



# **HAWC Officials Urge Need** for Temporary Rate Increase

Hampstead Area Water Company justified its temrate porary request during a May 28 hearing before the NH Public Utilities Commission.

The temporary water rates contained in a settlement agreement before the commission for approval will result in a reasonable return on the company's costs, witnesses testified. HAWC has filed for temporary and permanent rate increases for proposed tariff changes based on 2019 as a test year showing rev- \$301,059 the company inienue deficiencies.

Commission HAMPSTEAD - The determined that, based on 2019 books and records on file, the company's overall increase rate of return was 1.46 percent, below the last authorized rate of return of 6.35 percent, said Anthony Leone, PUC gas and water utility analyst.

> For that reason, HAWC was entitled to a temporary rate increase of 12.31 percent for \$248,960 in 2019 water revenues, he stated.

> That temporary revenue rate increase, however, recommended in the settlement agreement is \$52,099 lower than the

tially asked for in its rate filing.

Staff calculated the impact on the average residential customer from the temporary rate increase would be approximately \$4.24 per month, Leone added.

As of the end of 2020, the company had approximately 3994 customers, said John Sullivan, HAWC controller. But Commissioner Kathryn Bailey pointed out the settlement agreement cited 3620 customers. She asked Charlie Lanza, HAWC general manager, what happens to

# **Drainage Concerns Raised at Subdivision Hearing at ZBA**

DERRY - The Derry Zoning Board of Adjustments (ZBA) met at the Derry Municipal Center on Thurs. May 20.

The first order of business was the hearing for a variance application in the town ordinance. Said application would allow for a property owned by Golden Acres Land Trust, Red Tundra, LLC to be split into two lots. One of the proposed lots, however, would have less than the required area, frontage, and lot width.

Melissa Giuffrida presented the application to the ZBA. "This is a lot of record containing 5.8 acres of land with approx-

frontage," said Giuffrida. that shares a line with the "Lots adjacent to this land proposed lot) came forhave similar or less frontage and land area than what we are proposing."

The lot would be split up to allow for a new residential home to be built, but it would also be the largest home in the neighborhood. Approving the variance would allow for the home to be built without having to meet the required frontage and area. Giuffrida claimed in her testimony that the lot would meet all other requirements for the town zoning ordinance.

# Hampstead Planning Board Discusses Subdivision Plans

Hampstead Planning Board held a preliminary discussion during their May 3 meeting in reference to a condo conversion project at Winchester Heights.

The subdivision application is set to see a public hearing early next month and will discuss the request to transform a single ownership into a condo conversion.

Board Secretary Debbie Soucy said that the developer "violated" this approved site plan by advertising condos for sale despite the fact that there were no certificates of occupancy granted Manning included in the approved plan.

explained to Manning that from a legal perspective by information the site plan would require withholding building permits and certificate of occupancy," Soucy said.

> According to Soucy, the town attorney also said that as long as the Chief Building Official and the Planning Board were in agreeance, then it would be within the board's power to allow building permits to be issued if that decision was reached.

While the site plan and permits would remain the same whether the project was turned into condos or apartments, the board said that there should be no issuing of occupancy certificates until the subdivision was finalized.

rates if the settlement was based on a lower than actual customer number.

Stephen St. Cyr, outside consultant on accounting, tax management, and regulatory matters, responded that rates are designed to collect the overall revenue required. Once the base charge on a per-customer basis is collected from the number of customers, the difference is collected through the consumption charge.

Bailey asked whether the customer account had anything to do with how rates are established and if the rate was higher than it should be to collect the amount of money the company was seeking. "It looks like you've increased the base charge by 12.31 percent," she said. "Did you increase the consumption charge by 12.31 percent as well?"

applied to the base charge and to various customers within each class, St. Cyr said, the company gets revenue collected from the base charge. The difference between that amount

collected from the consumption charge.

