HAMPSTEAD - The Hampstead Board of Selectmen held its bi-monthly meeting on Monday, April 26.

During the meeting a main agenda item that was discussed was in regards to the application fees for the zoning board of adjustment applications.

It was explained by Board of Selectmen Chairperson Sean Murphy that they originally voted to increase the fees during a previous meeting however they then realized that they needed to have a public said. One of the main ex-

need to reapply for the permit. He also explained that they don't usually have a situation where permits go dormant because most of the time the work is completed, the minutes stated.

About a year later a resolution in the issue was reached and the dwelling came down on April 26.

Aside from the property being demolished the Town has also taken steps to prevent situations like this from happening in the future by introducing a Warrant Article this year.

The Warrant Article stated, "to see if the Town will vote to adopt Article 1-2:3 Building Permits Required, Under General Provisions, "C" For any Building Permit issued which includes elements of roofing siding, windows and doors; these exterior elements must be completed within 12 months of issuance of said Building Permit."

During the Town Elections this year the voters approved the Warrant Article.

One of those who was concerned about the property was Teri Blouin who lives in the neighborhood. Blouin said that the Warrant Article will hopefully prevent issues like this from happening in the future.

"Article 3, passed with overwhelming support which tells the town representatives that the residents supported it and it was a good town regulation presented by the Building Inspectors to help maintain future compliance to best practice construction timelines."

She said that the neighbors, people in the community and herself are happy that the Town followed through with making sure the dwelling came down.

"The neighbors were very pleased that the town Selectman and Building Inspectors addressed this public safety situation. They are appointed to ensure public safety and that was the outcome in this situation," she said.

Mark Grabowski Resigns From Derry Planning Board

DERRY - During the April 21 Derry Planning Board meeting the Board discussed a possible change to their policies and procedures.

The meeting was the Board's second reading of the changes. One of the changes that was discussed revolved around requiring board members to attend a training session each year.

Currently the wording states, "each member may complete at least one training session per year related to land use planning per year."

The proposed change would change it from may to shall, making it a requirement now for the Board members to attend at least one training per count," he said.

ber Mark Connors voiced his concern with the requirement saying that it could cause them to have a more difficult time finding members to serve on the Board and staying on

"My only comment was we tend to have a hard time getting people to come on boards and stay on boards. Are we hamstringing ourselves by having another hurdle to jump," he asked.

He asked if only in person training would count towards the requirement.

Planning Board Chair John O'Connor said that they would allow online format training sessions to count towards the requirement.

"We're volunteers requiring someone to invest that additional amount of time, I just don't know if that's the right approach," he said.

Planning Board member Jim MacEachern said that he has no problem with requiring that Board members attend training.

"people should be properly trained on this board. There are some very significant responsibilities and quite frankly should be required to do some training," he said.
