Chairman Sean Murphy looked to nearby towns to set the precedent for how to handle Halloween, but "nobody's really made a commitment one way or another," said Administrative Assistant Sally Theriault. Tilton is the one exception, she said, as they have decided to go "full steam ahead."

The vote to approve these measures passed unanimously among the three voters. This trial run will last one month. The board will consider the next steps during one of its October meetings.

With further developments to come on both of these topics, October will be a crucial month for the selectmen in determining how to move forward in the face of the novel coronavirus. The board will continue these discussions when it reconvenes for its next meeting.

# Conservation Commission Begins Tying up 2020's I

DERRY - The meeting began with the customary roll call and approval of the minutes from the previous meeting with one query as to the verbiage of a reported action, causing a motion to delay the approval of the minutes until the next meeting. This motion was approved.

Tackling correspondence next, Chair James Degnan reported a share from New Hampshire DES regarding groundwater and spoke of timely reminder after reporting correspondence regarding Shepard Park in Corneliuson Woods where a cleanup had been recently held.

Apparently, there is still noticeable debris at one picnic site, which will

be dealt with. Degnan further noted that although a trail cam is stationed at the boundary, it is pointing away from the park, which led into the standard seasonal warning concerning the public's need to wear appropriately noticeable gear such as blaze orange and to outfit their pets as well during hunting season while enjoying the outdoors, even while walking within their own property. "Just make sure that you can be seen, and that goes for your animals as well," Degnan stated.

"It's time we start putting the bow on 2020" Degnan said as he brought up the topic of the volunteer Land Steward program and the forms that the commission had created outlining the job description, qualifications and duties of inquired whether the job description was a must have or a wish list, Degnan answered "This was what we were hoping for" and also, "These are the things that we can expect."

### Fire Safety All Year

Oct. 4-10 is Fire Prevention Week this years' theme is "Serve Up Safety in the Kitchen", many fire departments are figuring out how to get information out to the public to educate them. If this was a normal year the month of October would be filled with open houses and events to emphasize fire safety.

"Cooking continues to be a major contributor to the home fire problem," said NFPA Vice President of Outreach and Advocacy Lorraine Carli. "The good news is that the vast majority of these fires are highly preventable.

Nearly half of all home fires involve cooking equipment, with unattended cooking being the most common, according to the NFPA.

This year's messages is about never leaving cooking unattended, keeping flammable objects such as towels and food package at least three feet away from stovetops, and not using stoves while sleepy or after consuming alco-

It is so important, to reinforces why everyone needs to have an escape plan. And the importance of having smoke detectors in every bedroom. Fire officials note, that half of home fire deaths result from fires reported between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m., when most people are asleep. They also say that having a working smoke alarm cuts the chances of dying in a reported fire by half.

Other tips: Draw a map of your

home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit. Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out. Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them. Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find. Close doors behind you as you leave this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning build-

Your local firefighters are ready to talk fire safety to you anytime. With a fire doubling in size every 30 seconds, the importance of taking fire prevention seriously is a no-brainer.

Calling 911 is another focus of fire safety. With the prevalence of cell phones and the frequent absence of landlines, children and everyone else need to know where quick access to the phone is in the middle of the night.

As the saying goes, they're the ones running into a burning building as everyone else is running out.

Help them out and keep them and yourself safe by learning fire safety and fire prevention tips, and putting them into practice, this month and every

Thorogood next spoke, also posing the problem of the prior zoning being spurious and stated that the proposed variance, "illegitimatizes and compounds the mistake" of the ordinance requiring single family dwellings only in the neighborhood. Corbett assured all those in attendance that the board was convened for that purpose and would do all within the scope of their authority to untangle the decades old undocumented variance.

Calling in with his concerns was neighbor Peter not caring who was squat- Shattuck who's property

in question, stating that, "He had to erect a fence to block out the blight of that house," posed the concern of the water system, city or private well, and the load that a three family concern would put upon the already drought benighted water demand within the neighborhood. As with all others participants, he pressed the issue of the long-ago prior zoning of the property stating that he worked in the cyber security field and that industry was always having to go back and rectify past errors as they cropped up, equating a brick and mortar dwelling with computer security code not equipped to deal with modern cyberattacks. Corbett disabused him of the notion that rewriting town ordinances was not as easy as correcting outdated code.

The plans for the ven-

erable home include the main house as the owner's own home and two, studio apartments - both under 800 square feet – with a garage large enough to alleviate any potential untidy parking situations, a constant concern of all speaking at the meeting, while offering to erect a fence to allay issues of headlights disturbing neighbors quiet enjoyment of their at-home evenings.

It all boiled down to some board members and neighbors wishing to correct the entire situation by overwriting a decades-old variance granted, utilized and taxed accordingly as a three-family unit and return said property to the conventional single-family dwelling now required within the neighborhood, and those who foresee issues with changing history to suit the present.

Corbett pointing out that, the history of the house, what it is and what it should not be with Morin adding that she "Had gone on Google Earth and noticed the mailboxes" illustrating the house had been recognized by the town, state and federal government as a multiple dwelling unit due to the amount of mailboxes ascribed to the property.

The facts of the case hinged upon the status of the original variance, the fact that the house was occupied by a squatter for more than a decade, the question concerning the issue of the abandonment of the structure since it was sold at auction in 2018 and whether or not a three family concern would detract from the neighborhood that already housed a nursing home two doors down from the proposed renovated property.

It came down to a tense vote, with Burgess and Virr voting "Nay" and Evans and Morin voting "Yea" and Corbett was a tiebreaker, siding with Evans and Morin noting that this action should clear up any confusion in the future concerning the status of the property. The next step for the Tanguay family is to obtain all of the required and necessary state and local permits, with Corbett offering, "Good luck" to the couple.

since 2016, and before that, probably not since 2000," he said.

The effects of the drought are becoming more tangible. Lake Massabesic's water level has dropped by 3 1/2 feet, said Richards. 30 of the 31 water wells monitored by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Service's water division have lower amounts now than they did in June. The well closest to Hampstead, in East Kingston, had the most dramatic drop of the bunch.

Some residents complained of well yield issues early in the summer, but those complaints dissipated, said Richards. "So far, we've been holding our own locally," he said.

There is some optimism regarding the wells

moving forward, however. With summer behind us, lots of the lawncare and recreational uses of water become less common and not as necessary. "It's a pretty well-known fact that water use goes way up in the summer, and most of it is attributed to outdoor irrigation," said Richards. The town tried to slow the non-essential uses of water during the drought with messages to the public to be conscious of their usage.

Following the drought of 2016, the state of New Hampshire gave towns permission to restrict water usage, but at this point, the recommendation was not made to the Hampstead selectmen to enact such a measure. "We're not recommending that thus far, but we want to put this on your radar screen because right now... other than the very nice rainfall we

got a few days ago... there's not an awful lot of rain in the forecast," said Richards.

The marker to keep an eye on is which designation of drought Hampstead falls under. Town in D3 droughts or worse are recommended to place restrictions on their citizens' water usage.

Chairperson Sean P. Murphy indicated that he will look to state leadership when deciding how to move forward with Hampstead's management of the drought. As of now, a message is listed on the town's website. that reads, "Due to the drought, the Board of Selectmen and the Water Resource Committee are urging residents to clear irrigation systems earlier than usual." From there, a link is available for more information.

The board expects to hear more updates next month.



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
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
