

Chester Board of Selectmen Discuss Budget Expectations

CHESTER – The Chester Board of Selectmen held its regularly scheduled weekly meeting on Sept. 16.

During the meeting one of the main agenda items that was discussed was in regards to their budget expectations for next year.

It was explained by Selectmen Stephen D’Angelo that he thought it was important for the Board of Selectmen to get as much information from different department heads in advance of their official budget season so they know what to expect.

He said specifically the departments they should get information from is the Road Agent, the Fire Department, the Police Department and from the Maintenance Department. He said that those departments are the major drivers when it comes to the budget.

“Those are the main drivers in town,” he said.

D’Angelo explained that salaries and benefits are usually the two major increases for different departments. He said that it will be important for them to know what to expect in those areas, and is hopeful the department heads will know sooner rather than later how much higher those things are going to be next year compared to this year.

Aside from personnel he said that it will also be important for them to find out from the police and fire department if they are looking for anything specific for equipment and what that will likely cost them.

“Those are things I would like to get a better grip on,” he said.

Board of Selectmen Chairman Chuck Myette said that he thinks it’s important for departments to think about what they need and want and how they are going to fund

Hampstead School Board Looks ESSER Fund Uses

HAMPSTEAD - The Hampstead School Board held its regularly scheduled monthly meeting on Sept.14.

During the meeting the Board got an update from Nicole Tomaselli, the Director of the 21st Century Learning, Assessment, and Technology regarding the School District’s Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief II funds.

It was explained by Tomaselli that their grant application has been submitted to the Department of Education for their approval.

She said that they plan on using part of the funds for a summer learning academy. Another thing that they plan on using the funds for is for the cost of one licensed nursing assistant and two custodians.

“If we need to make adjustments to that we can,” she said.

Tomaselli said that they also would be using some of the funds for tech upgrades to their Boardroom.

She said that the Department of Education is extremely busy right now approving applications so she doesn’t have a timeline for when they will have their application approved.

It was also explained by Tomaselli that they were going to use the funds for assessment tools but instead they will be able to use leftover Title 4 money. She said that they were able to recoup some of the Title 4 money from 2018-2019 to help with those purchases.

With the other leftover Title 4 funds they are also going to be buying Ipad for their kindergarteners.

“I just want to say thank you for being able to go back and look at what we had from the last few years and use that so the ESSER funding can be used for other activities, I really appreciate the due diligence,” said Hampstead School Board Chairman David Smith.

In other news Hampstead School District Superintendent Robert

Sandown Old Home Day Fall Festival Set for Friday

SANDOWN - After the 2019 Sandown Old Home Day Fall Festival was canceled after voters decided not to fund the event and the 2020 celebration was canceled due to COVID-19, volunteers began last June to get to work to start planning for the 2021 Old Home Day celebration which will take place from Friday, Sept. 24 through Sunday, Sept. 26.

On Friday night there will be events taking place for those 21 years and older and will at Sandlot Sports at 56 North Road in Sandown.

It will include things like a Beer and Wine Tent, sponsored by the Sandown Historical Society, food vendors and the Blacklite Band.

On Saturday, Sept. 25, the day-long event will start with a Kid’s Bike Parade at 9 a.m. Then from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. there will be a variety of different activities including a steam

Hampstead Food Festival Benefits Family After Derry Tragedy

HAMPSTEAD - Local event coordinator, Joe Passanise, and Knights of Columbus member, Arthur Brousseau, are working together to host a food festival/blues concert next month.

The festival is in dedication to Brousseau's sister-in-law, Lynn Marie Viana, who died tragically last April.

Lynn was visiting her ex-husband in Derry for a custody exchange of their adult child, but she was

fatally shot twice, and not only that, the house was burned down as well.

Now her three children, Alex, Thomas, and Jenna, are placed in the burden of financial difficulty. Alex is trying to pay for his college tuition at UMass Lowell, Thomas's special needs equipment were left in the fire, and Jenna returned to her hometown to work as a caregiver for her younger brother, Thomas.

Brousseau was able to raise over \$48,000 in the past five months, but it is not enough to cover his niece's and nephews'

expenses. Which is why they are planning on reaching their \$75,000 goal this Columbus weekend.

The festival will be taking place on Saturday, Oct. 9, from 6 to 9 p.m., in Hampstead on 26 Emerson Avenue.

Musician, Chase Campbell, will be performing classic rock with his band. Plenty of food vendors and food trucks will be there, serving hamburgers, hot dogs, sausages, ice cream, brick oven pizza, Texas barbeque, fried chicken and chicken strips, baked goods, and a hot beverage

station. All the food vendors are paying premiums for their space and the money is going towards the Viana family.

The suggested donation to attend the event is \$5, which will be administered by the FoodCorps to combat food insecurity in the family's household, as well as a 50/50 raffle to cover other expenses.

People of all ages are welcome to attend, including their dogs. No masks are required, but there will be hand sanitizer stations and areas where you can buy a mask if you would

feel more comfortable wearing one.

those things.

