Hampstead Board of Selectmen OKs Age Friendly Community Initiative

HAMPSTEAD - At the Nov. 8 Hampstead Board of Selectmen, the Selectmen heard from Scott Bogel, the Senior Transportation Planner for the Rockingham Planning Commission.

Bogel explained that the region is in the process of starting an Age Friendly Community initiative with six communities in the region and they wanted to see if Hampstead was interested in joining. The initiative is being run by the Commission along with the Rockingham Nutrition Meals on Wheels

and Tufts Health is providing a two year grant for the funding.

He explained that the goal is to work with different communities to understand the needs of older adults in the communities now and the ones they anticipate in the next 15 years.

Bogel explained that this is important because over the next 15 years the population for those 65 years old and older is expected to double in Rockingham County.

He said that the population in the County 65 and older is expected to go from 12.5% to about 28% in that time period.

Bogel said that the

trend is also the same for the State as a whole saying that in 2015 about 220,000 people were 65 and older in NH. He said that estimates show that by 2040 that number will grow to about 480,000.

"This is going to mean really a different set of needs for our populations our communities," Bogel said.

Bogel explained that the idea is that there would be a steering community in Town made up of residents and town staff and the staff from the initiative would be able to help facilitate conversations.

CHESTER - During the Nov. 4 Chester Board of Selectmen meeting the Selectmen heard from Police Chief Aaron Berube in regards to the department's proposed budget.

One of the major items that has been discussed over the past few meetings was in regards to making the detective position full-

It was explained by Berube that Detective Ken-

nedy Richard issued his intent to resign from the position.

While he originally was going to resign Nov. 1, Berube said that he agreed to stay on until Dec. 1.

Although the position is currently less than fulltime Berube said that he wants the Board of Selectmen to consider making it a full-time position. He said that Richard recommended it because of the amount of cases making it overwhelming in a parttime role.

In my letter to the editor on November 11, I said that the nearly \$8,000,000 one time revenue-sharing bonus to Derry and our schools by the last Democratic legislature resulted in a significant property tax cut. I am tired of seeing large corporations benefit from tax cuts while the state says it can't afford to meet its revenue sharing obligations with towns and cities.

Regarding Redistricting

To the editor,

Redistricting of voting districts every ten years is a good thing. It allows for adjustments to the number of voters in each district to match any changes in our population. Redistricting, done fairly and in a nonpartisan way, protects the right of all citizens to have their vote counted equally.

Redistricting done in a partisan way to guarantee that one party has a strong advantage over another political party is wrong. It is gerrymandering, and it steals the votes of some citizens and guarantees the votes of others, all according to where those citizens live.

Last Jan. the people of NH heard Republican Party Chairman, Stepanek, say that because Republican legislators will have control over redistricting maps this year, "I can stand here today and guarantee you that we will send a conservative Republican to Washington, D.C. as a Congress person in 2022"; a clear statement of intent to gerrymander from a powerful Republican leader in NH. While Chairman Stepanek can't make that guarantee on his own, he certainly has a strong influence over our current Republican-led NH House Redistricting Committee. Last week NH citizens watched as that committee proposed a very clearly gerrymandered US Congressional district map which shows favoritism to the Republican Party, just as the Chair of the NH Republican party promised earlier this year.

While changes to our voting maps must be made, fairness and non-partisanship dictates that any changes should be kept at a minimum and should benefit the voters, not any

political party. Why then does the Republican proposed Congressional map make changes in 54 towns, (moving over 300,000 voters out of their current district) when it can easily be done by moving only one town, Hampstead? Why is the proposed Republican map in Congressional District 2 "packed" with Democrats in a manner similar to the 2010 NH Executive Council District? Why Portsmouth, of all towns, moved out of the Seacoast District? And if anyone doubts that these changes were not made for political reasons, we have a Republican House legislator and member of the Redistricting Committee, Robert Lynn to set us straight, as he openly acknowledged that the intent behind the new maps was to consolidate partisan power.

The proposed Republican Congressional map is as unfair to Republican voters in District 2 as it is to Democratic voters in District 1, and all this so that the Republican Party will have an unfair advantage in winning elections for the next ten years.

Redistricting should not be gerrymandered in NH.




