounts now than they did in June. The well closest to Hampstead, in East Kingston, had the most dramatic drop of the bunch.

Some residents complained of well yield issues early in the summer, but those complaints dissipated, said Richards. "So far, we've been holding our own locally," he said.

There is some optimism regarding the wells

moving forward, however. With summer behind us, lots of the lawn care and recreational uses of water become less common and not as necessary. "It's a pretty well-known fact that water use goes way up in the summer, and most of it is attributed to outdoor irrigation," said Richards. The town tried to slow the non-essential uses of water during the drought with messages to the public to be conscious of their usage.

Following the drought of 2016, the state of New Hampshire gave towns permission to restrict water usage, but at this point, the recommendation was not made to the Hampstead selectmen to enact such a measure. "We're not recommending that thus far, but we want to put this on your radar screen because right now... other than the very nice rainfall we

got a few days ago... there's not an awful lot of rain in the forecast," said Richards.

The marker to keep an eye on is which designation of drought Hampstead falls under. Town in D3 droughts or worse are recommended to place restrictions on their citizens' water usage.

Chairperson Sean P. Murphy indicated that he will look to state leadership when deciding how to move forward with Hampstead's management of the drought. As of now, a message is listed on the town's website, that reads, "Due to the drought, the Board of Selectmen and the Water Resource Committee are urging residents to clear irrigation systems earlier than usual." From there, a link is available for more information.

The board expects to hear more updates next month.

An Astros scoreless second half and some untimely turnovers left the Pinkerton Academy football squad suffering a 23-14 loss against last year's State Champions, Londonderry High School in the annual Mack Plaque contest at Lancer Park on Friday night, Sept. 26.

The atmosphere of the event was quite different this year, due to precautions being taken during the COVID-19 pandemic, Pinkerton fans were not allowed to attend the game, and limited tickets were sold to families of the home team this year.

quarter. One, was on a Evan Wilson 41-yard run, making it 13-6, and the other was a one-yard run by Wilson followed by a Wilson two point conversion.

The half ended with a Lancer 26-yard field goal by Jake Fawcett, making it a 16-14 LHS lead to finish the half.

Unfortunately for Pinkerton, the only points tallied in the second half were by Londonderry, and those points weren't until the 10-minute mark of the fourth quarter. Hayden Austin punched the ball in from the one-yard line to seal the deal for his team 23-14.

Londonderry had 365 yards of total offense to Pinkerton's 158 yards. LHS also dominated in Time of

Possession, doubling up the Astros with just under 33 minutes to just over 15 minutes by PA.

The number of overall plays was also very lopsided. LHS had 60 plays while PA had just 33.

Captain Evan Wilson was the top rusher for PA with 57 yards.

Junior David Clark was the high reciever for his team with 77 yards.

This was the third consecutive loss to Londonderry by the Astros.

Pinkerton's next game will be at home, against the Nashua South Purple Panthers, on Friday night, Oct. 2. The game will serve to celebrate seniors on the football and Spirit squad teams.

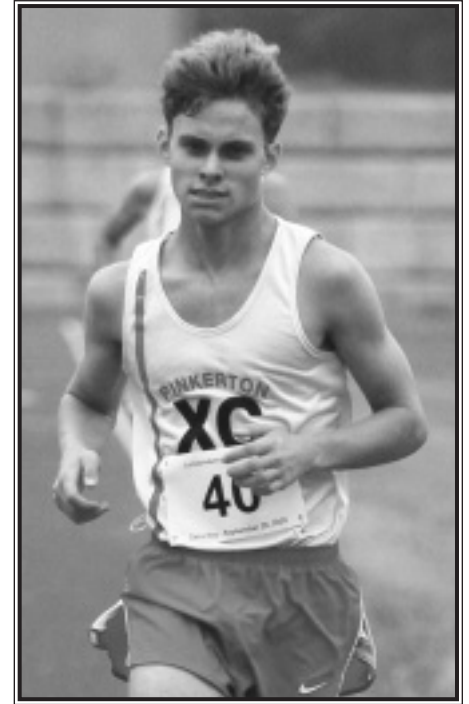
The Pinkerton boys did not fare as well that morning, losing to Londonderry 26-32.