"We really need to have them come to us with their budgets and really explain how it fits into the overall picture and how we're going to fund it," he said.

D'Angelo said it would be important to have the Finance Director attend their initial meetings so they can get a sense of

what they are thinking.

Selectmen Steven Couture, who is in his first year on the Board of Selectmen said he likes the idea of having the department heads meet with them in advance.

"I like the idea of them coming in, it's like a pre-brief," he said.

Chester Town Administrator Debra Doda said that she invited the Highway Police Fire and Maintenance

departments to come to their Sept. 23 meeting to begin to discuss their budget expectations.

Selectmen Stephen Landau said that they should talk to the 300th Anniversary Committee since they have a lot of big events and things planned which are going to have a big impact on different departments.

For example, he said that many of the events

would likely require staffing from different departments like the police department. He said that they should be figuring out when police details will be required and how that will impact the budget for next year.

Myette said that aside from the budget impact there are other concerns when it comes to parking and safety that they should be talking to them about as well.

Doda said that various departments were invited to their Sept. 30 meeting along with the 300th Anniversary Committee so they could have those conversations.

Derry Zoning Board Denies Car Dealership Variance

DERRY - During the Sept. 16 Derry Zoning Board meeting the Board heard a case regarding a possible special exception for Galco Properties, which is owned by Tarkpor Aloysius Mamia.

He explained that he was seeking permission to have a small automobile dealership located at 26 Kendall Pond Road, which isn't allowed in the zone.

Mamia told the Board that he is a Derry resident and wants to establish a

small business and bring new economic opportunity to the town.

One thing that he emphasized is that he would only be able to have three to five cars on display at a time out front because of the amount of capital he has. He said that in total he would have no more than 10 at a time at the dealership and the ones not on display would be parked in the extra spaces.

"Because of starting capital I don't intend that there will be more than three to five cars parked outside for display at one

time," he said.

Although, there would be the possibility that he would one day have more capital to have more inventory he explained that if that were to be the case then it would mean he had outgrown the space and would have to get a bigger location.

"We would definitely relocate," he said.

He also explained that the property was previously used for a construction company and explained that he didn't think it would have much more impact on the community

by having a car dealership since they would have similar amount of vehicles parked in the parking lot at one time and since most people search for cars online first that they wouldn't have too many people coming in to look at a time.

It was explained by Robert Mackey, the Code Enforcement Officer for the Town that the property was previously in an industrial zone and it is now located in a medium density residential zone.

Because of this it means that the Board had to determine and vote on if the proposal would be a more appropriate or as appropriate use for the zone as the construction business was.

During the meeting multiple abutters and others who live in the area spoke against having a car dealership located there.

Michelle Paris, who lives on the next street over

said that she didn't think the location, would be appropriate to have a car dealership.

"I am for small businesses. I want to see Derry grow. I want to see businesses do great but this is not the location for this type of business," she said.

Her main concern is because of the amount of traffic that is already in the area. She said that currently she and others have a hard time turning out on her street and have to go down a different street instead due to the traffic.

Paris also pointed out that if they had a car dealership there then they would have to test drive the vehicles meaning that there would be even more traffic in the area.

"Where are they going to test drive them, are they going to drive them around our neighborhood," she said.

Nick Sands, who lives up the street, said that he

also had similar concerns with there being a lot of traffic in the area and thinks that the increase in traffic from a potential car dealership could be problematic.

After hearing from Mamia along with the abutters the Board felt that putting a car dealership on the property instead of a construction company wouldn't be as appropriate.

Derry Zoning Board Chairman Lynn Perkins said that not only would it be a non-conforming use it would also have an impact on the surrounding community.

"I think overall the community has respected your desires, it's just that it's not fitting in their eyes for this location," he said.

The Board ultimately voted unanimously against the special exception.

The next Derry Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting is slated for Oct. 7 at 7 p.m.

Thompson explained that their budget season is fast approaching.

"Budget season is now upon us," he said.

He said that the building principals have been talking to their staff to identify their building needs. Thompson said it's a good conversation to flush out the needs from the wants.

"Those are the conversations that are currently happening," he said.

Thompson said that

they will be having budget workshops in October and in early November they will be beginning to finalize the budget in early November.

It was explained by Thompson that one thing that will be new this year for their budget process is that they will have a "new budget checklist." Thompson explained that any new budget items that are being requested for next year and

are more than \$500 would be put onto the list that will allow the School Board to have a quick reference guide and will know what is new to the proposed budget compared to what is normally budgeted.

Ultimately he said that they hope to have budget approval come December.

"Our goal would be to get a budget to the board in December for final approval," he said.

Editorial

Read Twice, Send Once

Less than 50 years ago the only modes of communication were by phone, often with time restrictions, and by letter – now a notion romanticized by rom-coms and historical dramas. Before the invention of the Internet, or rather social media, no one had to worry about what they said over the phone or in a letter; a phone call could be forgotten, a letter burned or thrown away.

Today, it is far too easy to write something up be it email, text, or social media status, and send it off into the complicated world of technology. It takes two seconds to think of something and press send, and it takes even less time for the ramifications to come back and bite you.

