DERRY - During the Derry Town Council bimontly meeting on May 18 one of the items that was discussed was in regards to pride month which is celebrated across the country in June.

Derry Town Council Chairman James Morgan said that he wanted members of the Council to support a proclamation for the month, saying that they are the fourth largest community in New Hampshire and that the other three communities, largest Nashua, Concord, and Manchester all celebrate it.

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Selectmen Approve Animal Control Officer, Rescind Mask Mandate

SANDOWN The Sandown Board of Selectmen have authorized Police Chief Joseph Gordon to combine two parttime positions to create a full-time animal control officer

The chief made the request at the board's May 10 meeting due to the need to fulfill those duties and the difficulty of part-time hiring. The animal control job has been vacant for the last several years.

The board reclassified Hannah Fisher as a fulltime animal control officer who also will be a patrol

officer. This moves animal control into a joint position with the police department discontinues the town's existing animal control project.

Part-time officers receive 320 hours of training to do the same job of full-time officers who have 640 hours of training, Gordon pointed out. Scheduling a limited number of hours is hard in trying to have professional individuals with certification work those hours when they have other responsibilities and may be employed else-

"Part-time officers have a full-time life," he said.

In 2016 the Sandown

department took two parttime patrol positions and combined them. That was how Cole Dresser was initially hired as an officer, Gordon recalled.

The animal control officer position Fisher is assuming will be as a patrol officer with duties to conduct animal control investigations, including destruction of animals, handle license violations, and have authority over specialty dog registrations.

This will be similar to detectives assigned to investigations. Sandown has an estimated 1,600 dogs.

Fisher will attend the police academy. Her hire date is expected to be masks in the Town Hall. around Aug. 27 prior to the start of the Academy Aug. 30 – Dec. 17.

The estimated budget cost for this new position is approximately \$500. Money now in insurance could go to most of the payroll for it in 2021, the chief said.

Separately, the board also approved a motion to rescind all COVID-related restrictions for town properties relating to prior mandates. Selectmen Tom Tombarello, who reluctantly believes masks should be worn, abstained on the vote.

The major impact is to remove the regulation on Practices that will remain are keeping Plexiglas barriers in place in the interest of personal hygiene and maintaining the one-way traffic flow of persons in the building.

Selectmen debated whether to change existing signs saying masks were required to now state they were merely recommended. But they decided against that move on the basis it left the inference they were still required.

Sandown is now operating under best practices in place of the previous safer at home guidance. Gov. Chris Sununu already allowed the state's mask

mandate to lapse.

Although Selectman Jonathan Goldman said he wanted to avoid having a disjointed response on masks, the subject may have to be revisited in some instances.

Those may involve summer camps campers having to wear masks as well as others present on site.

Zoning Board Approves Ordinance Special Exception

HAMPSTEAD - The Hampstead Zoning Board of Adjustments came together for their May 5 meeting to consider a request brought forth by Hampstead Resident Gerard Campbell.

The proposal was for a special exception to the zoning ordinance to alter his house as well as a variance.

The house located on 20 Shore Drive in a recreational zone currently resides as a non-conforming lot.

Representing the applicant, Tim Lavelle gave the board more insight as to what the project would consist of.

"The variance would not be contrary to the public interest," Lavelle said. "In this case value of surrounding properties will be improved with a vastly structure, therefore it would not diminish surrounding property values."

Lavelle also said that the existing building is on a lot that was created before the meaning the situation will be improved in relation to the intent of the ordinance.

"Denial of the variance would result in unnecessary hardship to the owner," Lavelle said. "It would keep the property which is non-conforming now more non-conforming than in the proposal."

Since the existing situation is already not in compliance with guidelines, the layout of this project would follow the guidelines better.

"Substantial justice would be served if this was

Lavelle said. "It would allow for an upgrade."

Although the house would be set closer to the street, it would be set back a few feet from the lake.

"We're getting further from the lake but closer to the street, so I guess the question is which is more important to preserve," One Board Member said. "For me it's the lake so in essence I think it's a reasonable and responsible proposal."

In addition to where the structure would be located on the property, it would also differ in size. On the the same, but it would cut in five feet on the left side. This would allow a few extra feet of lake view for neighboring houses.

Campbell's next door neighbor Scott Spicer came up during the meeting's public forum to voice his support for the project.

"I have no issues honestly I like the idea that it [the house] is coming back a little bit further from the lake so there will be more of a view," Spicer said. "I'm definitely not worried about any devalue of my house, if anything it's

After reviewing the plan and determining that the new structure will not diminish property values of any neighboring properties, the board approved of both the variance and the special exception for Campbell's proposal.

Campbell and Lavelle now have permission from the Chester Zoning Board of Adjustments to move forward with their project.

The next Hampstead Board of Adjustments meeting will take place on June 2 and those who wish to attend can do so virtually though the town website.

The Board voted in favor of having the first in person meeting at Chester Town Hall be on June 10.

It Is Time to think About Lyme Disease

Are you like me? You enjoy outdoor quality of life, to have a relationship with the outdoors this has all changed since having Lyme disease.

I still love the outdoors, but I check for ticks every time I go outside.

Ticks can be found almost every month of the year, one should be especially aware of the risk of tick bites from early spring until late fall.

If you find a tick attached remove it as soon as possible. You should put the tick into a sandwich bag with a small piece of damp paper towel and mark the date and the person who was bitten on the bag. Then, the tick can be identified by someone knowledgeable in tick appearance or be sent to a lab to see if it was a carrier of Lyme disease or other infections such as Bartonella, Ehrlichia, Babesia or Anaplasma.

Most people feel that you need to have a bull's eye rash (erythema migrans rash) to develop to be diagnosis with Lyme disease Not True, but rather have an even red appearance across the entire area.

