HAMPSTEAD - According to a report released by the Hampstead Police Department, on the evening of Sunday, Oct. 11, Hampstead Police responded to Central Street for a report of gunshots possibly coming from a vehicle. Upon initial investigation, it was determined that there were actually two different sets of gunshots, within a few minutes of each other. While on scene a duty unit recovered a spent bullet casing in the roadway.

Sandown Planning Board Talks Future Plans, Fails to Cement Decisions

SANDOWN - The Sandown Planning Board treated its Tuesday, October 20, meeting as another opportunity to discuss the town's future, specifically to brainstorm ideas for the next master plan and strategies to encourage citizen participation. The conversation was very similar to the one dominated their meeting on September 1, where they discussed the need for a new master plan.

The town master plan



Using Legal Language as a Weapon

When you go see an attorney you want answers. Whatever confronts you, only straight answers will help.

Unfortunately, some in the legal system tend to use language as a shield against real communication.

One barrier is Latin. While fewer and fewer Latin terms are actually used today, some Latin finds itself deeply rooted in the law even now.

Here are some top Latin terms persisting in the language:

Ab Initio: Means "from the beginning". If a court says a contract is void "ab initio" they reject the entire agreement. Don't even argue about certain provisions or the way the parties acted as if they had an agreement. Rewind the legal history and start over.

a higher court will review a lower court ruling. Commonly used in the term 'Writ of Certiorari'. This is a request filed with the U.S. Supreme Court asking the highest court in the U.S. to overturn a lower court ruling. Of course the U.S. Supreme Court can either accept the appeal or not.

Codicil: A codicil to a will amends the original will. You can't just write notes on the will or on a separate piece of paper. To effectively change anything in a will, the amendment must comply with the same formalities as the original will. That means witnesses and a notary. The document amending the will is called a codicil.

Ex Parte: People seeking help from a court without telling the other side ask for "Ex Parte" relief. This means without the other exclusively, in divorce cases. People sometimes seek injunctions or other court help without having to notify the other party.

Habeus Corpus: This asks a court to release inmates either for total freedom or for some specific purpose like a family funeral, a civil deposition or another one-time event. Habeus Corpus means that the authorities literally have the body and it should be released temporarily or permanently based on the facts claimed

Nunc Pro Tunc: Means court acknowledges that a previous action was incorrect a new order replaces it as though the original had not existed.

Certiorari: Indicates that party. Often used, but not then I will directly give you something that you want.

Writ: Means either a formal written order from a court or the document you file looking for a specific order. Had this bill passed, Derry would have been able to build a solar array that would generate enough electricity for all municipal and school buildings combined. This project would save the town millions of dollars over the life

of the project.

Several Reps that I have spoken with were concerned that it would raise electric prices. That is partial true. Every electric customer in the state is already paying .043 cents per kilowatt hour for Net Metering and most do not see a return on their money. Our State Legisla-

ture can change that by passing a Net Metering bill.

I urge the candidates that are running for the NH House to please support a Net Metering bill, keeping in mind that they also represent Derry's interest.