"In order to get to that specific rate, the company looks at the amount of consumption charge period and divides the revenue remaining to be collected from consumption over the consumption itself to get to that rate," he stated.

The consumption Once that percentage is charge rate is 6.74 percent under the settlement agreement which is an increase from the current 6.11 percent, St. Cyr said.

then was \$19,674, while the 2019 test year net loss was \$51,967. Last year the company received a Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan of approximately \$90,000 for which it is currently seeking forgiveness.

He said normally loan forgiveness would be added as income but this would be viewed from the company's perspective as a one-time occurrence and wouldn't figure in establishing rates going forward.


In an effort to reduce operating expenses, Lanza said the company dispensed with installation of new generators last year and has suspended meter replacement for now.

The water rate is going from \$6.11 to \$6.83 per hundred cubic feet (ccf) for customers using up to 400 cubic feet a month. For those using more, the rate would go from \$6.11 to \$10.24.

This proposal by the company will be a matter for the permanent rate proceedings but is not being taken into account for the proposed temporary increases, St. Cyr noted.

A cost of service study was done as part of the permanent rate case with the objective to transfer higher costs to those using substantially more water. "In doing that work with the consultant we came up with a tiered rate system...to try to limit the rate shock for the people that use a small amount of water," Lanza explained.

The company proposal will be evaluated along with other ones in the permanent rate deliberations, said Crista Shute, staff attorney for the Office of the Consumer Advocate representing residential customers. The need exists in this rate case for relief prior to implementing current rates, she added, and her office supports a revenue increase of 12.31 percent through temporary

The project proposes to test different methods and examine factors influencing population abundance of these species given the amount of forest cover.

Butler said 75 random points have been generated in Southeast NH for the placement of cameras in conservation areas to have continual access for observation of activity. The criteria used to select sites involved searching for different urbanization levels and suburban and rural characteristics.

In seeking town owned or land trust owned parcels, the university asked to use three sites in Derry - Broadview Farm, Gulf Road, and Weber Town Forest. As to privacy issues for trail users at those locations, Butler told commissioners the cameras won't be placed on trails but off in the woods for more random observations.

The equipment will have stickers identifying the UNH research purpose. Those participating in the project would go to the cameras every couple of months to check on employing scent-based lures at each placement, and one of the proposed sites being the heavily used Broadview Farms, some commissioners were concerned dogs could be attracted to where a camera is placed. 

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# Hampstead Water Committee Grapples With Survey Results Interpretation

HAMPSTEAD - The Hampstead Water Resource Committee now has the task of interpreting and presenting data from the town's recently concluded water protection and conservation survey.

As of the close of the survey on May 25, 531 mostly online responses had been received, committee member Sheila Nolan reported during a HWRC workshop then with the Rockingham County Planning Commission, its partner on the

That number is a fraction of the town's population. "We've got a sliver of respondents which is what HWRC

Stephanie Spyvee said.

The results noted how many people answered each question. The findings once compiled will be distributed to the public. They are expected to include charts and graphs, an excel spreadsheet of data, and a summary report on all responses.

One clear indication is that those who did respond were already engaged in civic issues. Of the respondents, 93 percent vote in town elections, Spyvee

But the question will be how to interpret the data in terms of the entire town when in Hampstead only 33 percent of eligible voters actually vote, she added.

What the results show we knew we were going to and how to respond may Chair require careful considera-

support for water restrictions, for example, would be among survey respondents, not necessarily reflecting the town as a whole.

Committee members recognize certain assumptions about community sentiment can't be made simply from survey findings.

"You got a very small sample of people and probably a very engaged sample so you got answers that are probably rosier than you would get if you just talked to someone on the street," said Julie LaBranche, senior planner with the RPC, who worked with the HWRC on designing the survey.



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



Rioux, Jake Cooper and Max Lukeman combined efforts on the mound for the win, giving up six hits and four walks.



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
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### OBITUARY Edward L. Ciancio