Typically when a person first contracts Lyme disease, he or she will develop flu-like symptoms about 7 to 21 days after the tick bite. However, this is not necessarily the case. Sometimes the onset is quite insidious and may take years to show.

Lyme disease can spread to most organ systems, including the heart and the central nervous system. More than

a decade ago, Syphilis was nick named "the great masquerader" since it could develop symptoms that mimicked most any other disease. Today, Lyme disease is the great masquerader, since it may appear to be like other illnesses, like cardiac arrhythmias causing sudden death, neurologic symptoms that often appear like Multiple Sclerosis or Parkinson's disease.

There is often a buzzing or tingling sensation of the skin, burning neurologic pain, and a great amount of joint pain, muscle pain and incredible muscle stiffness. A lot of "brain fog" resulting in poor memory, difficulty with language skills and even out right dementia, chronic sinus infections, migraines, Lyme rage as well. I do not have the space to go on as what it can look like.

As with most diseases the best "treatment" is prevention. Permethrin, a common synthetic insecticide, can be applied to clothing to make them tick resistant. DEET, Lemon Eucalyptus Oil to name a few, can be used as insect repellent for the skin. Wearing light clothing makes it easier for you to spot ticks. Clothes should be put in a dryer for 10 minutes on high heat after coming in from outside to kill ticks. Tucking pants into socks can prevent the ticks from climbing up the leg.

Enjoy the outdoors and protect yourself from Lyme disease by taking preventative measures from tick bites and seek treatment if necessary.

School Board Discusses District's Educational and Facilities Assessment

DERRY - Following last meeting's discussion on the request for a proposal, the Derry Cooperative School Board meeting met on April 19 to further review their plan.

The request for a proposal is in regards to assessing facilities on things such as plumbing and HVAC as well as the maintenance of the school. In total, the process is estimated to take less than six months

Director of Facilities Jeremy Lamothe had drafted a document based off of similar districts in the area that the board had looked

the District's Attorney, the proposal was returned to the board with suggested changes to their planned proposal.

Ms. Simard said that all seven schools under the Derry Cooperative School Board would be included. The proposal would also include as the Superintendent's building and the Facilities building.

At the Board's last meeting, facilities were the only component included in the assessment. The board now aims to expand what they review as a District.

The plan looks at three different assessments including the state of the district's facilities, an eduspace plan.

The board reached an agreement that the due date for the facilities assessment will be Oct. 1 while the space and educational component will be due in January of 2022.

Member Brenda Willis had some concern regarding who would monitor the education component. She noted that a facilities person would not know what this portion of the assessment would consist of.

Dr. Connors-Krikorian said Willis's question was "two-tiered" and that educational adequacy can be looked at in two ways. According to Connors-Krikorian, they can be

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Derry Planning Board Approves Changes For Signage

DERRY - During the May 19 Derry Planning Board Meeting one of the main agenda items was in regards to changes to rules in town for signs.

It was explained by Derry Planning Director George Sioras that this was the fifth workshop that they had in regards to signs.

One of the changes was in regards to sign banners. The proposed amendment would add a definition for it.

"A temporary sign of lightweight material (paper, plastic or fabric) hung either with or without frames, including inflatable "tube men" or other inflatable type signs. Flags and insignias containing

ernment, corporation or business are not considered to be banners," the amendment stated.

Another proposed change that was in regards to signs on premises.

"A sign that advertises products, services, or activities that are produced, available, conducted or performed on the property where the sign is located," the proposed amendment stated.

The Board also discussed a new section of the rules in regards to signs for the West Running Brook District.

'The purpose of this subsection is to promote the health, safety and general welfare in accordance with the future and continuing development of the West Running Brook Dis-

only markings of any gov- trict and to protect important views, create a quality village-style image, and to prevent visual clutter in the district," the proposed rules section stated.

> "The sign regulations for the West Running Brook District concerning size, placement, and certain aspects of design, have been developed to integrate signs with the visual environment and to improve the effectiveness of individual signs through emphasis on appropriate design. It is the intent to encourage signs which will be compatible with the buildings and their surroundings, be informative, legible and provide examples of quality graphics, appropriate to the spirit of the District."

The rules for the signs in the District include:

• Any sign located of sight. within a public right-ofway is subject to town approval.

- In the West Running Brook District, there shall be a fifteen (15) foot setback requirement for permanent signage.
- No sign shall be placed upon a marquee.
- Signs shall not be permitted to be painted upon or affixed to any object within a public right-ofway, community facility or public recreation area, except signs essential for the public safety and wel-
- No roof signs shall be permitted.
- Directional Signs for events, or Sandwich Board signs for events, are not subject to the fifteen (15) foot setback, provided the sign does not impede line

- All projecting signs shall be located in such a manner so as not to block line of sight from motor vehicle or from pedestrian foot traffic and no portion of the sign shall be located less than eight (8) feet from the grade.
- · Banner signs are prohibited.
- No neon, argon or krypton shall be permitted.
- In no case shall an internally illuminated sign or a sign that utilizes internally illuminated lettering be erected or affixed to a building without first obtaining Planning Board review of the proposed sign.
- Low profile monument signs will be permitted at the main entrance to the property. The style of the sign must compliment

the architectural design of the buildings and surroundings.

- Signs shall be proportionate to the size of the building.
- All signs in the West Running Brook district are subject to Planning Board administrative review and approval prior to the issuance of a sign permit.
- Temporary signs are allowed in the District provided they meet applicable setback requirements. Temporary signs are not subject to Administrative review by the Planning Board

The Board voted in favor of recommending that the town approve all of the proposed amendments.

The next Derry Planning Board meeting is slated for June 2 at 7 p.m.



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