We see it every day on the news: Celebrities being torn apart for an ill timed or badly worded joke, the press scrutinizing the President's character on Twitter. While this attention may not ruin a celebrity's life or career, it is a different story for small businesses like a pizza place or how a school can be detrimentally affected by a simple miscommunication.

All it takes is an angry citizen to get hold of something and post it on social media for a maelstrom of

negativity and widespread recognition to occur. Social media begets hate, and often does not allow those who made a mistake in a post or an email to correct themselves before the damage is done.

There is a quick solution to this, though not a bullet proof one: Editing.

Taking a pause before hitting send, especially for a business or other local establishment, is essential in making sure miscommunications don't happen – or are at least less likely to. Though there are positive sides to the speed and wide reach of social media – like if there really is something wrong with a business or establishment it can be identified and brought to the attention of the public quickly and effectively – it is not the greatest platform for mistakes.

When errors in emails or posts happen, they don't just go away. They get shared and remain on the Internet forever, unwittingly popping up at the least opportune times, potentially causing problems in the future.

The Internet can be a friend or an enemy, and a simple fact check or contextual edit can be the deciding factor for which one it is.

Sandown Board of Selectmen Discuss Possible Wage Increases

Sandown Selectmen met on Monday, Sept. 20, with one of the main agenda items being discussed was in regards to possible wage increases for the 2022 year.

The discussion was continued from the previous Selectmen meeting.

Sandown Town Administrator Lynne Blaisdell gave the Board of Selectmen a breakdown of what it would cost the Town in increases if they gave employees a percentage increase between one and five percent.

With no increase the total salaries would be \$1,287,439.

Selectmen Tom Tombarello explained that they don't know how much insurance will go up starting Jan. 1 and that figures show that the cost of living

in the state could go up by as much as six percent next year which is why it's important to do something when it comes to pay increases.

"We obviously have to do something," he said.

One of the issues that the Board of Selectmen have been trying to combat over the years is the fact that salary studies have shown that some of their employees are only paid about 80-85 percent of what people are paid in similar size towns for the same positions.

The Board of Selectmen generally agreed that long term it would be important for the Town to develop a matrix so they can plan for raises from year to year and so employees can have predictability for the future.

It was also discussed the need to have a salary study done again so they

can determine where Sandown's pay rates are compared to other similar size towns.

Blaisdell said that some other towns are currently in the process of doing a salary survey and she said that she could send the results to the Board of Selectmen when she gets those results.

She also said that they usually get the new rates for insurance in October so if they table it until Oct. 18 they should have more information to make a bet-

ter informed decision.

"We're going to table it until the 18th and go from there," said Sandown Board of Selectmen Chairman Eric Olsen.

Also during the meeting Tombarello said that a lot of towns and counties have given their front line workers money as a way to recognize their work during the pandemic.

He said that those funds came from the American Rescue Plan Act funding.

Tombarello explained that Sandown would be

receiving \$372,000 this year and next year and thought they should be giving their workers some money out of it.

"There's a group of people in this town who have come here everyday since Coronavirus happened last March," he said.

His idea would be to give those who worked in person during the pandemic a one-time payment of \$500. He also noted that it wouldn't be for first

responders who already received extra pay through the Governor's Executive Order.

"I would really like to see it," he said.

Olsen said that it sounded like a good idea but said that he wanted to discuss what employees would be getting it and how much it would cost before making a decision.

It was decided that they would discuss it again at a future meeting.

Chester Church Spire Back in Its Original Position

The spire of the Chester Congregational Baptist Church is back in place after undergoing repairs as part of a larger project to restore and preserve the historic church building.

A modest crowd gathered in the early morning of Thursday, Sept. 16, to watch a crane place the church spire back onto the steeple base.

Preservation Timber Framing Inc. workers have been doing the repairs and determined in July that the

safest and most efficient way to work on the structures was to remove the spire from the steeple.

It took about six weeks to complete the repairs. Church members and townspeople were excited to have the spire back in place which is often referred to as "Chester's Skyline."

Built in 1773, the church structure has stood at the corner of routes 102 and 121 for nearly 250 years. It was originally used for both worship services and

town meetings. A capital campaign was launched in 2019 to fund the Meetinghouse Preservation Project, the goal being to repair the steeple and spire structures, preserve the original beam structure, replace or repair the shutters, and scrape and paint the exterior and damaged interior ceiling.

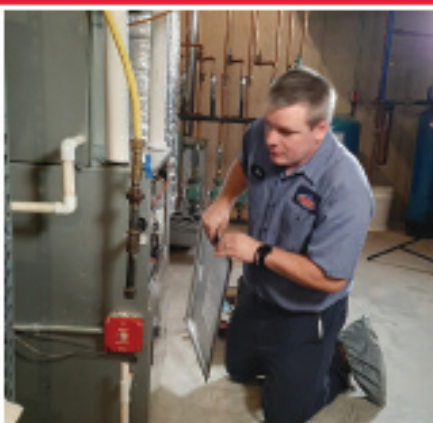
